### JOURNAL OF THE SENATE FIFTY-SIXTH LEGISLATURE FIRST REGULAR SESSION Monday, January 9, 2023 First Day

The second Monday in January being the date prescribed by the Constitution of Arizona for the annual meeting of the Legislature, the First Regular Session of the Fifty-sixth Legislature convened this day.

The Senate assembled in its chamber at 12:01 p.m.

The Chairman Pro Tempore, Senator-elect Lela Alston, District 5, called the Senate to order.

Bishop Wall, Diocese of Gallup, offered prayer.

Presentation of the Colors was by the Luke Air Force Base 56th Fighter Wing Honor Guard.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was led by children of the Members.

The National Anthem was performed by the 108th Army Band, Arizona National Guard.

# APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEE TO INVITE THE CHIEF JUSTICE OF THE ARIZONA SUPREME COURT TO ADMINISTER OATH OF OFFICE

Chairman Pro Tempore Alston appointed Senators-elect Shamp and Sundareshan as members of a committee to invite the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Honorable Robert Brutinel, to administer the Oath of Office to the Senators-elect and to escort the Chief Justice to the Senate Chamber.

#### OATH OF OFFICE

Chief Justice Robert Brutinel entered the Senate Chamber escorted by Senators-elect Shamp and Sundareshan and administered the Oath of Office to the Senators-elect as follows:

I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution and laws of the State of Arizona, that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same and defend them against all enemies, foreign and domestic, and that I will faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of the office of State Senator according to the best of my ability, so help me God.

Chairman Pro Tempore Alston expressed appreciation to Chief Justice Brutinel and the committee escorted the Chief Justice from the Senate Chamber.

#### JOINT SESSION OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES FIFTY-SIXTH LEGISLATURE FIRST REGULAR SESSION

The Senate and House of Representatives assembled in Joint Session at 2:10 p.m. in the House Chamber.

The President of the Senate, Warren Petersen, called the Joint Session of the Legislature to order.

#### STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS GOVERNOR KATIE HOBBS Monday, January 9, 2023

Chief Justice Brutinel, Secretary Fontes, Attorney General Mayes, Treasurer Yee, Superintendent Horne, Mine Inspector Marsh, Speaker Toma, President Petersen, Leaders Terán and Cano, members of the Legislature, Supreme Court, and Corporation Commission, tribal leaders, honored guests, and Arizonans in every corner of our state, it is an honor to join you here today.

We gather every year for this annual tradition, but before we begin, I want to take a moment to honor a man who lived his life in service to this state. Mel Hannah, who served as the chair of the Secretary of State's Community Advisory Council during my tenure and a member of the Commission of African American Affairs, passed away last night. His family and friends are in my heart and prayers today.

And in the spirit of service that he embodied, let's begin to have candid discussions about the issues facing our state and how we can work together to ensure a better future for every family and community.

We are all here because we care deeply about Arizona – its natural beauty, its abundant opportunities and, most of all, its resilient, diverse, and incredible people.

I know I speak for all of this state's elected officials when I say it is a profound honor to represent our fellow Arizonans, and we have an obligation to listen, to find common ground, and to craft real solutions during the 56th Legislature.

As a former member of both the House of Representatives and the Senate, I have a deep respect for each of you answering the call of public service. I know that clarity and understanding of the top priorities of my administration will help you make the most of your time during this session.

So let me begin my first State of the State by repeating something from my inaugural address last week.

If you're ready to make real progress on the issues that matter most to the people of this state, then my door will always be open.

However, chasing conspiracy theories, pushing agendas for special interests, attacking the rights of your fellow Arizonans, or seeking to further undermine our democracy will lead nowhere.

Instead, I would like to extend an invitation. Let's work together to make a significant impact in the lives of the families and communities of this state today and for years to come by lowering costs, investing in public education, securing our water future, tackling the affordable housing crisis, and other real issues that are holding back too many.

The people of Arizona have sent us here to find solutions to these issues, and that's exactly what my administration will be focused on doing for the next four years.

One of the things I learned as a social worker is the power of prosperity – when families are doing well, so many other things start going the same way. And while every issue that we face has complexities, one thing that's not complicated is that the easiest way to change someone's life is to offer them the opportunity for a new or better job.

So to Arizona's business community, I want you to know I profoundly believe in the power of prosperity, and I am committed to partnering with you to build on the thriving, dynamic foundation we have in this state where businesses and the people who make them run succeed together.

To Arizona's educators, parents, and students: You know better than anyone that education must be the top issue we tackle. As we work to find solutions, I will always seek – <u>and listen to</u> – your guidance.

To Arizona's tribal governments and nations: Your voices will be heard in my administration, your sovereignty will be respected, and your contributions will be recognized as we move into the future.

To all of Arizona's diverse, vibrant, and strong communities, from Page to Patagonia: You have built our state into the incredible place it is today. As we go forward into the future, it will take all of us – <u>all of us</u> – to maintain our strength, fix our deficiencies, and blaze new trails for the generations that follow.

We start this new chapter in a unique position. The state of our state offers promise – and we must act on it.

Growing, cutting-edge companies are moving here to tap into our state's top-tier workforce and healthy business environment. However, too many of our rural communities are being left behind because they don't have the infrastructure they need like high-speed internet.

Companies have record job openings, but far too many Arizona residents can't afford rapidly increasing rents or have been priced out of buying a home.

We have some of the best K-12 schools in the country – but the state has long failed to live up to its obligation to adequately invest fairly in <u>public</u> education in every community, and we see the results of that failure with high teacher vacancy rates and some districts with crumbling infrastructure.

Arizona has stunning landscapes and unrivaled natural beauty. However, we must do more to protect our forests and watersheds from the devastating effects of fire and drought.

Our state has a dedicated public sector workforce. But we can do better in reflecting the diversity of our state to better serve our communities. Those who work in public service should feel empowered, and it is our responsibility to ensure barriers to accessibility and opportunities are broken down for all.

As we look to the future, we cannot continue to kick the can down the road on these issues and so many others. We owe it to our fellow Arizonans – both this generation and the next – to face these challenges head on.

As I said in my inaugural address, I'm an optimist – <u>especially</u> when it comes to Arizona. I believe we are the greatest state in this nation. I believe in our educators and our students. I believe in the men and women who protect our public safety every day. I believe in our innovators, risk takers, and entrepreneurs. I believe in our public servants. I believe in the future of our incredible state – and I know you do too.

In the late Governor Rose Mofford's 1989 State of the State address, she spoke about "difficult choices" as she challenged the legislature to do the right thing – funding elementary and high school education, supporting our state's health care system AHCCCS, and other critical challenges of her time.

No one should be surprised that Governor Mofford fought for the right thing and chose not to back down from those challenges. She had a deep understanding of what the people of Arizona wanted and what they needed. As a Democratic governor working with Republican lawmakers, she knew when to find bipartisan compromise and when to stand firm in her beliefs.

As we begin to write this new chapter for the state we all love, I ask that we all take inspiration from Governor Mofford's actions and look toward the future ... to the partnerships we will forge ... to the challenges we will overcome together ... to the good we will do for our fellow Arizonans.

My hope is that when you leave here today, you understand that I and my administration are committed to action and to improving the lives of every Arizonan. And if you are committed to those same ideals, then I am ready to work side-by-side with you – no matter your party registration.

With that, here are my priorities as we build a resilient, innovative and prosperous Arizona for everyone.

Education gave me a chance to climb my way up and build a better life. And I know that's true for countless other Arizonans and for many here in this chamber today. And that's why I have spent so much of my public life fighting for better schools and to level the playing field – and that's exactly what I'll continue to do as governor.

However, before we talk about steps we'll take to improve K-12 education going forward, we must first address the potential catastrophe that will happen in just a few months if the legislature does not act to address the archaic funding cap – officially known as the Aggregate Expenditure Limit – by March first.

As part of last year's budget negotiations, a promise was made that a special session would be called to override this limit that's based on an out-of-date, 40-year-old funding formula that's holding our public schools hostage.

That promise was not kept.

We <u>must</u> make this right. If we do not, this ticking time bomb will explode and force a 1.3 billion dollar cut that would be one of the largest in our state's history.

And it will happen in the last two months of the school year.

<u>Superintendents and education leaders are warning</u> this will cause furloughs, layoffs, and possibly even school closures. It is unnecessary to allow these hysterics to go on any longer. Let's give our students, our teachers, and our parents the assurance that schools will remain open.

The solution is simple and it doesn't cost another penny to do the right thing. Representative David Cook has already introduced a resolution to override this outdated limit. This legislature should bring it to the floor. The Democrats in both chambers are ready to act on this immediately.

Looking beyond this pressing issue, Arizonans have made clear it's time to rebuild and reinvest in our public schools. For years, our leaders have chosen to ignore parents, teachers and students who know we can have the greatest public education system in the nation – but instead are too often saddled with crumbling infrastructure and crowded classrooms.

And rather than doing the right thing and facing these challenges head on, the previous legislature passed a massive expansion of school vouchers that lacks accountability and will likely bankrupt this state.

In fact, funding this expansion is poised to cost Arizona taxpayers an estimated <u>1.5</u> billion dollars over the next 10 years if left unaddressed.

That's why when my budget is delivered on Friday, you will see that it truly invests in public schools and students – ensuring we are a Prepared Arizona.

We will begin with our public school teachers, who continue to be caught in the middle of crises of our own making – and for thousands of them, it's too much. One in four teachers leave Arizona schools each year, which is the highest rate in the nation. As a result, more than 2,500 classroom educator positions are vacant.

As the sister of two public school teachers, I see how hard they work every day on behalf of their students. So to the teachers and education support professionals of our state, I see you, I respect you, and I will always stand up for you.

To members of this legislature, I hope we can all agree that when we keep the most talented teachers in the classroom, our kids win, our families win, and our communities win.

That's why I'll be launching an Educator Retention Task Force to develop a thorough framework and make recommendations to improve class sizes, resources, working conditions, and other factors that will put us on a path to fix these issues and retain educators.

The reality is we don't have an educator shortage, what we have is a <u>retention crisis</u>. There are too many amazing professionals who have walked away from the career they love because of the uncompetitive salaries, onerous policies, and unfunded mandates this state has chosen to implement that rob educators of the joy of teaching. Teachers are creating the workforce and leaders of tomorrow, and it's time we started treating them with the respect they deserve.

For the last 5 years, Arizona has been involved in a lawsuit about school facilities funding. Last week, with support from Attorney General Mayes, my office led the successful effort to put the brakes on a costly and wasteful trial scheduled to start today – so we can focus on solving problems instead of needlessly paying lawyers millions to fight in court.

With the release of my budget on Friday, you will see historic investment in schools to address capital needs and my office will keep working to ensure Arizona's children and teachers can learn and work in safe and secure school buildings.

Another step we will take to help all communities to have the strong, effective public schools they deserve is to ensure we are funding all schools fairly.

Currently, our state government distributes additional per-pupil funding based on school letter grades and assessment results. This approach has largely benefitted only schools in high-wealth areas of Arizona's two largest counties – Maricopa and Pima – while leaving rural and economically struggling areas behind.

To address this inequity, my budget redirects the 68.6 million dollars for that program to the Base Support Level, which goes to all schools across our state instead.

Let me go on the record to say that <u>any</u> school that accepts taxpayer dollars should have to abide by the same accountability standards that <u>all</u> district schools do. We have seen too many examples of individuals and shady corporations taking advantage of the system and our students.

Let's work together to require that any school that accepts public dollars also participates in the Auditor General's annual school district spending report as well as take other steps to ensure our taxpayer dollars are going where they should and being spent properly.

Beyond this work to ensure transparency for how taxpayer funds are spent, there are other direct actions to support our schools and students.

We need to prioritize hiring social workers and counselors for our schools to address the mental health crisis among children and teens. Currently each counselor in an Arizona school provides services for more than 700 kids on average. That is the highest ratio in the nation and nearly three times the recommended standard. That's unacceptable and we must do better.

I strongly urge legislators to continue bringing solutions to my desk to ensure our public schools – in all communities – have the resources they need to help our kids succeed.

Let us now turn our attention to opportunities for our state's next generation <u>after</u> they graduate high school, where my administration will work to help create access to a wide range of education opportunities as they embark on the next chapter of their lives.

That means investing in community colleges – particularly in rural Arizona – as well as dual-enrollment programs statewide so no matter where a young adult lives, they have the opportunity to earn college credit or get a good-paying job.

For tens of thousands of other students, choosing to pursue a four-year degree from one of our state's major public universities is the right path – and make no mistake, we have three of the finest colleges in the country right here.

Arizona State University, Northern Arizona University, and the University of Arizona all produce workforce-ready graduates, attract millions of dollars in investments, and push the boundaries of knowledge and innovation.

They are incredible resources for our state's residents and for the entire nation – and we must continue to improve access to these institutions for higher learning.

That's why we're expanding the Arizona Promise Scholarship Program, which last year made college more affordable for over 4,000 families, by including funding capacity for an additional 10,000 students who will now have an opportunity to pursue a college degree but otherwise would have been held back by the associated costs.

But we're not stopping there. In line with the will of Arizona's voters in passing Proposition 308 this past November, my budget allocates 40 million dollars to create the Promise for DREAMers Scholarship Program to cover <u>all students, regardless of immigration status</u>.

My administration is ready and willing to work with any member of this legislature to find additional solutions. Let's work together to ensure Arizona's higher education opportunities are the best in the nation and put individuals on the path to future prosperity.

As we all know, we have so many reasons to be proud of Arizona. Companies are growing here and, as a result, the job market is robust. What's more, we have enormous potential on the horizon.

However, we must also acknowledge the flip side of this prosperity, that too many families are getting further away from achieving the American dream due to the high cost of housing.

Our state is no stranger to the boom-and-bust housing cycles – but this is something wholly different.

Three Arizona cities – Tucson, Mesa, and Phoenix – have seen some of the <u>highest rent</u> increases in the nation.

The number of individuals experiencing homelessness has risen significantly in recent years.

We can do better. Let's work together to ensure that here in Arizona, any person who wants to achieve the American Dream or have a safe roof over their head can do so.

My administration's first step will be to support a 150 million dollar investment into the Housing Trust Fund this year – and I will call for additional support in the years ahead.

In addition to these measures, last week I signed an executive order re-establishing the Interagency and Community Council on Homelessness and Housing. This council will help coordinate and foster collaboration among state and local agencies, the private sector, and nonprofits to help identify solutions for individuals and families experiencing homelessness or struggling with housing affordability.

Beyond housing, our efforts to support individuals and families must address the rising costs of everyday items and services. Even as our state continues to be an incredible place to live and work, we can do more to help our fellow Arizonans get ahead.

That's why my budget sets aside 50 million dollars for a state-level, child tax credit for families earning less than 40,000 dollars a year to help pay for the rising costs of basic necessities for their children.

We will also help lower costs for Arizona families by exempting diapers and feminine hygiene products from our state's sales tax. These everyday items add up and we can and should help provide this relief to individuals and families who too often must choose between paying their bills or paying for the things they need to be healthy.

But this should only be the start. My administration is ready and willing to work with you – and my door will always be open to any member who brings forward a serious proposal to help Arizona families, seniors, and communities.

Let's work together to find ways to lower costs and help every community across our great state thrive economically.

Every community across our state also deserves to be safe. Building an Arizona for everyone means building a <u>safe</u> Arizona for everyone.

This obligation extends to our border, our broken immigration system, and the communities across the state who continue to bear the brunt of Washington's decades of failure on this critical issue.

Unfortunately, immigration has been politicized for far too long. Arizona voters told us in November they don't want or need political stunts designed solely to garner sensationalist TV coverage and generate social media posts.

Speak to leaders in border communities and across our state and it's clear they need real solutions after decades of failed leadership by both parties. We must take a holistic, realistic, and humane approach to help solve this issue. That means supporting sheriffs and local law enforcement in impacted communities – and it also means supporting community centers and hospitals.

I am encouraged by the White House's recent actions to finally visit the border and to start proposing real steps to begin addressing the problems of the current system. And while optimistic, I will also continue to push Congress to do its job and pass comprehensive immigration reform.

Visit border communities and speak with local leaders and law enforcement like I – and many others here – have done and you'll come away with a broader understanding of the complexities of this issue and the urgent need to institute solutions.

That's why I have invited Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas to visit the border with me and meet with community leaders, sheriffs, non-profit representatives, and business executives in impacted communities who all want effective and humane solutions to this longtime challenge.

I look forward to working with law enforcement, nonprofits, and community leaders throughout my time in office to identify real solutions, hold the federal government accountable, and create a Safe Arizona for all its residents.

Now, ensuring a strong, safe future for Arizona means defending the freedoms of all its residents. I refuse to stand by and do nothing as my daughter – or anyone's daughter – now has fewer rights today than I did growing up.

An overwhelming majority of Arizonans – more than 90 percent, in fact – believe abortion should be legal. It's time we all heed the message of the people of this state and meet this moment to ensure that we can always make our own healthcare decisions.

My administration will <u>always</u> protect reproductive freedom for all Arizonans. I will not support, and I will use every power of the governor's office to stop, any legislation or action that attacks, strips, or delays the liberty or inherent right of any individual to decide what's best for themselves or their families.

My budget will also match the federal Title Ten money our state receives to provide reproductive health services and family planning medication, bringing our total to more than 12 million dollars. This step will increase the program's impact here in Arizona for significantly more low-income women.

However, this should only be a start. I urge members of the legislature to put bills on my desk that will protect women, support families, and create a future for Arizona where anyone regardless of gender can succeed.

Finally, none of the solutions – or even the future – I have spoken about today will be possible without our state's most precious resource – water.

We must talk about the challenge of our time: Arizona's decades-long drought, over usage of the Colorado River, and the combined ramifications on our water supply, our forests, and our communities.

We are in a critical moment where we must be unified, where we must form new and stronger partnerships, and where we must find bipartisan solutions at a local, statewide, and national level.

This issue does not stop at state or international borders. We will all thrive together in the future ... or we will all be left with the catastrophic results of our failures.

From the work our current Senators Sinema and Kelly are leading, to the accomplishments of former Senator Jon Kyl and former Governor Bruce Babbitt, to decades of efforts by Arizonans before them, our state's leaders are at their best when they reach across the aisle for pragmatic solutions on this issue.

We should follow in their footsteps as we collectively face a drought unlike anything in modern times.

On January First, the Colorado River Tier Two mandatory water cuts went into effect – meaning Arizona will lose 21 percent of our water that comes from the most important river in the country. This equates to reducing our usage by <u>592,000 acre-feet just this year</u>.

We must also all understand this: barring a miracle from nature, it will likely get worse before it gets better.

This should be a wake-up call for all of us, because it will take all of us to solve it. Legislators, public officials, the business community – each and every one of us must commit to the partnerships needed to avoid this.

The foundation of those partnerships must be rooted in transparency and honesty about the facts and what we are collectively facing.

For those reasons, in the next few minutes you will receive a previously unreleased report by the Department of Water Resources that shows that portions of Phoenix's far West Valley are currently short of the 100-year Assured Water Supply Program by 15 percent today. This report unequivocally shows that we have to act <u>now</u>, or this will only be the first new area that faces this kind of shortage.

I don't understand, and do not in any way agree with, my predecessor choosing to keep this report from the public and from members of this legislature. However, my decision to release this report signals how I plan to tackle our water issues openly and directly.

Experts here in Arizona and across the nation agree there is no "silver bullet" solution to our current water challenges. We must evaluate and invest in both short- and long-term efforts that will help us achieve our goals.

This reality drives the three components of my plan for a Resilient Arizona.

First, my administration has heard loud and clear that re-establishing the Governor's Energy Office is a priority for communities across the state. In response, we will relaunch this entity as the Governor's Office of Resiliency, which will focus on water, energy, and land use solutions. This office will help coordinate efforts with the many departments, tribal governments, universities, organizations, and others involved in this effort. Arizona needs partnerships on a local, state, regional, and national level, and I intend to put us in the best position to do so.

Next, my administration will issue an executive order to launch the Governor's Water Policy Council to modernize and expand the Arizona Groundwater Management Act. Facing our current reality, it's time to update groundwater management tools and protect groundwater supplies – particularly in our rural communities.

We must take these actions today because in many parts of our state, there are effectively no restrictions on groundwater pumping and local communities have little-to-no support to manage water supplies. As a result, a new water user can move in, dig a well, and pump as much water as possible – even if it dries up the community's aquifer.

This is why you see a Saudi Arabian conglomerate pumping local groundwater nearly unchecked in La Paz County today, to grow water-intensive crops and send them to the other side of the planet.

We all know that's not right. Our groundwater should be used to support Arizonans, not foreign business interests.

Let's close this water poaching loophole and work together to modernize the Arizona Groundwater Management Act.

In addition to this action, my budget allocates funds to help rural communities set up Active Management Areas. All cities and towns in our state need to proactively manage our groundwater, and by funding this program we're providing a powerful tool to ensure we strike a balance between usage and recharging our water table.

For the last part of this approach, I look to you, members of the legislature. We are all in this together. Bring forward innovative solutions to this challenge of our time. We cannot let the same old partisan fights drag us down.

My administration is ready and willing to work with you and we will always do what's best for Arizona and its people.

It is my belief that we all understand the gravity of the challenges before us – and it is my hope that we will use this opportunity to once again prove to the people of our state, the nation, and around the world Arizona's visionary leadership when it comes to ensuring a stable water supply for the millions of people who call this place home.

These challenges will not be easy. Nor will the other issues we need to confront, including fixing prisons, improving accessibility for all Arizonans, lowering childcare costs, supporting veterans, protecting older and vulnerable Arizonans, and so much more.

But the people of Arizona did not send us to this capitol to solve easy problems or to leave them up to the next generation. They sent us here to do the right thing – no matter how difficult that may prove to be. We will not let them down.

I spoke earlier in these remarks about Governor Mofford and how she challenged lawmakers to choose action to solve the challenges of their time. Perhaps nothing in her speech did more to drive home the urgency of the time than these words she shared in the conclusion:

- "... we cannot delay. Opportunities fade. Arizona's future hangs in the balance.
- "... I say to you, join with me in making these difficult decisions, and together we will journey towards the next frontier."

They did just that, and together, they put Arizona on a path to prosperity and improved the lives of millions of families. It is my sincere hope that we can do the same at this moment more than 30 years later.

In the days, months and years ahead – of all-night budget negotiations, marathon voting sessions, and seemingly impassable disagreements – let us never forget that we all hold a deep love for this state. We are here because we want to ensure the generations that follow have a chance to also discover that love.

Thank you for committing to public service, for your partnership in finding real solutions, and for the contributions we will all make going forward as we build an Arizona for everyone.

Now let's get to work.

## State of Arizona Senate Proclamation

in Honor of Tommy Nunez

**WHEREAS**, Tommy Nunez was born on September 10, 1938 in Santa Maria, California and moved to Phoenix when he was 7 years old, where he became one of the early members of the Phoenix Boys Club;

*WHEREAS*, at the age of 17 Tommy Nunez joined the United States Marine Corps shortly before marrying his longtime wife and partner, Mary Ann Solarez;

*WHEREAS*, following 12 years of officiating high school and junior college sports in Arizona, Tommy Nunez became the first Mexican-American official in American professional sports with the National Basketball Association;

*WHEREAS*, Tommy Nunez spent 30 years as an official for the NBA, officiating over 2,000 regular season games and 75 playoff games, in addition to the 1992 NBA All-Star Game, the 1992 and 1996 Mexican Challenge, 1994 European Tour in Paris and Spain and the NBA-ABA Tour in Japan;

WHEREAS, both during and following his officiating career, Tommy Nunez gave back to the community in countless ways, including working for the Arizona Department of Economic Security's Job Training Department and the U.S. Department of Labor's Job Corps, serving as a motivational specialist with the Arizona Department of Education focusing on dropout prevention and at-risk students and directing a summer work program developed by Chicanos Por La Causa to provide young adults with employment skills;

Hispanic Heritage Commission and the Profiles in Success Community Service Award from Valle Del Sol in Phoenix;

House Concurrent Resolution 2027 was introduced and read in full by Senator Farnsworth as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of the honorable Russell K. Pearce.

The Honorable Russell K. Pearce passed away on January 5, 2023 in Mesa at the age of 75 after a brief illness.

Russell Pearce was born on June 23, 1947 and was a fifth generation Arizonan, growing up in a blended family that totaled 13 children. He honorably served in the Army National Guard from 1965 to 1972. During that time, he served a two-year mission from 1967 to 1969 for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints in the areas of New York City, New Jersey, Connecticut and Massachusetts.

A life-long learner, Russell Pearce earned a bachelor's degree in management from the University of Phoenix in 1981. He continued his education by earning several certificates, including certificates from Harvard University, John R. Kennedy School of Government, Arizona State University in Advanced Executive Development, the University of Colorado, Motor Vehicle Legal and Law College, Arizona State University in Budget and Appropriations and the Supreme Court of Arizona, Arizona Judicial College.

Russell Pearce cared deeply about Arizona, and he worked in a variety of public servant jobs his entire life. Before being elected to office, he worked as a deputy sheriff with the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office from 1970 to 1991, and from 1993 to 1994 he served as the chief deputy. After being shot and critically wounded in the line of duty, he was nominated for the Medal of Valor award, which is the highest award in law enforcement.

Continuing his civil service, Russell Pearce served as a judge in the North Mesa Justice Court, a pro-tem judge in the Maricopa County Justice Courts, the director of the Governor's Office of Highway Safety, the director of the Arizona Motor Vehicle Division and the chief deputy director of the Maricopa County Treasurer's Office.

Russell Pearce was elected to the Arizona House of Representatives in 2001 until his term limit in 2009 and was subsequently elected to the state Senate, serving as the Senate President in 2011. He believed in his constitutional duty to follow the rule of law and to protect Arizona's citizens by enforcing those laws. He believed in standing up for the taxpayers, efficiency in government and defending faith, family and freedom above all else. He once wrote, "The greatness of our nation is measured by the character of its people."

Russell Pearce is survived by his wife of 47 years, LuAnne, and their children, Dodi, Sean, Colten, Justin and Joshua, Wyatt, Ethan and Tatum, and many grandchildren.

#### ALZHEIMER'S AWARENESS DAY IN ARIZONA

*WHEREAS*, according to the Alzheimer's Association, Alzheimer's is the most common cause of dementia, a progressive brain disease, that causes problems with memory, thinking and behavior. Symptoms usually develop slowly and get worse over time, becoming severe enough to interfere with daily tasks; and

*WHEREAS*, there are more than 150,000 Arizonans aged 65 and older living with Alzheimer's disease; and

WHEREAS, by 2025 there will be 200,000 Arizonans living with Alzheimer's disease; and

WHEREAS, Arizona has the highest growth rate of Alzheimer's in the country; and

WHEREAS, Alzheimer's disease is the fourth leading cause of death in Arizona; and

WHEREAS, there has been a 191.6% increase in Alzheimer's deaths in Arizona since 2000; and

WHEREAS, further research of Alzheimer's disease is critical; and

**WHEREAS**, as many as half of Americans with dementia have never been diagnosed, with only 33% of those who have been formally diagnosed aware that they have the disease; and

WHEREAS, early detection and diagnosis can lead to significant savings in health care costs and increased quality of life; and

WHEREAS, a lack of a diagnosis means a delay in treatments, care delivery and supportive services; and

*WHEREAS*, during this lost time, people living with dementia could be enrolled in potentially life-changing clinical trials of new treatments, receive emotional support by joining a support group, or begin planning for caregiving, housing and income changes; and

*WHEREAS*, while there are currently no FDA-approved treatments that prevent or cure Alzheimer's disease, data from clinical trials have shown new treatments which can meaningfully change the course of the disease for people in the earliest stages of Alzheimer's disease; and

WHEREAS, treatments that deliver tangible benefits to those living with mild cognitive impairment due to Alzheimer's and early Alzheimer's dementia are as valuable as treatments that extend the lives of those with other terminal diseases; and

WHEREAS, increasing public awareness about Alzheimer's is key to early detection and diagnosis;

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Senate of the State of Arizona, the House of Representatives concurring: That the Members of the Legislature proclaim January 23, 2023 as Alzheimer's awareness day in the State of Arizona.

Majority Leader Borrelli moved that the Rules of the Fifty-fifth Legislature, adopted as the temporary Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature on January 9, 2023 be adopted as the permanent Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature. The motion carried.

Majority Leader Borrelli moved the proposed amendments to Senate Rules 2-N, 7-A, 8-A, Paragraph 4, 17-K, 29-C and 32 as distributed, be adopted.

The Secretary recorded the action.

#### SENATE RULES

## RULE 1 Officers and Employees

- A. The officers of the Senate shall be a President, who shall be chosen from among the membership of the Senate, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and a Sergeant at Arms.
- B. There shall be such other employees as may be authorized by the Senate. The appointment, terms and conditions of employment, compensation, discipline, and discharge of employees of the Senate shall be determined by the President, subject to the approval of the Senate. Employees of the Senate are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employees.

#### RULE 2 The President

The President shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. The President shall take the chair on every legislative day precisely at the hour to which the Senate, at its last sitting, adjourned; immediately call the members to order and on the appearance of a quorum, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read.
- B. The President shall have control of the Senate Chamber, including seating assignments of members therein, all other parts of the Senate wing and all other areas and buildings used exclusively by the Senate.
  - C. The President shall preserve and maintain order and decorum.
- D. The President shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the Senate and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by permission of the Senate.
- E. The President shall state all questions in the proper order in which they shall be disposed.
- F. When a question is undebatable or when debate on a question is closed, the President shall state the question, calling first for the "Ayes" and then for the "Noes". If the President is in doubt, or a division is called for, the Senate shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and then those in the negative. But on demand of two members a roll call of the Ayes and Noes shall be ordered at any time before such vote is made certain and declared.
- G. The President shall have the right to vote, and on all questions the President shall vote last.
- H. The President shall have the right to name any member as President Pro Tempore to serve at the President's request, which appointment may extend throughout the session unless terminated by the Senate. The President may appoint any other member as temporary President Pro Tempore to serve for a limited period of time. In the absence or omission of such an appointment, the Senate shall proceed to elect a President Pro Tempore to act during the absence of the President.
- I. The President shall appoint all standing committees, and all select committees unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present, and shall appoint the chairman and vice-chairman of each such committee. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, but shall not vote or sign reports from any committee except the committees of which the President is chairman. However, if the President is an appointed member of the Rules Committee, the President shall be a voting member of that committee. The President shall fill all vacancies on committees.
- J. The President shall refer all proposed measures or other legislative matters to the appropriate committees. Every bill, resolution and memorial shall be referred by the President to one or more standing committees, except resolutions or memorials to be adopted by unanimous consent and House bills to be substituted on third reading pursuant to Rule 11-H. All proposed measures or other legislative matters shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee without action upon the part of the President. If three-fifths or more of the members of the Senate petition the President to discharge committees from further consideration of a bill, resolution or memorial, the measure shall be withdrawn by the President from assigned committees which have not reported the measure. If a committee hearing has not been held on the measure, the President shall direct that a hearing be held by a committee within seven days and upon withdrawal or hearing, the matter shall be placed by the President on the active calendar of the Committee of the Whole. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole, it shall be placed by the President on the third reading calendar. If a discharge petition is presented to the President less than seven days before the Senate adjourns sine die, the President shall not be required to act upon the petition.

- K. All debts incurred by the Senate, either during session or between sessions of the legislature, shall be subject to approval by the President and if so approved shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division of the Department of Administration.
- L. The office of the President shall keep the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and attaches, and shall maintain these records for inspection by the membership.
- M. The President is authorized to call meetings of standing committees of the Senate during periods when the Senate is not in session, and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance.
- N. THE PRESIDENT IS AUTHORIZED TO BRING OR ASSERT IN ANY FORUM ON BEHALF OF THE SENATE ANY CLAIM OR RIGHT ARISING OUT OF ANY INJURY TO THE SENATE'S POWERS OR DUTIES UNDER THE CONSTITUTION OR LAWS OF THIS STATE.

#### RULE 3 The Secretary

The Secretary shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a Journal of each day's proceedings, and to provide a typewritten copy of the same for examination by the President. The Secretary shall each day prepare a calendar of the Orders and Business of the Day and a like calendar for the Committee of the Whole, and such other dockets and calendars as may be ordered, and shall cause a copy to be placed on the desk of each member, at or before the hour of convening.
- B. The Secretary shall have the custody of all bills, resolutions, memorials, petitions, communications, or other measures, instruments and papers introduced in or submitted to the Senate, subject to such disposition thereof as may be provided by the rules of the Senate or the order of the President, and shall be held strictly accountable for the safekeeping of the same. The Secretary shall keep a record of all such measures or instruments, showing at all times the exact standing of each.
- C. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be required of the Secretary by the Senate or by the President.
- D. The Assistant Secretary shall act under the direction of the Secretary and in the absence of the Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary.

#### RULE 4 Sergeant at Arms

The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to attend the Senate and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings, to maintain order under the direction of the President or Chairman, to execute the commands of the Senate, and all processes issued by authority thereof, directed to the Sergeant at Arms by the Presiding Officer. Five minutes before the hour of the meeting of the Senate each day the Sergeant at Arms shall see that the floor is cleared of all persons, except those privileged to remain.
- B. The Sergeant at Arms shall enforce the rules relating to the privileges of the floor and gallery, and perform such other duties as may be required of the Sergeant at Arms by the Senate or by the President.

#### RULE 5 Members

- A. Every member shall be present within the Senate Chamber during its sittings, unless excused or necessarily prevented; and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question as set forth in Rule 30, or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 15.
- B. No Senator shall voluntarily be absent from the service of the Senate without leave of the President.

#### RULE 6 Questions of Privilege

Questions of privilege shall be: First, Privilege of the Senate, which relates to the privilege and rights of the Senate collectively, its organization, safety, dignity, comfort and the integrity of its proceedings; second, Personal Privilege, which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of the members individually in their representative capacity only; third, Personal Privilege which relates to matters personal to the members which may be received only by permission of the Senate or the Presiding Officer. Questions of privilege shall have precedence over all other questions, except motions to adjourn or recess, or the call of the Senate when no quorum is present.

#### RULE 7 Committees

- A. Standing Committees of the Senate shall consist of the following:
- 1. Appropriations
- 2. Commerce
- 3. Education
- 4. ELECTIONS
- 4.5. Finance
- 5. 6. Government
- 6. 7. Health and Human Services
- <del>7.</del> 8. Judiciary
- 9. MILITARY AFFAIRS, PUBLIC SAFETY AND BORDER SECURITY
- 8. 10. Natural Resources, Energy and Water
- 9. 11. Rules
- 10. 12. Transportation and Technology
- B. Committees of the Senate except the Rules Committee shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. The first Senator named on a committee shall be the chairman thereof; the second shall be the vice-chairman. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall have all the powers and duties of the chairman.
- 2. The Ethics Committee and each standing committee shall adopt rules of procedure consistent with the rules of the Senate. Committee rules shall require that the chairman vote last on a roll call vote. Committee rules may allow the vice-chairman to vote second to last on a roll call vote.
- 3. All committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as the proper decorum is maintained.

- 4. All committees will meet at regularly scheduled times and places. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice-chairman some other committee member designated by the President shall preside. Special meetings may be called at the option of the chairman. However, such meetings shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. Regularly scheduled meetings can be cancelled or rescheduled only with the permission of the President.
- 5. A written agenda for each regular or special meeting containing all bills, memorials and resolutions to be considered thereat shall be distributed to each member of the committee and to the Secretary of the Senate at least five days prior to the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. The action taken on every bill, memorial or resolution on the committee agenda shall be reported to the Secretary of the Senate at the conclusion of the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the chairman to deliver the committee report for each bill, memorial or resolution that has been voted out of committee to the Secretary of the Senate as soon as the committee amendment is prepared. If there is no amendment, the committee report shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day following the day the committee meeting adjourns.
- 6. A bill not on the chairman's agenda shall be scheduled by the chairman for discussion and committee action at the next subsequent committee meeting upon presentation to the chairman of a petition to schedule the bill, and upon filing a copy thereof with the Secretary of the Senate. A petition to schedule the bill must be signed by at least two-thirds of the members of the committee.
- 7. A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of any matter referred to it.
- 8. The consent of all of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a majority of committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members present on a committee shall be necessary to report any bill or other measure or matter referred to such committee. If a member opposes the report, he may file a minority report. A minority report shall bear the signature of any number of members joining in its recommendations and shall be considered the recommendations merely of the member or members signing the same.
- 9. Amendments proposed by a committee shall be clearly set forth as an attachment to the committee's report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. If the committee has adopted a rule addressing the submission of amendments to committee members, the chairman may preclude the offering of an amendment which does not comply with the rule, may without objection accept the amendment, or may postpone action on the measure until adequate notice has been given. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an amendment has been given by 5:00 p.m. two days, excluding Saturdays and Sundays, prior to the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by delivering a copy of the proposed amendment to the office of each member of the committee and to the information desk and posting such notice and leaving a copy in the office of the Senate Secretary. The committee report shall be accompanied by a copy of any measure to which amendments are proposed to the committee.
- 10. A roll call vote shall be taken of the committee members at the request of a committee member upon any motion or amendment.
- 11. Except as provided herein, all Senate bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. Except as provided herein, all House bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall hear a bill in violation of this paragraph without the written permission of the President.

- 12. All bills, memorials or resolutions referred to a standing committee shall be reported. Bills, memorials or resolutions which the committee has considered but on which no action has been taken and bills, memorials and resolutions which the committee has not considered shall be reported as such by the chairman of each standing committee at the last regular or special meeting of such committee for each session.
  - C. The Rules Committee of the Senate shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. All powers and duties of other standing committees of the Senate listed in subsection B of this rule except those powers and duties inconsistent with this subsection.
- 2. On the first day following the convening of the first regular session of each Legislature, the President shall appoint the members of the Committee on Rules, and the said committee shall henceforth have authority to present proposed changes or additions to the rules which upon adoption by the Senate shall be deemed standing rules of the Senate.
- 3. The written agenda for the Rules Committee shall be the calendar for the Committee of the Whole. All other legislative matters shall be in order before the Rules Committee without written agenda.
- 4. Amendments proposed by the Rules Committee should be clearly set forth as an attachment to the Rules Committee report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. Substantive amendments may be proposed by the Rules Committee only with the concurrence of the sponsor of a bill if sponsored by an individual or the committee chairman if sponsored by a committee. Corrective or technical amendments may be proposed. A proposed technical or corrective amendment which incidentally affects the substance of a bill or amendment shall require concurrence of the sponsor. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be offered in the Rules Committee.
- 5. The Committee on Rules shall consider the bill and proposed amendments thereto for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of any amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- (a) The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- (b) The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - (c) The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- (d) The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- (e) The bill is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.
- 6. In addition to the powers and duties given to the Rules Committee elsewhere in the Senate Rules, the Rules Committee shall have such other powers and duties over legislative matters as are assigned by the President.
- D. Any subcommittee of a standing committee may meet at any time upon the call of the subcommittee chairman without written notice, providing, however, that such meeting shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. A subcommittee may, without distributing a written agenda, consider any matter assigned to the subcommittee by the chairman of the standing committee.

#### RULE 8 Calendars

- A. There shall be the following calendars of business reported from committees:
- 1. A calendar of the Committee of the Whole, upon which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported by the standing or select committees, except the Rules Committee, to which they have been referred and all bills, resolutions and memorials which have failed in Committee of the Whole, or which have been retained on the calendar. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be prepared and filed in writing with the Secretary of the Senate.
- 2. An active calendar of the Committee of the Whole on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President that have been reported by the Rules Committee and that are drawn from the calendar of the Committee of the Whole on the order of business of the day.
- 3. A unanimous consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the Chairman of the Rules Committee and drawn from all bills, resolutions and memorials on the calendar of the Committee of the Whole that are unamended as reported by all standing committees to which they were referred. The unanimous consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest the inclusion of any bill, resolution or memorial on the unanimous consent calendar by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the unanimous consent calendar and return it to the calendar of the Committee of the Whole; provided, however, that a bill shall not be removed from the consent calendar for the purpose of proposing a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment. Bills, resolutions or memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar shall be placed on the Senate calendar.
- 4. A COW CONSENT CALENDAR ON WHICH SHALL BE PLACED THOSE BILLS, RESOLUTIONS AND MEMORIALS DESIGNATED BY THE PRESIDENT AND DRAWN FROM AMENDED MEASURES REPORTED OUT OF ALL COMMITTEES TO WHICH THEY WERE REFERRED WITH ZERO "NO" VOTES. THE COW CONSENT CALENDAR SHALL BE DATED, PRINTED, PLACED ON EACH MEMBER'S DESK AND POSTED AT THE INFORMATION DESK 48 HOURS, EXCLUDING NONWORKING DAYS, PRIOR TO BEING ACCEPTED. ANY SENATOR MAY PROTEST ANY MEASURE BEING SUBJECT TO GROUP MOTION AND ADOPTION OF ALL COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS BY SUBMITTING A PROTEST IN WRITING TO THE SECRETARY OF THE SENATE DURING THE 48-HOUR NOTICE PERIOD. A PROTEST TIMELY SUBMITTED BY ANY SENATOR SHALL AUTOMATICALLY REMOVE THE BILL, RESOLUTION OR MEMORIAL FROM THE COW CONSENT CALENDAR. ADDITIONALLY, THE FILING OF A FLOOR AMENDMENT WITH THE SECRETARY OF THE SENATE SHALL AUTOMATICALLY REMOVE THE BILL, RESOLUTION OR MEMORIAL FROM THE COW CONSENT CALENDAR. THE PRESIDENT MAY REMOVE A BILL, RESOLUTION OR MEMORIAL FROM THE COW CONSENT CALENDAR AT ANY TIME. SUBJECT TO RULE 17(K), THE BILLS, RESOLUTIONS, OR MEMORIALS REMAINING ON THE COW CONSENT CALENDAR AND PASSED WILL THEN BE PLACED ON THE THIRD READING CALENDAR.
- 5. A Senate calendar on which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported with a "do pass" or "do pass amended" recommendation by the Committee of the Whole and all bills, resolutions and memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar pursuant to paragraph 3.
- 6. An active Senate calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from the Senate calendar for consideration by the Senate on the order of business for the day.
- B. Measures shall be reported by the Committee of the Whole in the order and manner in which disposed of by that committee, and those approved shall be placed upon the Senate calendar for third reading in the order established by the President, and retained on the Senate calendar until finally disposed of.

#### RULE 9 Decorum and Debate

- A. When a Senator desires to speak, the Senator shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until the Senator is recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address the Presiding Officer. No Senator shall interrupt another Senator in debate without the Senator's consent, and to obtain such consent, the Senator shall first address the Presiding Officer.
- B. The Senator who sponsors a measure, or the Senator's designee, shall have the right to open and close debate on such measure.
- C. No Senator in debate shall, directly or indirectly, by any form of words, impute to another Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.
- D. If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall call the Senator to order; and when called to order the Senator shall sit down and not proceed without leave of the Presiding Officer or upon motion adopted by the Senate, that the Senator be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.
- E. If a Senator be called to order for words spoken in debate, the exceptionable words shall, upon the demand of any Senator, be taken down in writing, and read at the table for the information of the Senate.
- F. While the Presiding Officer is putting a question or addressing the Senate, no member shall walk out of or across the Chamber, nor, when a member is speaking, pass between the member and the Chair; nor remain by the Secretary's desk during the call of the roll for the counting of ballots; and the Sergeant at Arms is charged with the strict enforcement of this clause.

## RULE 10 Roll Call and Quorum

- A. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by the surname, except when two or more have the same surname, in which case the district designation shall be added; and after the roll has been once called, the Secretary shall call in their alphabetical order the names of those not voting or who failed to respond.
  - B. A majority of the Senators elected shall constitute a quorum.
- C. If, at any time during a session of the Senate, a question shall be raised by any Senator as to the presence of a quorum, the President shall forthwith direct the Secretary to call the roll and shall announce the result, and these proceedings shall be without debate.
- D. Whenever it shall be ascertained that a quorum is not present a majority of the Senators present may order a call of the Senate, which order shall be determined without debate, and pending its execution, and until a quorum shall be present, no debate or other motion, except to adjourn, shall be in order. Upon approval of the order to call the Senate, the President shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to request, and, when necessary, to compel the attendance of the absent Senators.
- E. When a quorum is present, a call of the Senate may be ordered by the President or by a majority of the members present to compel the attendance of the absent members. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate are present.
- F. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 11 Motions

- A. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- B. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of Ayes and Noes, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Senate.
- C. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- D. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order, and it shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by way of a substitute amendment.
- E. A question or an amendment containing two or more distinct and separate subjects may be divided upon the demand of any member. A motion to strike out and insert words, both relating to the same subject, and together accomplishing a single change in meaning, is indivisible.
- F. When motions are made for reference of a subject to a select committee, or to a standing committee, the question of a standing committee shall be put first. A motion simply to refer shall not be open to amendment, except to add instructions.
- G. Any motion improperly used for the purpose of delaying or obstructing business is a dilatory motion and may be ruled out of order by the Presiding Officer.
- H. A motion to substitute a House bill for a Senate bill on third reading shall not be in order unless the Senate bill for which substitution is sought is identical to the House bill.

#### RULE 12 Previous Question (Vote Immediately)

When the previous question is moved, adopted and ordered, it shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been ordered. The previous question may be moved with reference to a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the rules, or an amendment or amendments, or may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order, however, pending the motion for, or after the previous question shall have been ordered, for a motion to be made to commit or to recommit, with or without instructions, to a standing or select committee.

#### RULE 13 Reconsideration

- A. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a recorded vote, any Senator who voted on the prevailing side may on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter move a reconsideration. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a non-recorded vote, any Senator may, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, move a reconsideration. If the Senate shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no other motion to reconsider the question shall be in order unless by unanimous consent. A motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present, and a motion to lay it on the table shall not be in order. If the motion to reconsider passes, the question reconsidered shall be determined at such time as the President directs.
- B. When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been sent to the House of Representatives, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon first, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider. If the motion to request return passes, the motion to reconsider cannot be considered until the question or measure is returned to the Senate by the House.

#### RULE 14 Bills, Resolutions, Memorials, Engrossed Copies and Amendments

- A. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced by a member or a committee by presenting the original and three copies of such bill, resolution or memorial, unless additional copies are ordered by the President, to the office of the Secretary prior to 3:00 p.m. of the day immediately preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated.
  - B. A bill introduced in the Senate may be cosponsored by House members.
- C. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced during the first 22 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.
- D. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the certification of election of members by the Secretary of State until the first day of the first regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's Proclamation until the first day of the special session, provided the bill, resolution or memorial is germane to the call. A bill, resolution or memorial shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials prefiled for introduction pursuant to this rule may be first read on the first day of the session. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill, resolution or memorial at the time of prefiling.
- E. The original of a bill, resolution or memorial introduced in the Senate shall be designated by brown backing, endorsed "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Secretary. The chairman of each committee to which a bill, resolution or memorial is referred shall receive one copy endorsed "Committee Copy". Subsequent copies shall be endorsed and distributed as the President directs.
- F. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, a sufficient number of copies of any bill, resolution or memorial shall be duplicated.
- G. All bills prepared for introduction which propose to amend existing statutes shall show the new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case), lined through. New language to be added to the statutes shall be in capital letters (upper case).
- H. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and each page of the original and two copies shall be stamped with the blind embossed stamp of the Senate. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original Senate engrossed copy shall have a red backing. An engrossed measure ready for the third or final reading shall not be subject to amendment.
- I. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, the Senate shall provide the House and the Legislative Council with a sufficient number of copies of each amended engrossed Senate measure with a cover page or pages showing the page and line number of each adopted Senate amendment thereto. For Senate amendments to House measures the same number of copies shall be provided but may consist only of those pages containing the adopted Senate amendments and cover page or pages showing the page and line number of such Senate amendment. For unamended Senate measures the same number of cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.
- J. All bills, resolutions, memorials and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper,  $8\ 1/2$ " x 11" shall be used.

K. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendments to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines . . . . through . . . .". If everything after the enacting clause is stricken the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause".

#### RULE 15 Voting

- A. When the Ayes and Noes are ordered, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically, and each Senator shall without debate, declare the Senator's assent or dissent to the question, unless the Senator declares a personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the Senate, and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Presiding Officer, but may for sufficient reason change the Senator's vote prior to such announcement. No motion to suspend this rule shall be in order, nor shall the Presiding Officer entertain any request to suspend by unanimous consent.
- B. When a Senator declines to vote on the second call of the Senator's name, the Senator shall be required to assign the Senator's reasons therefor. If the reason assigned is other than a personal financial interest in the question or a substantial interest as defined in the statutory code which is not a personal financial interest in the question, the Presiding Officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator for the reasons assigned by the Senator, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate; and these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.
- C. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

### RULE 15.1 Electronic Roll Call System

- A. In all cases where a rule of the Senate refers to "roll call", "roll call vote" or "recorded vote", such reference shall be understood to refer also to the taking of the vote by an electronic roll call system.
- B. When taking attendance or recording the Ayes and Noes on any question to be voted upon, the electronic roll call system shall be used, unless it is inoperative, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules. This rule may be suspended by a majority of the members present in which case the roll shall be called in accordance with Rule 10.
- C. When the Senate is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call and the vote is to be taken by the electronic roll call system, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "You have heard the (motion or third or final reading) of (the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote no. The system is now open. The Senate will now proceed to vote."
- D. If a Senator declines to vote, the Senator shall state the reasons therefor as required by Rule 15-B and the system shall not be closed until every Senator who is present has voted, explained the reason for not voting or been excused from voting.
- E. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "Have all the Senators voted? The system will now be closed. The system is now closed. The Secretary will now record the vote."
- F. A Senator may change his vote after the roll call system has been closed and before announcement of the result, and not thereafter.
- G. The Secretary of the Senate shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall confirm the result to the Presiding Officer, who shall announce the same to the Senate. The Secretary shall enter the vote in the Journal.
- H. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member.

I. When a vote is being taken by the electronic roll call system, this rule supersedes any provision in the Senate Rules inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 16 Order of Business

- A. Unless otherwise ordered, the Senate shall convene every legislative day at a time certain as determined by the President, receive a prayer by the chaplain, recite the pledge of allegiance and continue in session until recess or adjournment.
  - B. The order of business shall be as follows:

Roll Call
Reading of the Journal
Business on the President's Desk
Petitions, Memorials, and Remonstrances
Orders of the Day
Introduction and First Reading of Bills
Reference of Bills
Second Reading of Bills
Reports of Standing Committees
Reports of Select Committees
Committee of the Whole
Report of the Committee of the Whole
Third Reading of Bills
Other Business of the Senate

- C. The President shall, upon each day, announce to the Senate the business in order, agreeable to the order of business contained in subsection B of this rule; and no business shall be taken up or considered until the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order, nor after the order to which it belongs is closed, except by order of the Senate. All questions relating to the order of business shall be decided by a majority of the members present without debate.
- D. Every bill shall be read by sections on three different days, unless two-thirds of the Senate deem it expedient to dispense with this rule. The vote on the final passage of any bill or joint resolution shall be taken by Ayes and Noes on roll call. Final passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the Senate.
- E. The Presiding Officer shall give notice at each reading, whether it be the first, second or third reading, and a Journal entry of the same shall be made by the Secretary.

#### Rule 17 Committee of the Whole; ADDITIONAL COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

- A. In forming a Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside. The chairman so appointed shall preserve and maintain order.
- B. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken up in regular order, or in such order as the committee may determine by a suspension of the rules, unless the order of the bill to be considered was determined by the Senate at the time of going into committee, but bills for raising revenue and the general appropriations bill shall have precedence.
- C. A majority of the members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.
- D. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole so far as applicable.

- E. In the Committee of the Whole, bills and resolutions shall be read by the Secretary and considered item by item, unless otherwise ordered by the committee, leaving preambles or titles to be last considered. The body of a bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but amendments shall be noted by the chairman or Secretary upon a separate piece of paper and reported to the Senate.
- F. The proceedings of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken down by the Secretary of the Senate, acting as the Secretary of the Committee of the Whole. The chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall in the chairman's report set forth all actions of the Committee of the Whole.
- G. When a bill or resolution is considered in the Committee of the Whole, the only regular motions which are in order are the following:
  - 1. To propose amendments.
  - 2. To limit debate.
  - 3. To recommend.
  - 4. To rise and report.
  - 5. That the bill or resolution retain its place on the calendar.
  - 6. That the bill or resolution be retained on the calendar.
- H. A roll call vote shall be taken when a motion to recommend is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.
- I. No proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.
- J. A motion to amend the Committee of the Whole report shall not be in order unless the proposed amendment to the report has been voted on in the Committee of the Whole.
- K. THE SENATE MAY BY A MAJORITY VOTE OF THE MEMBERS PRESENT BRING A BILL, MEMORIAL OR RESOLUTION OTHERWISE DESIGNATED AS AVAILABLE FOR THIRD READING TO COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE FOR AMENDMENT OR FURTHER AMENDMENT, EXCEPT NO PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO STRIKE EVERYTHING AFTER THE ENACTING CLAUSE AND INSERT NEW MATERIAL IS IN ORDER.

## RULE 18 Sitting as in Committee of the Whole

The Senate may by majority vote of the members present sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of any subject except if the subject is a bill, memorial or resolution which has been considered in Committee of the Whole, the consideration shall be limited to technical changes.

#### RULE 19 Journals

- A. The proceedings of the Senate and of the Committee of the Whole shall be briefly and accurately stated in the Journal. Titles of all bills, resolutions and measures, and such parts as shall be affected by proposed amendments, readings, references, reports and every vote, motion and roll call, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial or paper presented to the Senate shall be entered on the Journal.
- B. All confidential legislative and executive proceedings and the proceedings when sitting as a Court of Impeachment, shall be recorded in a separate book.
- C. The protest or remarks of any Senator and reasons therefor shall be entered on the Journal, if presented in writing, but no protest or remarks shall exceed two hundred words in length without the consent of the Senate.

## RULE 20 Proceedings on Nominations

- A. When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State to the Senate, they shall, unless otherwise ordered, be referred to appropriate committees, and a standing committee. If the nomination is referred to the Rules Committee, the committee, upon consideration, may recommend to the President that the nomination be further referred to another standing committee or may place the nomination on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate. If the Rules Committee recommends that the nomination shall be placed on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate, the Rules Committee recommendation shall be dated and placed on each member's desk. If a member wishes during the first seven calendar days after action by the Rules Committee to object to the inclusion of the nomination without a hearing by a standing committee other than the Rules Committee, the member may do so by filing a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the seven day period. If a protest is filed, the President shall remove the nomination from the list and assign the nomination to an appropriate standing committee other than the Rules Committee. No nomination placed upon the list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate shall be considered by the Senate until said nomination has remained on the list for seven calendar days. When a nomination is brought before the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put on the same day on which the nomination is received nor on the day on which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- B. Nominations confirmed or rejected by the Senate shall not be returned to the Governor by the Secretary until the expiration of the time limit for making a motion to reconsider the same, or while a motion to reconsider is pending, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present.

### RULE 21 Messages

- A. Messages from the Governor of the State, or from the House of Representatives, may be received at any stage of proceedings, except while the Senate is dividing, or while the Journal is being read, or while the question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending.
- B. Messages shall be sent to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, who shall previously certify the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions and other measures which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested, and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor of the State all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to him by the Senate.

#### RULE 22 Amendments of the House

- A. Any amendment by the House to any Senate bill shall be subject to one of the following motions or actions:
  - 1. Concur in House amendment.
- 2. Refuse to concur in House amendment and appointment of Conference Committee, free or simple.
- 3. The President may refer the bill with the House amendment to a committee for study and recommendations of concurrence or refusal to concur.
- B. Any amendment by the House which includes the addition of the emergency clause shall require a two-thirds vote of the members of the Senate for final passage with the emergency clause.

### RULE 23 Conference Committees and Reports

- A. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the bill, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising, or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material.
- B. Every conference report shall be accompanied by a detailed statement sufficiently explicit to inform the Senate what effect such amendments or propositions, if any, will have upon the measure to which they relate. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk a reasonable time before consideration of the report. The presentation of reports of committees of conference shall always be in order, except when the Journal is being read or a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending, or while the Senate is dividing; and when received the question of proceedings to the consideration of the report, if raised, shall be immediately put, and shall be determined without debate.
- C. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.
- D. A Free Conference Committee report on a bill which includes conference amendments may, upon the filing of the report in the Secretary of the Senate's office, be reassigned by the President to the Committee on Rules. If assigned to the Committee on Rules, the Committee on Rules shall consider such report for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of conference amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- 1. The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- 2. The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - 3. The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- 4. The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- E. Except as provided herein, conference committees shall consider a bill prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No conference committee shall meet to consider a bill after such time without the written permission of the President.

#### RULE 24 Parliamentary Practice and Procedure

Parliamentary practice and procedure in the Senate shall take precedence in the order listed:

- 1. Constitutional provisions.
- 2. Senate Rules.
- 3. Statutory rules and provisions.
- 4. The rules of parliamentary practice and procedure as contained in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.
  - 5. Senate customs and usages.
  - 6. General parliamentary law.

#### RULE 25 Privileges of the Floor

- A. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, no person except members and officers of the Senate shall have the privileges of, or be admitted to the floor of the Senate Chamber at any time; provided, that the President may grant the privileges of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the Senate, to ex-members of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and employees of the Senate. When the Senate is not in formal session, the President, upon application of a Senate Committee, may grant the use of the Chamber to such committee for a time certain for the purpose of holding committee hearings.
- B. For the purpose of addressing the membership of the Senate while in session, the President may, upon request, approve such dignitaries as:
  - 1. The President or past Presidents of the United States.
  - 2. Members of the present United States Cabinet.
- 3. Ambassadors of or to the United States, and all present United States Senators and Congressmen.
  - 4. The present Governor of Arizona.
  - 5. The present Governor or Head of any other domestic or foreign state.

All other dignitaries may be introduced from the gallery or may be granted speaking time other than when the Senate is in session.

- C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the Senate is in closed executive session or the Senate or President shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the rules of the Senate.
- D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the President of the Senate and revocable at the discretion of the President of the Senate. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the President of the Senate for a pass, and shall accompany the application with a statement of facts of the representative's press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or news gathering organization with which the representative is connected, for such pass. Not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other accredited newspaper or news gathering organization.

#### RULE 26 Legislative Representatives

- A. Any person desiring to be heard concerning legislation in behalf of any person, firm, association, organization, company or corporation shall first make application in writing to the chairman of the committee, stating the bill the person desires to present arguments upon, and whom the person represents.
- B. The chairman may issue a permit which shall give such person the right to file with the committee having under consideration the bill or legislation regarding which the permit has been issued, written or printed briefs, statements or arguments. If so notified by the committee through its chairman, the person may appear before the committee in open public hearing and present arguments and testimony at the pleasure of the committee. Chairmen of committees shall, on request, give information regarding the holding of public hearings, and the time and place of the same, and committees may hold such public hearings as they desire.

#### RULE 27 Length of Session

- A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The President may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period of not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by the Senate by a majority vote of the members present.
- B. If not considered in the regular session the General Appropriations bill, the General Capital Outlay bill and the University Capital Outlay bill may be considered in a special session which shall be called only for those purposes.

#### RULE 28 Amendment of Rules; Suspension of Rules

- A. The Senate Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the Senate.
- B. The Senate Rules may be suspended by a vote of a majority of the members present.

#### RULE 29 Code of Ethics; ETHICS COMPLAINTS

#### A. No member shall:

- 1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person any personal financial benefit, including any gift, for himself or another upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.
- 2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.
- 3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.
- 4. Enter into any contract with a public agency for the sale of goods or services or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity for the sale of goods or services, unless:
- (a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars, or
- (b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or
- (c) The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or
- (d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to article IV, part 2, section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.
- 5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.
- 6. Participate in any action of the Senate if the member has a substantial interest as defined in section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes.

- B. For the purposes of this rule:
- 1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.
- 2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.
- 3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.
- 4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.
- 5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.
- C. THE SENATE ETHICS COMMITTEE SHALL ONLY RECEIVE ETHICS COMPLAINTS THAT HAVE BEEN SIGNED BY A SENATOR AND NOTARIZED.

#### RULE 30 Personal Financial Interest

- A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:
- 1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and
- 2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such statement shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.
- B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the Senate is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.
- C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall, in addition to the requirements of subsection A, state his decision and the underlying reasons therefor and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body.
- D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than five days from the date of the receipt of that request and be filed with the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such opinion shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.

### E. For the purposes of this rule:

1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any bill, resolution, memorial, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the Senate.

- 2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.
- F. A member who has a substantial interest as defined by section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes, shall comply with title 38, chapter 3, article 8, Arizona Revised Statutes.

#### RULE 31 Caucuses

All meetings of a party caucus consisting of members of the Senate shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the Senate and meetings to discuss matters, including those permitted in executive session as set forth in section 38-431.03, Arizona Revised Statutes. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening party caucuses.

#### RULE 32 PROCEDURE ON RECORDS RETENTION AND DESTRUCTION SCHEDULE

A. DEFINITIONS. IN THIS SECTION THE FOLLOWING DEFINITIONS APPLY:

"BILL FILE" MEANS A FILE CONTAINING MATERIALS RELATING TO LEGISLATION AS DETERMINED BY THE SENATE SECRETARY.

"CUSTODIAN" MEANS ANY LEGISLATOR, LEGISLATIVE STAFF MEMBER, LEGISLATIVE INTERN, OR LEGISLATIVE CONTRACTOR WHO HAS PRIMARY CUSTODY AND CONTROL OVER A RECORD.

"PERSONNEL RECORDS" MEANS AN EMPLOYEE'S OFFICIAL RECORD AND DOCUMENTATION OF THE EMPLOYEE'S EMPLOYMENT.

"RECORD" MEANS ALL BOOKS, PAPERS, MAPS, PHOTOGRAPHS OR OTHER DOCUMENTARY MATERIALS, REGARDLESS OF PHYSICAL FORM OR CHARACTERISTICS, INCLUDING PRINTS OR COPIES OF SUCH ITEMS PRODUCED OR REPRODUCED ON FILM OR ELECTRONIC MEDIA, MADE OR RECEIVED IN PURSUANCE OF LAW OR IN CONNECTION WITH THE TRANSACTION OF PUBLIC OR LEGISLATIVE BUSINESS AND OVER WHICH THE CUSTODIAN HAS CUSTODY AND CONTROL AND THAT IS PRESERVED OR APPROPRIATE FOR PRESERVATION BY THE SENATE AS EVIDENCE OF THE ORGANIZATION, FUNCTIONS, POLICIES, DECISIONS, PROCEDURES, OPERATIONS OR OTHER ACTIVITIES OF THE CUSTODIAN, OR BECAUSE OF THE INFORMATIONAL AND HISTORICAL VALUE OF DATA CONTAINED IN THE RECORD.

"REFERENCE VALUE" MEANS ADMINISTRATIVE, LEGAL, FISCAL, RESEARCH, OR HISTORICAL VALUE AS REASONABLY DETERMINED BY THE CUSTODIAN.

"STATE LIBRARY, ARCHIVES AND PUBLIC RECORDS (LAPR)" MEANS THE DIVISION OF THE ARIZONA SECRETARY OF STATE THAT IS THE ARCHIVES FOR ARIZONA STATE GOVERNMENT, WHICH IS MANDATED BY LAW TO COLLECT, PRESERVE AND MAKE AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC AND ALL BRANCHES OF GOVERNMENT, PERMANENT PUBLIC RECORDS, HISTORICAL MANUSCRIPTS, PHOTOGRAPHS, AND OTHER MATERIALS THAT CONTRIBUTE TO THE UNDERSTANDING OF ARIZONA HISTORY.

B. AUTHORITY. AZ. CONST. ART. IV, PART 2, § 8 AUTHORIZES THE LEGISLATURE TO DETERMINE ITS OWN RULES OF PROCEDURE WHICH SUPERSEDE ANY CONFLICTING STATUTES.

#### C. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

- 1. PERMANENT RECORDS. AS SET FORTH BELOW, AT THE END OF THE RETENTION PERIOD WITH THE LEGISLATURE, THE SENATE SECRETARY OR THE SENATE SECRETARY'S DESIGNEE MUST TRANSFER TO LAPR ALL RECORDS KEPT BY THE SENATE SECRETARY, REGARDLESS OF FORMAT, THAT HAVE A RETENTION PERIOD DESIGNATED AS PERMANENT, UNLESS OTHERWISE INSTRUCTED BY LAPR. THE SENATE SECRETARY SHALL WORK WITH LAPR'S ESTABLISHED REQUIREMENTS FOR TRANSFER.
- 2. ELECTRONIC RECORDS. AT THE END OF THE RETENTION PERIOD SET FORTH BELOW, THE CUSTODIAN SHALL DESTROY ELECTRONIC ITEMS NOT DESIGNATED AS HAVING A RETENTION PERIOD OF PERMANENT.
- 3. PAPER FILES, RECORDS, AND DOCUMENTS. AT THE END OF THE RETENTION PERIOD SET FORTH BELOW, THE SENATE SECRETARY MAY DESTROY FILES THAT ARE PRIMARILY IN PAPER FORMAT AND MAY DESTROY OTHER RECORDS, REGARDLESS OF FORMAT, NOT DESIGNATED AS HAVING A RETENTION PERIOD OF PERMANENT.
- 4. NO DUTY TO MIGRATE TO NEW TECHNOLOGY. THE SENATE SECRETARY IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR MIGRATING TO NEW TECHNOLOGY ANY RECORD THAT IS RECORDED IN A FORMAT, SUCH AS CD AND DVD THAT MUST BE READ BY A COMPUTER.
- 5. DESTRUCTION OF NON-PERMANENT RECORDS. WHEN A PAPER RECORD IS ELIGIBLE FOR DESTRUCTION, THE CUSTODIAN SHALL TAKE PROPER PRECAUTIONS TO DESTROY THE ENTIRE FILE, RECORD, OR DOCUMENT BY SHREDDING, BURNING, OR PULVERIZING IT. ELECTRONIC RECORDS SHALL BE DELETED FROM ALL ELECTRONIC REPOSITORIES IN WHICH THEY RESIDE, INCLUDING SERVERS AND HARD DRIVES. THE CUSTODIAN MAY KEEP A LIST, CONTAINING MINIMAL INFORMATION, CAPTURING ANY DESTROYED ITEMS, SO THAT THE CUSTODIAN KNOWS THAT IT HAS BEEN DESTROYED AND HAS NOT BEEN MERELY MISPLACED OR NEVER EXISTED.
- 6. PRIVATE ELECTRONIC DEVICES. AN ELECTRONIC MESSAGE SOLELY SENT OR RECEIVED ON AND MAINTAINED ON A PRIVATE ELECTRONIC DEVICE OF ANY LEGISLATOR, LEGISLATIVE STAFF MEMBER, LEGISLATIVE INTERN, OR LEGISLATIVE CONTRACTOR IS NOT SUBJECT TO PUBLIC INSPECTION.
- 7. EFFECTIVE DATE. THE PROVISIONS OF THIS RULE ARE APPLICABLE TO FILES, RECORDS, AND DOCUMENTS CREATED BEFORE OR AFTER THE ADOPTION OF THIS RULE.
- D. INTERPRETATION AND ENFORCEMENT. THE MAINTENANCE, PRESERVATION AND DESTRUCTION OF RECORDS WILL BE GOVERNED SOLELY AND EXCLUSIVELY BY THE PROVISIONS OF THIS RULE. ANY QUESTIONS OR DISPUTES CONCERNING THE APPLICATION OF THIS RULE TO ANY SPECIFIC RECORD OR SUBSET OF RECORDS WILL BE RESOLVED BY THE PRESIDENT, WHOSE DETERMINATION WILL BE FINAL. THE PROVISIONS OF THIS RULE WILL BE ENFORCED SOLELY AND EXCLUSIVELY BY THE SENATE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE RULES OF THE ARIZONA SENATE.
- E. RETENTION AND DISPOSITION SCHEDULE. THE FOLLOWING RECORDS RETENTION PERIODS ARE FINITE AND ABSOLUTE. THEY ARE NOT MINIMUM RETENTION PERIODS OR GUIDELINES. RECORDS MAY BE KEPT BEYOND THEIR DESIGNATED RETENTION PERIODS ONLY IF THEY ARE RELEVANT TO ANY (I) ONGOING ADMINISTRATIVE OR LITIGATION PROCEEDING IN WHICH THE SENATE OR THE CUSTODIAN IS A PARTY OR THE RECIPIENT OF A THIRD PARTY SUBPOENA OR (2) PENDING OR PROSPECTIVE ADMINISTRATIVE OR LITIGATION PROCEEDING IN WHICH THE SENATE OR THE CUSTODIAN REASONABLY ANTICIPATES IT MAY BECOME A PARTY, OR IF THE CUSTODIAN BELIEVES THE RECORD HAS CONTINUING REFERENCE VALUE.

She went on to attend Nogales High School-Class of 1974 and received her GED Diploma at Mesa Community College in 1975. After receiving her GED Diploma, Suzie took general courses at Pima and Mesa Community College and studied Business Management at the University of Phoenix; and

WHEREAS, Suzie began working at the County Assessor's Office as a Personal Appraiser in February of 1980 up to May 1994. While employed at the County Assessor's, she was certified as a Real and Personal Property Appraiser by the International Association of Assessing Officers and the Arizona Department of Revenue in Basic Residential, Land, Mobile Homes & Personal Property Appraisal. She worked in the Assessor's office for 14 and ½ years; and

WHEREAS, Suzie resigned from the Assessor's Office to run for Santa Cruz County Recorder. She was elected as County Recorder in November of 1994 and sworn in as Santa Cruz County Recorder in January of 1995. She was Certified as an Election Officer by the Arizona Secretary of State and she continued to attend full courses for re-certification every two years. #### ADOPTION OF RULES

Majority Leader Borrelli moved the proposed amendments to Senate Rules 7-A and 7-B, Paragraph 4 as distributed, be adopted.

Majority Leader Borrelli moved that the Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature, as amended, be adopted as the Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature. The motion carried.

The Secretary recorded the action.

## SENATE RULES

## RULE 1 Officers and Employees

- A. The officers of the Senate shall be a President, who shall be chosen from among the membership of the Senate, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and a Sergeant at Arms.
- B. There shall be such other employees as may be authorized by the Senate. The appointment, terms and conditions of employment, compensation, discipline, and discharge of employees of the Senate shall be determined by the President, subject to the approval of the Senate. Employees of the Senate are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employees.

### RULE 2 The President

The President shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. The President shall take the chair on every legislative day precisely at the hour to which the Senate, at its last sitting, adjourned; immediately call the members to order and on the appearance of a quorum, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read.
- B. The President shall have control of the Senate Chamber, including seating assignments of members therein, all other parts of the Senate wing and all other areas and buildings used exclusively by the Senate.
  - C. The President shall preserve and maintain order and decorum.
- D. The President shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the Senate, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by permission of the Senate.
- E. The President shall state all questions in the proper order in which they shall be disposed.
- F. When a question is undebatable or when debate on a question is closed, the President shall state the question, calling first for the "Ayes" and then for the "Noes". If the President is in doubt, or a division is called for, the Senate shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and then those in the negative. But on demand of two members a roll call of the Ayes and Noes shall be ordered at any time before such vote is made certain and declared.
- G. The President shall have the right to vote, and on all questions the President shall vote last.
- H. The President shall have the right to name any member as President Pro Tempore to serve at the President's request, which appointment may extend throughout the session unless terminated by the Senate. The President may appoint any other member as temporary President Pro Tempore to serve for a limited period of time. In the absence or omission of such an appointment, the Senate shall proceed to elect a President Pro Tempore to act during the absence of the President.
- I. The President shall appoint all standing committees, and all select committees unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present, and shall appoint the chairman and vice-chairman of each such committee. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, but shall not vote or sign reports from any committee except the committees of which the President is chairman. However, if the President is an appointed member of the Rules Committee, the President shall be a voting member of that committee. The President shall fill all vacancies on committees.
- J. The President shall refer all proposed measures or other legislative matters to the appropriate committees. Every bill, resolution and memorial shall be referred by the President to one or more standing committees, except resolutions or memorials to be adopted by unanimous consent and House bills to be substituted on third reading pursuant to Rule 11-H. All proposed measures or other legislative matters shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee without action upon the part of the President. If three-fifths or more of the members of the Senate petition the President to discharge committees from further consideration of a bill, resolution or memorial, the measure shall be withdrawn by the President from assigned committees which have not reported the measure. If a committee hearing has not been held on the measure, the President shall direct that a hearing be held by a committee within seven days and upon withdrawal or hearing, the matter shall be placed by the President on the active calendar of the Committee of the Whole. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole, it shall be placed by the President on the third reading calendar. If a discharge petition is presented to the President less than seven days before the Senate adjourns sine die, the President shall not be required to act upon the petition.

- K. All debts incurred by the Senate, either during session or between sessions of the legislature, shall be subject to approval by the President and if so approved shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division of the Department of Administration.
- L. The office of the President shall keep the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and attaches, and shall maintain these records for inspection by the membership.
- M. The President is authorized to call meetings of standing committees of the Senate during periods when the Senate is not in session, and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance.
- N. The President is authorized to bring or assert in any forum on behalf of the Senate any claim or right arising out of any injury to the Senate's powers or duties under the constitution or laws of this state.

## RULE 3 The Secretary

The Secretary shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a Journal of each day's proceedings, and to provide a typewritten copy of the same for examination by the President. The Secretary shall each day prepare a calendar of the Orders and Business of the Day and a like calendar for the Committee of the Whole, and such other dockets and calendars as may be ordered, and shall cause a copy to be placed on the desk of each member, at or before the hour of convening.
- B. The Secretary shall have the custody of all bills, resolutions, memorials, petitions, communications, or other measures, instruments and papers introduced in or submitted to the Senate, subject to such disposition thereof as may be provided by the rules of the Senate or the order of the President, and shall be held strictly accountable for the safekeeping of the same. The Secretary shall keep a record of all such measures or instruments, showing at all times the exact standing of each.
- C. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be required of the Secretary by the Senate or by the President.
- D. The Assistant Secretary shall act under the direction of the Secretary and in the absence of the Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary.

## RULE 4 Sergeant at Arms

The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to attend the Senate and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings, to maintain order under the direction of the President or Chairman, to execute the commands of the Senate, and all processes issued by authority thereof, directed to the Sergeant at Arms by the Presiding Officer. Five minutes before the hour of the meeting of the Senate each day the Sergeant at Arms shall see that the floor is cleared of all persons, except those privileged to remain.
- B. The Sergeant at Arms shall enforce the rules relating to the privileges of the floor and gallery, and perform such other duties as may be required of the Sergeant at Arms by the Senate or by the President.

#### RULE 5 Members

- A. Every member shall be present within the Senate Chamber during its sittings, unless excused or necessarily prevented; and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question as set forth in Rule 30, or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 15.
- B. No Senator shall voluntarily be absent from the service of the Senate without leave of the President.

## RULE 6 Questions of Privilege

Questions of privilege shall be: First, Privilege of the Senate, which relates to the privilege and rights of the Senate collectively, its organization, safety, dignity, comfort and the integrity of its proceedings; second, Personal Privilege, which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of the members individually in their representative capacity only; third, Personal Privilege which relates to matters personal to the members which may be received only by permission of the Senate or the Presiding Officer. Questions of privilege shall have precedence over all other questions, except motions to adjourn or recess, or the call of the Senate when no quorum is present.

#### RULE 7 Committees

- A. Standing Committees of the Senate shall consist of the following:
- 1. Appropriations
- 2. Commerce
- 3. DIRECTOR NOMINATIONS
- 3. 4. Education
- 4. 5. Elections
- 5. 6. Finance
- 6. 7. Government
- 7. 8. Health and Human Services
- 8. 9. Judiciary
- 9. 10. Military Affairs, Public Safety and Border Security
- 10. 11. Natural Resources, Energy and Water
- 11. 12. Rules
- 12. 13. Transportation and Technology
- B. Committees of the Senate except the Rules Committee shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. The first Senator named on a committee shall be the chairman thereof; the second shall be the vice-chairman. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall have all the powers and duties of the chairman.
- 2. The Ethics Committee and each standing committee shall adopt rules of procedure consistent with the rules of the Senate. Committee rules shall require that the chairman vote last on a roll call vote. Committee rules may allow the vice-chairman to vote second to last on a roll call vote.
- 3. All committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as the proper decorum is maintained.
- 4. All committees EXCEPT THE COMMITTEE ON DIRECTOR NOMINATIONS will meet at regularly scheduled times and places. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice-chairman some other committee member designated by the President shall preside. Special meetings may be called at the option of the chairman. However, such meetings shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. Regularly scheduled meetings can be cancelled or rescheduled only with the permission of the President.

- 5. A written agenda for each regular or special meeting containing all bills, memorials and resolutions to be considered thereat shall be distributed to each member of the committee and to the Secretary of the Senate at least five days prior to the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. The action taken on every bill, memorial or resolution on the committee agenda shall be reported to the Secretary of the Senate at the conclusion of the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the chairman to deliver the committee report for each bill, memorial or resolution that has been voted out of committee to the Secretary of the Senate as soon as the committee amendment is prepared. If there is no amendment, the committee report shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day following the day the committee meeting adjourns.
- 6. A bill not on the chairman's agenda shall be scheduled by the chairman for discussion and committee action at the next subsequent committee meeting upon presentation to the chairman of a petition to schedule the bill, and upon filing a copy thereof with the Secretary of the Senate. A petition to schedule the bill must be signed by at least two-thirds of the members of the committee.
- 7. A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of any matter referred to it.
- 8. The consent of all of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a majority of committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members present on a committee shall be necessary to report any bill or other measure or matter referred to such committee. If a member opposes the report, he may file a minority report. A minority report shall bear the signature of any number of members joining in its recommendations and shall be considered the recommendations merely of the member or members signing the same.
- 9. Amendments proposed by a committee shall be clearly set forth as an attachment to the committee's report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. If the committee has adopted a rule addressing the submission of amendments to committee members, the chairman may preclude the offering of an amendment which does not comply with the rule, may without objection accept the amendment, or may postpone action on the measure until adequate notice has been given. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an amendment has been given by 5:00 p.m. two days, excluding Saturdays and Sundays, prior to the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by delivering a copy of the proposed amendment to the office of each member of the committee and to the information desk and posting such notice and leaving a copy in the office of the Senate Secretary. The committee report shall be accompanied by a copy of any measure to which amendments are proposed to the committee.
- 10. A roll call vote shall be taken of the committee members at the request of a committee member upon any motion or amendment.
- 11. Except as provided herein, all Senate bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. Except as provided herein, all House bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall hear a bill in violation of this paragraph without the written permission of the President.
- 12. All bills, memorials or resolutions referred to a standing committee shall be reported. Bills, memorials or resolutions which the committee has considered but on which no action has been taken and bills, memorials and resolutions which the committee has not considered shall be reported as such by the chairman of each standing committee at the last regular or special meeting of such committee for each session.

- C. The Rules Committee of the Senate shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. All powers and duties of other standing committees of the Senate listed in subsection B of this rule except those powers and duties inconsistent with this subsection.
- 2. On the first day following the convening of the first regular session of each Legislature, the President shall appoint the members of the Committee on Rules, and the said committee shall henceforth have authority to present proposed changes or additions to the rules which upon adoption by the Senate shall be deemed standing rules of the Senate.
- 3. The written agenda for the Rules Committee shall be the calendar for the Committee of the Whole. All other legislative matters shall be in order before the Rules Committee without written agenda.
- 4. Amendments proposed by the Rules Committee should be clearly set forth as an attachment to the Rules Committee report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. Substantive amendments may be proposed by the Rules Committee only with the concurrence of the sponsor of a bill if sponsored by an individual or the committee chairman if sponsored by a committee. Corrective or technical amendments may be proposed. A proposed technical or corrective amendment which incidentally affects the substance of a bill or amendment shall require concurrence of the sponsor. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be offered in the Rules Committee.
- 5. The Committee on Rules shall consider the bill and proposed amendments thereto for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of any amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- (a) The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- (b) The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - (c) The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- (d) The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- (e) The bill is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.
- 6. In addition to the powers and duties given to the Rules Committee elsewhere in the Senate Rules, the Rules Committee shall have such other powers and duties over legislative matters as are assigned by the President.
- D. Any subcommittee of a standing committee may meet at any time upon the call of the subcommittee chairman without written notice, providing, however, that such meeting shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. A subcommittee may, without distributing a written agenda, consider any matter assigned to the subcommittee by the chairman of the standing committee.

### RULE 8 Calendars

- A. There shall be the following calendars of business reported from committees:
- 1. A calendar of the Committee of the Whole, upon which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported by the standing or select committees, except the Rules Committee, to which they have been referred and all bills, resolutions and memorials which have failed in Committee of the Whole, or which have been retained on the calendar. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be prepared and filed in writing with the Secretary of the Senate.
- 2. An active calendar of the Committee of the Whole on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President that have been reported by the Rules Committee and that are drawn from the calendar of the Committee of the Whole on the order of business of the day.
- 3. A unanimous consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the Chairman of the Rules Committee and drawn from all bills, resolutions and memorials on the calendar of the Committee of the Whole that are unamended as reported by all standing committees to which they were referred. The unanimous consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest the inclusion of any bill, resolution or memorial on the unanimous consent calendar by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the unanimous consent calendar and return it to the calendar of the Committee of the Whole; provided, however, that a bill shall not be removed from the consent calendar for the purpose of proposing a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment. Bills, resolutions or memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar shall be placed on the Senate calendar.
- 4. A COW consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from amended measures reported out of all committees to which they were referred with zero "no" votes. The COW consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest any measure being subject to group motion and adoption of all committee amendments by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar. Additionally, the filing of a floor amendment with the Secretary of the Senate shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar. The President may remove a bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar at any time. Subject to Rule 17-K, the bills, resolutions, or memorials remaining on the COW consent calendar and passed will then be placed on the third reading calendar.
- 5. A Senate calendar on which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported with a "do pass" or "do pass amended" recommendation by the Committee of the Whole and all bills, resolutions and memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar pursuant to paragraph 3.
- 6. An active Senate calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from the Senate calendar for consideration by the Senate on the order of business for the day.
- B. Measures shall be reported by the Committee of the Whole in the order and manner in which disposed of by that committee, and those approved shall be placed upon the Senate calendar for third reading in the order established by the President, and retained on the Senate calendar until finally disposed of.

#### RULE 9 Decorum and Debate

- A. When a Senator desires to speak, the Senator shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until the Senator is recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address the Presiding Officer. No Senator shall interrupt another Senator in debate without the Senator's consent, and to obtain such consent, the Senator shall first address the Presiding Officer.
- B. The Senator who sponsors a measure, or the Senator's designee, shall have the right to open and close debate on such measure.
- C. No Senator in debate shall, directly or indirectly, by any form of words, impute to another Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.
- D. If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall call the Senator to order; and when called to order the Senator shall sit down and not proceed without leave of the Presiding Officer or upon motion adopted by the Senate, that the Senator be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.
- E. If a Senator be called to order for words spoken in debate, the exceptionable words shall, upon the demand of any Senator, be taken down in writing, and read at the table for the information of the Senate.
- F. While the Presiding Officer is putting a question or addressing the Senate, no member shall walk out of or across the Chamber, nor, when a member is speaking, pass between the member and the Chair; nor remain by the Secretary's desk during the call of the roll for the counting of ballots; and the Sergeant at Arms is charged with the strict enforcement of this clause.

## RULE 10 Roll Call and Quorum

- A. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by the surname, except when two or more have the same surname, in which case the district designation shall be added; and after the roll has been once called, the Secretary shall call in their alphabetical order the names of those not voting or who failed to respond.
  - B. A majority of the Senators elected shall constitute a quorum.
- C. If, at any time during a session of the Senate, a question shall be raised by any Senator as to the presence of a quorum, the President shall forthwith direct the Secretary to call the roll and shall announce the result, and these proceedings shall be without debate.
- D. Whenever it shall be ascertained that a quorum is not present a majority of the Senators present may order a call of the Senate, which order shall be determined without debate, and pending its execution, and until a quorum shall be present, no debate or other motion, except to adjourn, shall be in order. Upon approval of the order to call the Senate, the President shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to request, and, when necessary, to compel the attendance of the absent Senators.
- E. When a quorum is present, a call of the Senate may be ordered by the President or by a majority of the members present to compel the attendance of the absent members. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate are present.
- F. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 11 Motions

- A. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- B. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of Ayes and Noes, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Senate.
- C. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- D. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order, and it shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by way of a substitute amendment.
- E. A question or an amendment containing two or more distinct and separate subjects may be divided upon the demand of any member. A motion to strike out and insert words, both relating to the same subject, and together accomplishing a single change in meaning, is indivisible.
- F. When motions are made for reference of a subject to a select committee, or to a standing committee, the question of a standing committee shall be put first. A motion simply to refer shall not be open to amendment, except to add instructions.
- G. Any motion improperly used for the purpose of delaying or obstructing business is a dilatory motion and may be ruled out of order by the Presiding Officer.
- H. A motion to substitute a House bill for a Senate bill on third reading shall not be in order unless the Senate bill for which substitution is sought is identical to the House bill.

#### RULE 12 Previous Question (Vote Immediately)

When the previous question is moved, adopted and ordered, it shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been ordered. The previous question may be moved with reference to a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the rules, or an amendment or amendments, or may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order, however, pending the motion for, or after the previous question shall have been ordered, for a motion to be made to commit or to recommit, with or without instructions, to a standing or select committee.

#### RULE 13 Reconsideration

A. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a recorded vote, any Senator who voted on the prevailing side may on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter move a reconsideration. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a non-recorded vote, any Senator may, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, move a reconsideration. If the Senate shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no other motion to reconsider the question shall be in order unless by unanimous consent. A motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present, and a motion to lay it on the table shall not be in order. If the motion to reconsider passes, the question reconsidered shall be determined at such time as the President directs.

B. When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been sent to the House of Representatives, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon first, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider. If the motion to request return passes, the motion to reconsider cannot be considered until the question or measure is returned to the Senate by the House.

# RULE 14 Bills, Resolutions, Memorials, Engrossed Copies and Amendments

- A. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced by a member or a committee by presenting the original and three copies of such bill, resolution or memorial, unless additional copies are ordered by the President, to the office of the Secretary prior to 3:00 p.m. of the day immediately preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated.
  - B. A bill introduced in the Senate may be cosponsored by House members.
- C. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced during the first 22 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.
- D. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the certification of election of members by the Secretary of State until the first day of the first regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's Proclamation until the first day of the special session, provided the bill, resolution or memorial is germane to the call. A bill, resolution or memorial shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials prefiled for introduction pursuant to this rule may be first read on the first day of the session. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill, resolution or memorial at the time of prefiling.
- E. The original of a bill, resolution or memorial introduced in the Senate shall be designated by brown backing, endorsed "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Secretary. The chairman of each committee to which a bill, resolution or memorial is referred shall receive one copy endorsed "Committee Copy". Subsequent copies shall be endorsed and distributed as the President directs.
- F. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, a sufficient number of copies of any bill, resolution or memorial shall be duplicated.
- G. All bills prepared for introduction which propose to amend existing statutes shall show the new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case), lined through. New language to be added to the statutes shall be in capital letters (upper case).
- H. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and each page of the original and two copies shall be stamped with the blind embossed stamp of the Senate. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original Senate engrossed copy shall have a red backing. An engrossed measure ready for the third or final reading shall not be subject to amendment.

- I. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, the Senate shall provide the House and the Legislative Council with a sufficient number of copies of each amended engrossed Senate measure with a cover page or pages showing the page and line number of each adopted Senate amendment thereto. For Senate amendments to House measures the same number of copies shall be provided but may consist only of those pages containing the adopted Senate amendments and cover page or pages showing the page and line number of such Senate amendment. For unamended Senate measures the same number of cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.
- J. All bills, resolutions, memorials and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper,  $8\ 1/2$ " x 11" shall be used.
- K. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendments to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines . . . . through . . . .". If everything after the enacting clause is stricken the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause".

## RULE 15 Voting

- A. When the Ayes and Noes are ordered, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically, and each Senator shall without debate, declare the Senator's assent or dissent to the question, unless the Senator declares a personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the Senate, and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Presiding Officer, but may for sufficient reason change the Senator's vote prior to such announcement. No motion to suspend this rule shall be in order, nor shall the Presiding Officer entertain any request to suspend by unanimous consent.
- B. When a Senator declines to vote on the second call of the Senator's name, the Senator shall be required to assign the Senator's reasons therefor. If the reason assigned is other than a personal financial interest in the question or a substantial interest as defined in the statutory code which is not a personal financial interest in the question, the Presiding Officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator for the reasons assigned by the Senator, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate; and these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.
- C. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 15.1 Electronic Roll Call System

- A. In all cases where a rule of the Senate refers to "roll call", "roll call vote" or "recorded vote", such reference shall be understood to refer also to the taking of the vote by an electronic roll call system.
- B. When taking attendance or recording the Ayes and Noes on any question to be voted upon, the electronic roll call system shall be used, unless it is inoperative, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules. This rule may be suspended by a majority of the members present in which case the roll shall be called in accordance with Rule 10.
- C. When the Senate is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call and the vote is to be taken by the electronic roll call system, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "You have heard the (motion or third or final reading) of (the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote no. The system is now open. The Senate will now proceed to vote."
- D. If a Senator declines to vote, the Senator shall state the reasons therefor as required by Rule 15-B and the system shall not be closed until every Senator who is present has voted, explained the reason for not voting or been excused from voting.

- E. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "Have all the Senators voted? The system will now be closed. The system is now closed. The Secretary will now record the vote."
- F. A Senator may change his vote after the roll call system has been closed and before announcement of the result, and not thereafter.
- G. The Secretary of the Senate shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall confirm the result to the Presiding Officer, who shall announce the same to the Senate. The Secretary shall enter the vote in the Journal.
- H. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member.
- I. When a vote is being taken by the electronic roll call system, this rule supersedes any provision in the Senate Rules inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 16 Order of Business

- A. Unless otherwise ordered, the Senate shall convene every legislative day at a time certain as determined by the President, receive a prayer by the chaplain, recite the pledge of allegiance and continue in session until recess or adjournment.
  - B. The order of business shall be as follows:

Roll Call
Reading of the Journal
Business on the President's Desk
Petitions, Memorials, and Remonstrances
Orders of the Day
Introduction and First Reading of Bills
Reference of Bills
Second Reading of Bills
Reports of Standing Committees
Reports of Select Committees
Committee of the Whole
Report of the Committee of the Whole
Third Reading of Bills
Other Business of the Senate

- C. The President shall, upon each day, announce to the Senate the business in order, agreeable to the order of business contained in subsection B of this rule; and no business shall be taken up or considered until the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order, nor after the order to which it belongs is closed, except by order of the Senate. All questions relating to the order of business shall be decided by a majority of the members present without debate.
- D. Every bill shall be read by sections on three different days, unless two-thirds of the Senate deem it expedient to dispense with this rule. The vote on the final passage of any bill or joint resolution shall be taken by Ayes and Noes on roll call. Final passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the Senate.
- E. The Presiding Officer shall give notice at each reading, whether it be the first, second or third reading, and a Journal entry of the same shall be made by the Secretary.

### RULE 17 Committee of the Whole; Additional Committee of the Whole

- A. In forming a Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside. The chairman so appointed shall preserve and maintain order.
- B. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken up in regular order, or in such order as the committee may determine by a suspension of the rules, unless the order of the bill to be considered was determined by the Senate at the time of going into committee, but bills for raising revenue and the general appropriations bill shall have precedence.
- C. A majority of the members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.
- D. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole so far as applicable.
- E. In the Committee of the Whole, bills and resolutions shall be read by the Secretary and considered item by item, unless otherwise ordered by the committee, leaving preambles or titles to be last considered. The body of a bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but amendments shall be noted by the chairman or Secretary upon a separate piece of paper and reported to the Senate.
- F. The proceedings of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken down by the Secretary of the Senate, acting as the Secretary of the Committee of the Whole. The chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall in the chairman's report set forth all actions of the Committee of the Whole.
- G. When a bill or resolution is considered in the Committee of the Whole, the only regular motions which are in order are the following:
  - 1. To propose amendments.
  - 2. To limit debate.
  - 3. To recommend.
  - 4. To rise and report.
  - 5. That the bill or resolution retain its place on the calendar.
  - 6. That the bill or resolution be retained on the calendar.
- H. A roll call vote shall be taken when a motion to recommend is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.
- I. No proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.
- J. A motion to amend the Committee of the Whole report shall not be in order unless the proposed amendment to the report has been voted on in the Committee of the Whole.
- K. The Senate may by a majority vote of the members present bring a bill, memorial or resolution otherwise designated as available for third reading to Committee of the Whole for amendment or further amendment, except no proposed amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material is in order.

## RULE 18 Sitting as in Committee of the Whole

The Senate may by majority vote of the members present sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of any subject except if the subject is a bill, memorial or resolution which has been considered in Committee of the Whole, the consideration shall be limited to technical changes.

#### RULE 19 Journals

- A. The proceedings of the Senate and of the Committee of the Whole shall be briefly and accurately stated in the Journal. Titles of all bills, resolutions and measures, and such parts as shall be affected by proposed amendments, readings, references, reports and every vote, motion and roll call, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial or paper presented to the Senate shall be entered on the Journal.
- B. All confidential legislative and executive proceedings and the proceedings when sitting as a Court of Impeachment, shall be recorded in a separate book.
- C. The protest or remarks of any Senator and reasons therefor shall be entered on the Journal, if presented in writing, but no protest or remarks shall exceed two hundred words in length without the consent of the Senate.

## RULE 20 Proceedings on Nominations

- A. When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State to the Senate, they shall, unless otherwise ordered, be referred to appropriate committees, and a standing committee. If the nomination is referred to the Rules Committee, the committee, upon consideration, may recommend to the President that the nomination be further referred to another standing committee or may place the nomination on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate. If the Rules Committee recommends that the nomination shall be placed on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate, the Rules Committee recommendation shall be dated and placed on each member's desk. If a member wishes during the first seven calendar days after action by the Rules Committee to object to the inclusion of the nomination without a hearing by a standing committee other than the Rules Committee, the member may do so by filing a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the seven day period. If a protest is filed, the President shall remove the nomination from the list and assign the nomination to an appropriate standing committee other than the Rules Committee. No nomination placed upon the list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate shall be considered by the Senate until said nomination has remained on the list for seven calendar days. When a nomination is brought before the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put on the same day on which the nomination is received nor on the day on which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- B. Nominations confirmed or rejected by the Senate shall not be returned to the Governor by the Secretary until the expiration of the time limit for making a motion to reconsider the same, or while a motion to reconsider is pending, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present.

#### RULE 21 Messages

- A. Messages from the Governor of the State, or from the House of Representatives, may be received at any stage of proceedings, except while the Senate is dividing, or while the Journal is being read, or while the question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending.
- B. Messages shall be sent to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, who shall previously certify the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions and other measures which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested, and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor of the State all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to him by the Senate.

#### RULE 22 Amendments of the House

- A. Any amendment by the House to any Senate bill shall be subject to one of the following motions or actions:
  - 1. Concur in House amendment.
- 2. Refuse to concur in House amendment and appointment of Conference Committee, free or simple.
- 3. The President may refer the bill with the House amendment to a committee for study and recommendations of concurrence or refusal to concur.
- B. Any amendment by the House which includes the addition of the emergency clause shall require a two-thirds vote of the members of the Senate for final passage with the emergency clause.

#### RULE 23 Conference Committees and Reports

- A. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the bill, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising, or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material.
- B. Every conference report shall be accompanied by a detailed statement sufficiently explicit to inform the Senate what effect such amendments or propositions, if any, will have upon the measure to which they relate. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk a reasonable time before consideration of the report. The presentation of reports of committees of conference shall always be in order, except when the Journal is being read or a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending, or while the Senate is dividing; and when received the question of proceedings to the consideration of the report, if raised, shall be immediately put, and shall be determined without debate.
- C. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.
- D. A Free Conference Committee report on a bill which includes conference amendments may, upon the filing of the report in the Secretary of the Senate's office, be reassigned by the President to the Committee on Rules. If assigned to the Committee on Rules, the Committee on Rules shall consider such report for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of conference amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:

- 1. The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- 2. The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - 3. The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- 4. The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- E. Except as provided herein, conference committees shall consider a bill prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No conference committee shall meet to consider a bill after such time without the written permission of the President.

## RULE 24 Parliamentary Practice and Procedure

Parliamentary practice and procedure in the Senate shall take precedence in the order listed:

- 1. Constitutional provisions.
- 2. Senate Rules.
- 3. Statutory rules and provisions.
- 4. The rules of parliamentary practice and procedure as contained in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.
  - 5. Senate customs and usages.
  - 6. General parliamentary law.

#### RULE 25 Privileges of the Floor

- A. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, no person except members and officers of the Senate shall have the privileges of, or be admitted to the floor of the Senate Chamber at any time; provided, that the President may grant the privileges of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the Senate, to ex-members of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and employees of the Senate. When the Senate is not in formal session, the President, upon application of a Senate Committee, may grant the use of the Chamber to such committee for a time certain for the purpose of holding committee hearings.
- B. For the purpose of addressing the membership of the Senate while in session, the President may, upon request, approve such dignitaries as:
  - 1. The President or past Presidents of the United States.
  - 2. Members of the present United States Cabinet.
- 3. Ambassadors of or to the United States, and all present United States Senators and Congressmen.
  - 4. The present Governor of Arizona.
  - 5. The present Governor or Head of any other domestic or foreign state.

All other dignitaries may be introduced from the gallery or may be granted speaking time other than when the Senate is in session.

C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the Senate is in closed executive session or the Senate or President shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the rules of the Senate.

D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the President of the Senate and revocable at the discretion of the President of the Senate. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the President of the Senate for a pass, and shall accompany the application with a statement of facts of the representative's press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or news gathering organization with which the representative is connected, for such pass. Not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other accredited newspaper or news gathering organization.

### RULE 26 Legislative Representatives

- A. Any person desiring to be heard concerning legislation in behalf of any person, firm, association, organization, company or corporation shall first make application in writing to the chairman of the committee, stating the bill the person desires to present arguments upon, and whom the person represents.
- B. The chairman may issue a permit which shall give such person the right to file with the committee having under consideration the bill or legislation regarding which the permit has been issued, written or printed briefs, statements or arguments. If so notified by the committee through its chairman, the person may appear before the committee in open public hearing and present arguments and testimony at the pleasure of the committee. Chairmen of committees shall, on request, give information regarding the holding of public hearings, and the time and place of the same, and committees may hold such public hearings as they desire.

## RULE 27 Length of Session

- A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The President may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period of not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by the Senate by a majority vote of the members present.
- B. If not considered in the regular session the General Appropriations bill, the General Capital Outlay bill and the University Capital Outlay bill may be considered in a special session which shall be called only for those purposes.

### RULE 28 Amendment of Rules; Suspension of Rules

- A. The Senate Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the Senate.
  - B. The Senate Rules may be suspended by a vote of a majority of the members present.

### RULE 29 Code of Ethics; Ethics Complaints

#### A. No member shall:

- 1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person any personal financial benefit, including any gift, for himself or another upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.
- 2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.

- 3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.
- 4. Enter into any contract with a public agency for the sale of goods or services or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity for the sale of goods or services, unless:
- (a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars, or
- (b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or
- (c) The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or
- (d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to article IV, part 2, section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.
- 5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.
- 6. Participate in any action of the Senate if the member has a substantial interest as defined in section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes.
  - B. For the purposes of this rule:
- 1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.
- 2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.
- 3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.
- 4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.
- 5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.
- C. The Senate Ethics Committee shall only receive ethics complaints that have been signed by a Senator and notarized.

#### RULE 30 Personal Financial Interest

- A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:
- 1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and
- 2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such statement shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.

- B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the Senate is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.
- C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall, in addition to the requirements of subsection A, state his decision and the underlying reasons therefor and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body.
- D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than five days from the date of the receipt of that request and be filed with the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such opinion shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.

### E. For the purposes of this rule:

- 1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any bill, resolution, memorial, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the Senate.
- 2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.
- F. A member who has a substantial interest as defined by section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes, shall comply with title 38, chapter 3, article 8, Arizona Revised Statutes.

## RULE 31 Caucuses

All meetings of a party caucus consisting of members of the Senate shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the Senate and meetings to discuss matters, including those permitted in executive session as set forth in section 38-431.03, Arizona Revised Statutes. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening party caucuses.

## RULE 32 Procedure on Records Retention and Destruction Schedule

#### A. Definitions. In this section the following definitions apply:

"Bill file" means a file containing materials relating to legislation as determined by the Senate Secretary.

"Custodian" means any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern, or legislative contractor who has primary custody and control over a record.

"Personnel records" means an employee's official record and documentation of the employee's employment.

"Record" means all books, papers, maps, photographs or other documentary materials, regardless of physical form or characteristics, including prints or copies of such items produced or reproduced on film or electronic media, made or received in pursuance of law or in connection with the transaction of public or legislative business and over which the custodian has custody and control and that is preserved or appropriate for preservation by the Senate as evidence of the organization, functions, policies, decisions, procedures, operations or other activities of the custodian, or because of the informational and historical value of data contained in the record.

"Reference value" means administrative, legal, fiscal, research, or historical value as reasonably determined by the custodian.

"State Library, Archives and Public Records (LAPR)" means the division of the Arizona Secretary of State that is the archives for Arizona state government, which is mandated by law to collect, preserve and make available to the public and all branches of government, permanent public records, historical manuscripts, photographs, and other materials that contribute to the understanding of Arizona history.

B. Authority. AZ. Const. Art. IV, part 2, section 8 authorizes the legislature to determine its own rules of procedure which supersede any conflicting statutes.

#### C. General provisions.

- 1. Permanent records. As set forth below, at the end of the retention period with the legislature, the Senate Secretary or the Senate Secretary's designee must transfer to LAPR all records kept by the Senate Secretary, regardless of format, that have a retention period designated as permanent, unless otherwise instructed by LAPR. The Senate Secretary shall work with LAPR's established requirements for transfer.
- 2. Electronic records. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the custodian shall destroy electronic items not designated as having a retention period of permanent.
- 3. Paper files, records, and documents. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the Senate Secretary may destroy files that are primarily in paper format and may destroy other records, regardless of format, not designated as having a retention period of permanent.
- 4. No duty to migrate to new technology. The Senate Secretary is not responsible for migrating to new technology any record that is recorded in a format, such as CD and DVD that must be read by a computer.
- 5. Destruction of non-permanent records. When a paper record is eligible for destruction, the custodian shall take proper precautions to destroy the entire file, record, or document by shredding, burning, or pulverizing it. Electronic records shall be deleted from all electronic repositories in which they reside, including servers and hard drives. The custodian may keep a list, containing minimal information, capturing any destroyed items, so that the custodian knows that it has been destroyed and has not been merely misplaced or never existed.
- 6. Private electronic devices. An electronic message solely sent or received on and maintained on a private electronic device of any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern, or legislative contractor is not subject to public inspection.
- 7. Effective date. The provisions of this rule are applicable to files, records, and documents created before or after the adoption of this rule.
- D. Interpretation and enforcement. The maintenance, preservation and destruction of records will be governed solely and exclusively by the provisions of this rule. Any questions or disputes concerning the application of this rule to any specific record or subset of records will be resolved by the President, whose determination will be final. The provisions of this rule will be enforced solely and exclusively by the Senate in accordance with the rules of the Arizona Senate.
- E. Retention and disposition schedule. The following records retention periods are finite and absolute. They are *not* minimum retention periods or guidelines. Records may be kept beyond their designated retention periods only if they are relevant to any (1) ongoing administrative or litigation proceeding in which the Senate or the custodian is a party or the recipient of a third party subpoena or (2) pending or prospective administrative or litigation proceeding in which the Senate or the custodian reasonably anticipates it may become a party, or if the custodian believes the record has continuing reference value.

## INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF SENATE RESOLUTION 1004

Senate Resolution 1004 was introduced and read in full by Senator Miranda as follows:

A Resolution on the death of Mel J. Hannah.

Mel J. Hannah, former Flagstaff City Council and Coconino County Board of Supervisors member, passed away on January 8, 2023 at the age of 84.

Born in Winslow, Arizona, Mr. Hannah graduated from Winslow High School in 1956, where he received a music and football scholarship to Eastern Arizona College (EAC). After two years at EAC, Mr. Hannah attended Northern Arizona University, called Arizona State College (ASC) at the time, for two years and played as a member of the ASC football team.

After college, Mr. Hannah settled in Flagstaff, Arizona and worked as a member of the United States Forest Service and as the assistant director of the Northern Arizona Council of Governments, where he was involved in delivering services to low-income communities, communities of color and rural communities.

In 1973, Mr. Hannah was elected as the first African American on the Flagstaff City Council, where he served for over twelve years. After leaving the Flagstaff City Council, Mr. Hannah was elected as the first African American on the Coconino County Board of Supervisors and served for six years.

During his time in Flagstaff, Mr. Hannah served as the president of the Flagstaff Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and as vice chairman of the NAACP Arizona State Conference. After moving to Phoenix, Mr. Hannah worked for Governor Fife Symington as the assistant director of the Equal Opportunity Office and later as the director of community outreach and job development for the Greater Phoenix Urban League, which supports minority families and underserved populations by providing connections to employment, housing, job training, health care and education.

Despite the demands of his career, Mr. Hannah served as a true servant leader and chaired many civic committees in order to make his community and state a better place in which to live and work. He was proud of his involvement with establishing the Arizona African American Commission, eventually serving as a commissioner, and his service as chairman of the Arizona African American Legislative Days for 21 years.

Mr. Hannah believed "there are two important days in your life. One is the day you are born and the next one is why. And so to me, civic engagement, civic engagement, civic engagement became the answer to that why in terms of improving the quality of life for everyone. That to me has been the reason I recognize my second day."

Therefore

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona:

That the Members of the Senate express sincere regret at the passing of Mel J. Hannah and extend their deepest sympathies and condolences to his family and many friends.

Senator Miranda moved that Senate Resolution 1004 be unanimously adopted and that the Senate stand in a moment of silence in memory of Mel Hannah. The motion carried.

#### BUSINESS ON THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

### ADOPTION OF RULES

Majority Whip Kerr moved the proposed amendment to Senate Rule 7-E as distributed, be adopted. The motion carried.

Majority Whip Kerr moved that the Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature, as amended, be adopted as the Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature. The motion carried.

The Secretary recorded the action.

# SENATE RULES

# RULE 1 Officers and Employees

- A. The officers of the Senate shall be a President, who shall be chosen from among the membership of the Senate, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and a Sergeant at Arms.
- B. There shall be such other employees as may be authorized by the Senate. The appointment, terms and conditions of employment, compensation, discipline, and discharge of employees of the Senate shall be determined by the President, subject to the approval of the Senate. Employees of the Senate are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employees.

#### RULE 2 The President

The President shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. The President shall take the chair on every legislative day precisely at the hour to which the Senate, at its last sitting, adjourned; immediately call the members to order and on the appearance of a quorum, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read.
- B. The President shall have control of the Senate Chamber, including seating assignments of members therein, all other parts of the Senate wing and all other areas and buildings used exclusively by the Senate.

- C. The President shall preserve and maintain order and decorum.
- D. The President shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the Senate, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by permission of the Senate.
- E. The President shall state all questions in the proper order in which they shall be disposed.
- F. When a question is undebatable or when debate on a question is closed, the President shall state the question, calling first for the "Ayes" and then for the "Noes". If the President is in doubt, or a division is called for, the Senate shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and then those in the negative. But on demand of two members a roll call of the Ayes and Noes shall be ordered at any time before such vote is made certain and declared.
- G. The President shall have the right to vote, and on all questions the President shall vote last.
- H. The President shall have the right to name any member as President Pro Tempore to serve at the President's request, which appointment may extend throughout the session unless terminated by the Senate. The President may appoint any other member as temporary President Pro Tempore to serve for a limited period of time. In the absence or omission of such an appointment, the Senate shall proceed to elect a President Pro Tempore to act during the absence of the President.
- I. The President shall appoint all standing committees, and all select committees unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present, and shall appoint the chairman and vice-chairman of each such committee. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, but shall not vote or sign reports from any committee except the committees of which the President is chairman. However, if the President is an appointed member of the Rules Committee, the President shall be a voting member of that committee. The President shall fill all vacancies on committees.
- J. The President shall refer all proposed measures or other legislative matters to the appropriate committees. Every bill, resolution and memorial shall be referred by the President to one or more standing committees, except resolutions or memorials to be adopted by unanimous consent and House bills to be substituted on third reading pursuant to Rule 11-H. All proposed measures or other legislative matters shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee without action upon the part of the President. If three-fifths or more of the members of the Senate petition the President to discharge committees from further consideration of a bill, resolution or memorial, the measure shall be withdrawn by the President from assigned committees which have not reported the measure. If a committee hearing has not been held on the measure, the President shall direct that a hearing be held by a committee within seven days and upon withdrawal or hearing, the matter shall be placed by the President on the active calendar of the Committee of the Whole. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole, it shall be placed by the President on the third reading calendar. If a discharge petition is presented to the President less than seven days before the Senate adjourns sine die, the President shall not be required to act upon the petition.
- K. All debts incurred by the Senate, either during session or between sessions of the legislature, shall be subject to approval by the President and if so approved shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division of the Department of Administration.
- L. The office of the President shall keep the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and attaches, and shall maintain these records for inspection by the membership.
- M. The President is authorized to call meetings of standing committees of the Senate during periods when the Senate is not in session, and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance.

N. The President is authorized to bring or assert in any forum on behalf of the Senate any claim or right arising out of any injury to the Senate's powers or duties under the constitution or laws of this state.

# RULE 3 The Secretary

The Secretary shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a Journal of each day's proceedings, and to provide a typewritten copy of the same for examination by the President. The Secretary shall each day prepare a calendar of the Orders and Business of the Day and a like calendar for the Committee of the Whole, and such other dockets and calendars as may be ordered, and shall cause a copy to be placed on the desk of each member, at or before the hour of convening.
- B. The Secretary shall have the custody of all bills, resolutions, memorials, petitions, communications, or other measures, instruments and papers introduced in or submitted to the Senate, subject to such disposition thereof as may be provided by the rules of the Senate or the order of the President, and shall be held strictly accountable for the safekeeping of the same. The Secretary shall keep a record of all such measures or instruments, showing at all times the exact standing of each.
- C. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be required of the Secretary by the Senate or by the President.
- D. The Assistant Secretary shall act under the direction of the Secretary and in the absence of the Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary.

# RULE 4 Sergeant at Arms

The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to attend the Senate and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings, to maintain order under the direction of the President or Chairman, to execute the commands of the Senate, and all processes issued by authority thereof, directed to the Sergeant at Arms by the Presiding Officer. Five minutes before the hour of the meeting of the Senate each day the Sergeant at Arms shall see that the floor is cleared of all persons, except those privileged to remain.
- B. The Sergeant at Arms shall enforce the rules relating to the privileges of the floor and gallery, and perform such other duties as may be required of the Sergeant at Arms by the Senate or by the President.

#### RULE 5 Members

- A. Every member shall be present within the Senate Chamber during its sittings, unless excused or necessarily prevented; and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question as set forth in Rule 30, or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 15.
- B. No Senator shall voluntarily be absent from the service of the Senate without leave of the President.

# RULE 6 Questions of Privilege

Questions of privilege shall be: First, Privilege of the Senate, which relates to the privilege and rights of the Senate collectively, its organization, safety, dignity, comfort and the integrity of its proceedings; second, Personal Privilege, which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of the members individually in their representative capacity only; third, Personal Privilege which relates to matters personal to the members which may be received only by permission of the Senate or the Presiding Officer. Questions of privilege shall have precedence over all other questions, except motions to adjourn or recess, or the call of the Senate when no quorum is present.

# RULE 7 Committees

- A. Standing Committees of the Senate shall consist of the following:
- 1. Appropriations
- 2. Commerce
- 3. Director Nominations
- 4. Education
- 5. Elections
- 6. Finance
- 7. Government
- 8. Health and Human Services
- 9. Judiciary
- 10. Military Affairs, Public Safety and Border Security
- 11. Natural Resources, Energy and Water
- 12. Rules
- 13. Transportation and Technology
- B. Committees of the Senate except the Rules Committee shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. The first Senator named on a committee shall be the chairman thereof; the second shall be the vice-chairman. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall have all the powers and duties of the chairman.
- 2. The Ethics Committee and each standing committee shall adopt rules of procedure consistent with the rules of the Senate. Committee rules shall require that the chairman vote last on a roll call vote. Committee rules may allow the vice-chairman to vote second to last on a roll call vote.
- 3. All committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as the proper decorum is maintained.
- 4. All committees except the Committee on Director Nominations will meet at regularly scheduled times and places. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice-chairman some other committee member designated by the President shall preside. Special meetings may be called at the option of the chairman. However, such meetings shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. Regularly scheduled meetings can be cancelled or rescheduled only with the permission of the President.
- 5. A written agenda for each regular or special meeting containing all bills, memorials and resolutions to be considered thereat shall be distributed to each member of the committee and to the Secretary of the Senate at least five days prior to the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. The action taken on every bill, memorial or resolution on the committee agenda shall be reported to the Secretary of the Senate at the conclusion of the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the chairman to deliver the committee report for each bill, memorial or resolution that has been voted out of committee to the Secretary of the Senate as soon as the committee amendment is prepared. If there is no amendment, the committee report shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day following the day the committee meeting adjourns.

- 6. A bill not on the chairman's agenda shall be scheduled by the chairman for discussion and committee action at the next subsequent committee meeting upon presentation to the chairman of a petition to schedule the bill, and upon filing a copy thereof with the Secretary of the Senate. A petition to schedule the bill must be signed by at least two-thirds of the members of the committee.
- 7. A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of any matter referred to it.
- 8. The consent of all of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a majority of committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members present on a committee shall be necessary to report any bill or other measure or matter referred to such committee. If a member opposes the report, he may file a minority report. A minority report shall bear the signature of any number of members joining in its recommendations and shall be considered the recommendations merely of the member or members signing the same.
- 9. Amendments proposed by a committee shall be clearly set forth as an attachment to the committee's report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. If the committee has adopted a rule addressing the submission of amendments to committee members, the chairman may preclude the offering of an amendment which does not comply with the rule, may without objection accept the amendment, or may postpone action on the measure until adequate notice has been given. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an amendment has been given by 5:00 p.m. two days, excluding Saturdays and Sundays, prior to the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by delivering a copy of the proposed amendment to the office of each member of the committee and to the information desk and posting such notice and leaving a copy in the office of the Senate Secretary. The committee report shall be accompanied by a copy of any measure to which amendments are proposed to the committee.
- 10. A roll call vote shall be taken of the committee members at the request of a committee member upon any motion or amendment.
- 11. Except as provided herein, all Senate bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. Except as provided herein, all House bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall hear a bill in violation of this paragraph without the written permission of the President.
- 12. All bills, memorials or resolutions referred to a standing committee shall be reported. Bills, memorials or resolutions which the committee has considered but on which no action has been taken and bills, memorials and resolutions which the committee has not considered shall be reported as such by the chairman of each standing committee at the last regular or special meeting of such committee for each session.
- C. The Rules Committee of the Senate shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. All powers and duties of other standing committees of the Senate listed in subsection B of this rule except those powers and duties inconsistent with this subsection.
- 2. On the first day following the convening of the first regular session of each Legislature, the President shall appoint the members of the Committee on Rules, and the said committee shall henceforth have authority to present proposed changes or additions to the rules which upon adoption by the Senate shall be deemed standing rules of the Senate.

- 3. The written agenda for the Rules Committee shall be the calendar for the Committee of the Whole. All other legislative matters shall be in order before the Rules Committee without written agenda.
- 4. Amendments proposed by the Rules Committee should be clearly set forth as an attachment to the Rules Committee report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. Substantive amendments may be proposed by the Rules Committee only with the concurrence of the sponsor of a bill if sponsored by an individual or the committee chairman if sponsored by a committee. Corrective or technical amendments may be proposed. A proposed technical or corrective amendment which incidentally affects the substance of a bill or amendment shall require concurrence of the sponsor. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be offered in the Rules Committee.
- 5. The Committee on Rules shall consider the bill and proposed amendments thereto for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of any amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- (a) The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- (b) The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - (c) The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- (d) The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- (e) The bill is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.
- 6. In addition to the powers and duties given to the Rules Committee elsewhere in the Senate Rules, the Rules Committee shall have such other powers and duties over legislative matters as are assigned by the President.
- D. Any subcommittee of a standing committee may meet at any time upon the call of the subcommittee chairman without written notice, providing, however, that such meeting shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. A subcommittee may, without distributing a written agenda, consider any matter assigned to the subcommittee by the chairman of the standing committee.
- E. NO COMMITTEE OTHER THAN THE RULES COMMITTEE SHALL MEET WHILE THE SENATE IS MEETING IN SESSION WITHOUT SPECIAL PERMISSION OF THE PRESIDENT.

#### RULE 8 Calendars

- A. There shall be the following calendars of business reported from committees:
- 1. A calendar of the Committee of the Whole, upon which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported by the standing or select committees, except the Rules Committee, to which they have been referred and all bills, resolutions and memorials which have failed in Committee of the Whole, or which have been retained on the calendar. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be prepared and filed in writing with the Secretary of the Senate.
- 2. An active calendar of the Committee of the Whole on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President that have been reported by the Rules Committee and that are drawn from the calendar of the Committee of the Whole on the order of business of the day.

- 3. A unanimous consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the Chairman of the Rules Committee and drawn from all bills, resolutions and memorials on the calendar of the Committee of the Whole that are unamended as reported by all standing committees to which they were referred. The unanimous consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest the inclusion of any bill, resolution or memorial on the unanimous consent calendar by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the unanimous consent calendar and return it to the calendar of the Committee of the Whole; provided, however, that a bill shall not be removed from the consent calendar for the purpose of proposing a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment. Bills, resolutions or memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar shall be placed on the Senate calendar.
- 4. A COW consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from amended measures reported out of all committees to which they were referred with zero "no" votes. The COW consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest any measure being subject to group motion and adoption of all committee amendments by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar. Additionally, the filing of a floor amendment with the Secretary of the Senate shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar. The President may remove a bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar at any time. Subject to Rule 17-K, the bills, resolutions, or memorials remaining on the COW consent calendar and passed will then be placed on the third reading calendar.
- 5. A Senate calendar on which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported with a "do pass" or "do pass amended" recommendation by the Committee of the Whole and all bills, resolutions and memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar pursuant to paragraph 3.
- 6. An active Senate calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from the Senate calendar for consideration by the Senate on the order of business for the day.
- B. Measures shall be reported by the Committee of the Whole in the order and manner in which disposed of by that committee, and those approved shall be placed upon the Senate calendar for third reading in the order established by the President, and retained on the Senate calendar until finally disposed of.

# RULE 9 Decorum and Debate

- A. When a Senator desires to speak, the Senator shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until the Senator is recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address the Presiding Officer. No Senator shall interrupt another Senator in debate without the Senator's consent, and to obtain such consent, the Senator shall first address the Presiding Officer.
- B. The Senator who sponsors a measure, or the Senator's designee, shall have the right to open and close debate on such measure.
- C. No Senator in debate shall, directly or indirectly, by any form of words, impute to another Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.

- D. If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall call the Senator to order; and when called to order the Senator shall sit down and not proceed without leave of the Presiding Officer or upon motion adopted by the Senate, that the Senator be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.
- E. If a Senator be called to order for words spoken in debate, the exceptionable words shall, upon the demand of any Senator, be taken down in writing, and read at the table for the information of the Senate.
- F. While the Presiding Officer is putting a question or addressing the Senate, no member shall walk out of or across the Chamber, nor, when a member is speaking, pass between the member and the Chair; nor remain by the Secretary's desk during the call of the roll for the counting of ballots; and the Sergeant at Arms is charged with the strict enforcement of this clause.

# RULE 10 Roll Call and Quorum

- A. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by the surname, except when two or more have the same surname, in which case the district designation shall be added; and after the roll has been once called, the Secretary shall call in their alphabetical order the names of those not voting or who failed to respond.
  - B. A majority of the Senators elected shall constitute a quorum.
- C. If, at any time during a session of the Senate, a question shall be raised by any Senator as to the presence of a quorum, the President shall forthwith direct the Secretary to call the roll and shall announce the result, and these proceedings shall be without debate.
- D. Whenever it shall be ascertained that a quorum is not present a majority of the Senators present may order a call of the Senate, which order shall be determined without debate, and pending its execution, and until a quorum shall be present, no debate or other motion, except to adjourn, shall be in order. Upon approval of the order to call the Senate, the President shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to request, and, when necessary, to compel the attendance of the absent Senators.
- E. When a quorum is present, a call of the Senate may be ordered by the President or by a majority of the members present to compel the attendance of the absent members. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate are present.
- F. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 11 Motions

- A. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- B. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of Ayes and Noes, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Senate.
- C. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- D. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order, and it shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by way of a substitute amendment.

- E. A question or an amendment containing two or more distinct and separate subjects may be divided upon the demand of any member. A motion to strike out and insert words, both relating to the same subject, and together accomplishing a single change in meaning, is indivisible.
- F. When motions are made for reference of a subject to a select committee, or to a standing committee, the question of a standing committee shall be put first. A motion simply to refer shall not be open to amendment, except to add instructions.
- G. Any motion improperly used for the purpose of delaying or obstructing business is a dilatory motion and may be ruled out of order by the Presiding Officer.
- H. A motion to substitute a House bill for a Senate bill on third reading shall not be in order unless the Senate bill for which substitution is sought is identical to the House bill.

# RULE 12 Previous Question (Vote Immediately)

When the previous question is moved, adopted and ordered, it shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been ordered. The previous question may be moved with reference to a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the rules, or an amendment or amendments, or may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order, however, pending the motion for, or after the previous question shall have been ordered, for a motion to be made to commit or to recommit, with or without instructions, to a standing or select committee.

### RULE 13 Reconsideration

- A. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a recorded vote, any Senator who voted on the prevailing side may on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter move a reconsideration. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a non-recorded vote, any Senator may, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, move a reconsideration. If the Senate shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no other motion to reconsider the question shall be in order unless by unanimous consent. A motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present, and a motion to lay it on the table shall not be in order. If the motion to reconsider passes, the question reconsidered shall be determined at such time as the President directs.
- B. When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been sent to the House of Representatives, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon first, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider. If the motion to request return passes, the motion to reconsider cannot be considered until the question or measure is returned to the Senate by the House.

# RULE 14 Bills, Resolutions, Memorials, Engrossed Copies and Amendments

- A. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced by a member or a committee by presenting the original and three copies of such bill, resolution or memorial, unless additional copies are ordered by the President, to the office of the Secretary prior to 3:00 p.m. of the day immediately preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated.
  - B. A bill introduced in the Senate may be cosponsored by House members.
- C. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced during the first 22 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.

- D. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the certification of election of members by the Secretary of State until the first day of the first regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's Proclamation until the first day of the special session, provided the bill, resolution or memorial is germane to the call. A bill, resolution or memorial shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials prefiled for introduction pursuant to this rule may be first read on the first day of the session. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill, resolution or memorial at the time of prefiling.
- E. The original of a bill, resolution or memorial introduced in the Senate shall be designated by brown backing, endorsed "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Secretary. The chairman of each committee to which a bill, resolution or memorial is referred shall receive one copy endorsed "Committee Copy". Subsequent copies shall be endorsed and distributed as the President directs.
- F. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, a sufficient number of copies of any bill, resolution or memorial shall be duplicated.
- G. All bills prepared for introduction which propose to amend existing statutes shall show the new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case), lined through. New language to be added to the statutes shall be in capital letters (upper case).
- H. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and each page of the original and two copies shall be stamped with the blind embossed stamp of the Senate. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original Senate engrossed copy shall have a red backing. An engrossed measure ready for the third or final reading shall not be subject to amendment.
- I. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, the Senate shall provide the House and the Legislative Council with a sufficient number of copies of each amended engrossed Senate measure with a cover page or pages showing the page and line number of each adopted Senate amendment thereto. For Senate amendments to House measures the same number of copies shall be provided but may consist only of those pages containing the adopted Senate amendments and cover page or pages showing the page and line number of such Senate amendment. For unamended Senate measures the same number of cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.
- J. All bills, resolutions, memorials and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper,  $8\ 1/2$ " x 11" shall be used.
- K. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendments to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines . . . . through . . . .". If everything after the enacting clause is stricken the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause".

# RULE 15 Voting

A. When the Ayes and Noes are ordered, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically, and each Senator shall without debate, declare the Senator's assent or dissent to the question, unless the Senator declares a personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the Senate, and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Presiding Officer, but may for sufficient reason change the Senator's vote prior to such announcement. No motion to suspend this rule shall be in order, nor shall the Presiding Officer entertain any request to suspend by unanimous consent.

- B. When a Senator declines to vote on the second call of the Senator's name, the Senator shall be required to assign the Senator's reasons therefor. If the reason assigned is other than a personal financial interest in the question or a substantial interest as defined in the statutory code which is not a personal financial interest in the question, the Presiding Officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator for the reasons assigned by the Senator, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate; and these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.
- C. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

# RULE 15.1 Electronic Roll Call System

- A. In all cases where a rule of the Senate refers to "roll call", "roll call vote" or "recorded vote", such reference shall be understood to refer also to the taking of the vote by an electronic roll call system.
- B. When taking attendance or recording the Ayes and Noes on any question to be voted upon, the electronic roll call system shall be used, unless it is inoperative, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules. This rule may be suspended by a majority of the members present in which case the roll shall be called in accordance with Rule 10.
- C. When the Senate is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call and the vote is to be taken by the electronic roll call system, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "You have heard the (motion or third or final reading) of (the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote no. The system is now open. The Senate will now proceed to vote."
- D. If a Senator declines to vote, the Senator shall state the reasons therefor as required by Rule 15-B and the system shall not be closed until every Senator who is present has voted, explained the reason for not voting or been excused from voting.
- E. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "Have all the Senators voted? The system will now be closed. The system is now closed. The Secretary will now record the vote."
- F. A Senator may change his vote after the roll call system has been closed and before announcement of the result, and not thereafter.
- G. The Secretary of the Senate shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall confirm the result to the Presiding Officer, who shall announce the same to the Senate. The Secretary shall enter the vote in the Journal.
- H. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member.
- I. When a vote is being taken by the electronic roll call system, this rule supersedes any provision in the Senate Rules inconsistent therewith.

### RULE 16 Order of Business

A. Unless otherwise ordered, the Senate shall convene every legislative day at a time certain as determined by the President, receive a prayer by the chaplain, recite the pledge of allegiance and continue in session until recess or adjournment.

B. The order of business shall be as follows:

Roll Call
Reading of the Journal
Business on the President's Desk
Petitions, Memorials, and Remonstrances
Orders of the Day
Introduction and First Reading of Bills
Reference of Bills
Second Reading of Bills
Reports of Standing Committees
Reports of Select Committees
Committee of the Whole
Report of the Committee of the Whole
Third Reading of Bills
Other Business of the Senate

- C. The President shall, upon each day, announce to the Senate the business in order, agreeable to the order of business contained in subsection B of this rule; and no business shall be taken up or considered until the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order, nor after the order to which it belongs is closed, except by order of the Senate. All questions relating to the order of business shall be decided by a majority of the members present without debate.
- D. Every bill shall be read by sections on three different days, unless two-thirds of the Senate deem it expedient to dispense with this rule. The vote on the final passage of any bill or joint resolution shall be taken by Ayes and Noes on roll call. Final passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the Senate.
- E. The Presiding Officer shall give notice at each reading, whether it be the first, second or third reading, and a Journal entry of the same shall be made by the Secretary.

# RULE 17 Committee of the Whole; Additional Committee of the Whole

- A. In forming a Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside. The chairman so appointed shall preserve and maintain order.
- B. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken up in regular order, or in such order as the committee may determine by a suspension of the rules, unless the order of the bill to be considered was determined by the Senate at the time of going into committee, but bills for raising revenue and the general appropriations bill shall have precedence.
- C. A majority of the members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.
- D. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole so far as applicable.
- E. In the Committee of the Whole, bills and resolutions shall be read by the Secretary and considered item by item, unless otherwise ordered by the committee, leaving preambles or titles to be last considered. The body of a bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but amendments shall be noted by the chairman or Secretary upon a separate piece of paper and reported to the Senate.
- F. The proceedings of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken down by the Secretary of the Senate, acting as the Secretary of the Committee of the Whole. The chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall in the chairman's report set forth all actions of the Committee of the Whole.

- G. When a bill or resolution is considered in the Committee of the Whole, the only regular motions which are in order are the following:
  - 1. To propose amendments.
  - 2. To limit debate.
  - 3. To recommend.
  - 4. To rise and report.
  - 5. That the bill or resolution retain its place on the calendar.
  - 6. That the bill or resolution be retained on the calendar.
- H. A roll call vote shall be taken when a motion to recommend is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.
- I. No proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.
- J. A motion to amend the Committee of the Whole report shall not be in order unless the proposed amendment to the report has been voted on in the Committee of the Whole.
- K. The Senate may by a majority vote of the members present bring a bill, memorial or resolution otherwise designated as available for third reading to Committee of the Whole for amendment or further amendment, except no proposed amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material is in order.

# RULE 18 Sitting as in Committee of the Whole

The Senate may by majority vote of the members present sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of any subject except if the subject is a bill, memorial or resolution which has been considered in Committee of the Whole, the consideration shall be limited to technical changes.

### RULE 19 Journals

- A. The proceedings of the Senate and of the Committee of the Whole shall be briefly and accurately stated in the Journal. Titles of all bills, resolutions and measures, and such parts as shall be affected by proposed amendments, readings, references, reports and every vote, motion and roll call, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial or paper presented to the Senate shall be entered on the Journal.
- B. All confidential legislative and executive proceedings and the proceedings when sitting as a Court of Impeachment, shall be recorded in a separate book.
- C. The protest or remarks of any Senator and reasons therefor shall be entered on the Journal, if presented in writing, but no protest or remarks shall exceed two hundred words in length without the consent of the Senate.

# RULE 20 Proceedings on Nominations

A. When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State to the Senate, they shall, unless otherwise ordered, be referred to appropriate committees, and a standing committee. If the nomination is referred to the Rules Committee, the committee, upon consideration, may recommend to the President that the nomination be further referred to another standing committee or may place the nomination on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate. If the Rules Committee recommends that the nomination shall be placed on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate, the Rules Committee recommendation shall be dated and

placed on each member's desk. If a member wishes during the first seven calendar days after action by the Rules Committee to object to the inclusion of the nomination without a hearing by a standing committee other than the Rules Committee, the member may do so by filing a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the seven day period. If a protest is filed, the President shall remove the nomination from the list and assign the nomination to an appropriate standing committee other than the Rules Committee. No nomination placed upon the list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate shall be considered by the Senate until said nomination has remained on the list for seven calendar days. When a nomination is brought before the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put on the same day on which the nomination is received nor on the day on which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.

B. Nominations confirmed or rejected by the Senate shall not be returned to the Governor by the Secretary until the expiration of the time limit for making a motion to reconsider the same, or while a motion to reconsider is pending, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present.

# RULE 21 Messages

- A. Messages from the Governor of the State, or from the House of Representatives, may be received at any stage of proceedings, except while the Senate is dividing, or while the Journal is being read, or while the question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending.
- B. Messages shall be sent to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, who shall previously certify the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions and other measures which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested, and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor of the State all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to him by the Senate.

### RULE 22 Amendments of the House

- A. Any amendment by the House to any Senate bill shall be subject to one of the following motions or actions:
  - 1. Concur in House amendment.
- 2. Refuse to concur in House amendment and appointment of Conference Committee, free or simple.
- 3. The President may refer the bill with the House amendment to a committee for study and recommendations of concurrence or refusal to concur.
- B. Any amendment by the House which includes the addition of the emergency clause shall require a two-thirds vote of the members of the Senate for final passage with the emergency clause.

# RULE 23 Conference Committees and Reports

A. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the bill, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising, or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material.

- B. Every conference report shall be accompanied by a detailed statement sufficiently explicit to inform the Senate what effect such amendments or propositions, if any, will have upon the measure to which they relate. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk a reasonable time before consideration of the report. The presentation of reports of committees of conference shall always be in order, except when the Journal is being read or a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending, or while the Senate is dividing; and when received the question of proceedings to the consideration of the report, if raised, shall be immediately put, and shall be determined without debate.
- C. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.
- D. A Free Conference Committee report on a bill which includes conference amendments may, upon the filing of the report in the Secretary of the Senate's office, be reassigned by the President to the Committee on Rules. If assigned to the Committee on Rules, the Committee on Rules shall consider such report for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of conference amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- 1. The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- 2. The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - 3. The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- 4. The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- E. Except as provided herein, conference committees shall consider a bill prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No conference committee shall meet to consider a bill after such time without the written permission of the President.

# RULE 24 Parliamentary Practice and Procedure

Parliamentary practice and procedure in the Senate shall take precedence in the order listed:

- 1. Constitutional provisions.
- 2. Senate Rules.
- 3. Statutory rules and provisions.
- 4. The rules of parliamentary practice and procedure as contained in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.
  - 5. Senate customs and usages.
  - 6. General parliamentary law.

# RULE 25 Privileges of the Floor

A. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, no person except members and officers of the Senate shall have the privileges of, or be admitted to the floor of the Senate Chamber at any time; provided, that the President may grant the privileges of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the Senate, to ex-members of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and employees of the Senate. When the Senate is not in formal session, the President, upon application of a Senate Committee, may grant the use of

the Chamber to such committee for a time certain for the purpose of holding committee hearings.

- B. For the purpose of addressing the membership of the Senate while in session, the President may, upon request, approve such dignitaries as:
  - 1. The President or past Presidents of the United States.
  - 2. Members of the present United States Cabinet.
- 3. Ambassadors of or to the United States, and all present United States Senators and Congressmen.
  - 4. The present Governor of Arizona.
  - 5. The present Governor or Head of any other domestic or foreign state.

All other dignitaries may be introduced from the gallery or may be granted speaking time other than when the Senate is in session.

- C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the Senate is in closed executive session or the Senate or President shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the rules of the Senate.
- D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the President of the Senate and revocable at the discretion of the President of the Senate. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the President of the Senate for a pass, and shall accompany the application with a statement of facts of the representative's press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or news gathering organization with which the representative is connected, for such pass. Not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other accredited newspaper or news gathering organization.

# RULE 26 Legislative Representatives

- A. Any person desiring to be heard concerning legislation in behalf of any person, firm, association, organization, company or corporation shall first make application in writing to the chairman of the committee, stating the bill the person desires to present arguments upon, and whom the person represents.
- B. The chairman may issue a permit which shall give such person the right to file with the committee having under consideration the bill or legislation regarding which the permit has been issued, written or printed briefs, statements or arguments. If so notified by the committee through its chairman, the person may appear before the committee in open public hearing and present arguments and testimony at the pleasure of the committee. Chairmen of committees shall, on request, give information regarding the holding of public hearings, and the time and place of the same, and committees may hold such public hearings as they desire.

# RULE 27 Length of Session

- A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The President may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period of not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by the Senate by a majority vote of the members present.
- B. If not considered in the regular session the General Appropriations bill, the General Capital Outlay bill and the University Capital Outlay bill may be considered in a special session which shall be called only for those purposes.

# RULE 28 Amendment of Rules; Suspension of Rules

- A. The Senate Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the Senate.
- B. The Senate Rules may be suspended by a vote of a majority of the members present.

# RULE 29 Code of Ethics; Ethics Complaints

### A. No member shall:

- 1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person any personal financial benefit, including any gift, for himself or another upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.
- 2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.
- 3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.
- 4. Enter into any contract with a public agency for the sale of goods or services or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity for the sale of goods or services, unless:
- (a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars, or
- (b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or
- $\left(c\right)$  The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or
- (d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to article IV, part 2, section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.
- 5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.
- 6. Participate in any action of the Senate if the member has a substantial interest as defined in section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes.
  - B. For the purposes of this rule:
- 1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.
- 2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.
- 3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.

- 4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.
- 5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.
- C. The Senate Ethics Committee shall only receive ethics complaints that have been signed by a Senator and notarized.

# RULE 30 Personal Financial Interest

- A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:
- 1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and
- 2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such statement shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.
- B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the Senate is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.
- C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall, in addition to the requirements of subsection A, state his decision and the underlying reasons therefor and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body.
- D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than five days from the date of the receipt of that request and be filed with the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such opinion shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.

#### E. For the purposes of this rule:

- 1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any bill, resolution, memorial, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the Senate.
- 2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.
- F. A member who has a substantial interest as defined by section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes, shall comply with title 38, chapter 3, article 8, Arizona Revised Statutes.

#### RULE 31 Caucuses

All meetings of a party caucus consisting of members of the Senate shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the Senate and meetings to discuss matters, including those permitted in executive session as set forth in section 38-431.03, Arizona Revised Statutes. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening party caucuses.

# RULE 32 Procedure on Records Retention and Destruction Schedule

A. Definitions. In this section the following definitions apply:

"Bill file" means a file containing materials relating to legislation as determined by the Senate Secretary.

"Custodian" means any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern, or legislative contractor who has primary custody and control over a record.

"Personnel records" means an employee's official record and documentation of the employee's employment.

"Record" means all books, papers, maps, photographs or other documentary materials, regardless of physical form or characteristics, including prints or copies of such items produced or reproduced on film or electronic media, made or received in pursuance of law or in connection with the transaction of public or legislative business and over which the custodian has custody and control and that is preserved or appropriate for preservation by the Senate as evidence of the organization, functions, policies, decisions, procedures, operations or other activities of the custodian, or because of the informational and historical value of data contained in the record.

"Reference value" means administrative, legal, fiscal, research, or historical value as reasonably determined by the custodian.

"State Library, Archives and Public Records (LAPR)" means the division of the Arizona Secretary of State that is the archives for Arizona state government, which is mandated by law to collect, preserve and make available to the public and all branches of government, permanent public records, historical manuscripts, photographs, and other materials that contribute to the understanding of Arizona history.

B. Authority. AZ. Const. Art. IV, part 2, § 8 authorizes the legislature to determine its own rules of procedure which supersede any conflicting statutes.

#### C. General provisions.

- 1. Permanent records. As set forth below, at the end of the retention period with the legislature, the Senate Secretary or the Senate Secretary's designee must transfer to LAPR all records kept by the Senate Secretary, regardless of format, that have a retention period designated as permanent, unless otherwise instructed by LAPR. The Senate Secretary shall work with LAPR's established requirements for transfer.
- 2. Electronic records. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the custodian shall destroy electronic items not designated as having a retention period of permanent.
- 3. Paper files, records, and documents. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the Senate Secretary may destroy files that are primarily in paper format and may destroy other records, regardless of format, not designated as having a retention period of permanent.
- 4. No duty to migrate to new technology. The Senate Secretary is not responsible for migrating to new technology any record that is recorded in a format, such as CD and DVD that must be read by a computer.

- 5. Destruction of non-permanent records. When a paper record is eligible for destruction, the custodian shall take proper precautions to destroy the entire file, record, or document by shredding, burning, or pulverizing it. Electronic records shall be deleted from all electronic repositories in which they reside, including servers and hard drives. The custodian may keep a list, containing minimal information, capturing any destroyed items, so that the custodian knows that it has been destroyed and has not been merely misplaced or never existed.
- 6. Private electronic devices. An electronic message solely sent or received on and maintained on a private electronic device of any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern, or legislative contractor is not subject to public inspection.
- 7. Effective date. The provisions of this rule are applicable to files, records, and documents created before or after the adoption of this rule.
- D. Interpretation and enforcement. The maintenance, preservation and destruction of records will be governed solely and exclusively by the provisions of this rule. Any questions or disputes concerning the application of this rule to any specific record or subset of records will be resolved by the President, whose determination will be final. The provisions of this rule will be enforced solely and exclusively by the Senate in accordance with the rules of the Arizona Senate.
- E. Retention and disposition schedule. The following records retention periods are finite and absolute. They are *not* minimum retention periods or guidelines. Records may be kept beyond their designated retention periods only if they are relevant to any (1) ongoing administrative or litigation proceeding in which the Senate or the custodian is a party or the recipient of a third party subpoena or (2) pending or prospective administrative or litigation proceeding in which the Senate or the custodian reasonably anticipates it may become a party, or if the custodian believes the record has continuing reference value.

WHEREAS, the Regime is a known state sponsor of terror in the Middle East and beyond that is currently supplying Russia with military drones used to kill Ukrainian civilians in the unjust and unlawful Russian war on Ukraine.

Today I vetoed SB1523, along with the twelve other FY2024 budget bills that were transmitted to my office.

Five weeks ago, I stood before the legislature and, invoking the words of the late Governor Rose Mofford, asked the members to work with me in making "difficult choices" about the future of our state. I spoke about the need to address Arizona's housing crisis, to make college more affordable, to put money back in the pockets of working families, and to truly invest in public education.

Four days later, I delivered a budget proposal to the legislature that makes meaningful progress on these exact issues. As rent and housing prices have skyrocketed, my budget includes a historic investment in the Housing Trust Fund to help keep people in their homes and off the street. As everyday costs have increased and strained household budgets, I proposed a plan to put more money into the pockets of working families. As cutting-edge companies relocate to Arizona, my budget makes major investments in college scholarships and dual enrollment programs, to ensure we're preparing our students for the jobs of the future. And, perhaps above all else, my budget makes it clear that for as long as I'm Governor, Arizona will prioritize investment in public education.

Along with these immediate investments, my budget proposal puts a quarter of a billion dollars in the Rainy Day Fund, *and* leaves a quarter of a billion dollars on the table to ensure a healthy structural balance.

Unfortunately, despite my call to take on these difficult choices and protect our state's future, the budget approved by a slim, partisan majority in the legislature takes another path. An easy path. Rather than tackling *difficult* choices, this budget presents Arizonans with *false* choices. This purely-partisan budget says that we can't invest in our state now and invest in our future. It says that we can't address the challenges of today and save for the challenges of tomorrow. It says that as Democrats and Republicans, we can't disagree with each other and work together in the best interest of the state.

I reject these false choices because I'm an optimist, particularly when it comes to Arizona. I'm confident that we can work together on a budget that addresses our state's housing crisis, lowers costs, prepares our workforce, and invests in public education. I know that the people of Arizona didn't send us here to do the easy thing. They sent us here to do the right thing.

As we move forward this legislative session, I hope that all elected officials-regardless of party affiliation-will remain open to bipartisan discussion, solutions, and compromise. The people of Arizona demand it. So let's get to work.

*WHEREAS,* there are programs and services that help to facilitate a better transition for people from incarceration or community supervision back into society by coordinating existence resources, identifying resource gaps, and advocating on behalf of individuals with criminal records; and

WHEREAS, government, education, faith-and-community-based organizations, and those formerly incarcerated, and is studying the needs of individuals who have been released from correctional institutions and working to increase the effectiveness of local reentry coalitions to expand access to programs and services focused on addressing the key causes of recidivism, including access to workforce; and

*WHEREAS,* the NATIONAL DAY OF EMPATHY, seeks to raise awareness of the ability for a fair chance to change not just an individual's life but also the very fabric of their community for the better so too does giving the fair chance change a person or organization for the better; and

*WHEREAS,* the NATIONAL DAY OF EMPATHY, also aims to demonstrate and celebrate that the business community recognizes the impact increased fair chance employment can have on not only their businesses but also on the health and vitality of their communities; and

*WHEREAS,* the NATIONAL DAY OF EMPATHY serves to connect justice-involved individuals with resources and services important to successful reentry, and decrease stigma by raising public awareness of the issues and challenges faced by formerly incarcerated individuals as they reenter the community; and

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** I Senator Kaiser hereby proclaim February 22, 2023 as a "Day of Empathy" in Arizona and commend its observance to all citizens.

## Arizona State Senate Proclamation

Hypertrophic Cardiomyopathy Awareness Day

**WHEREAS**, hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (HCM) is a chronic cardiovascular disease that involves thickening of the heart muscle and can potentially lead to debilitating symptoms and serious complications, including heart failure, atrial fibrillation, stroke, and, in rare cases, sudden cardiac death; and

WHEREAS, the most common inheritable heart disease, HCM can affect anyone regardless of age, gender or ethnicity and has a reported prevalence ranging from one in 200 to one in 500 in the general population; and

*WHEREAS,* an estimated 700,000 people in the United States have HCM, yet 85% of them may remain undiagnosed; and

*WHEREAS,* HCM shares symptoms with other common cardiovascular and pulmonary diseases, such as shortness of breath, chest pain, fatigue, palpitations, and fainting, making it difficult to distinguish HCM from these other diseases; and

*WHEREAS,* all-cause mortality risk is three to four times higher in patients with HCM than that of the general population; and

WHEREAS, knowing one's medical history and any signs and symptoms of HCM is an important first step in receiving an accurate diagnosis of HCM; and

WHEREAS, a health care provider must conduct a thorough screening with cardiac health questions to help identify the risk of cardiac disorders, both genetic and congenital; and

*WHEREAS,* a health care provider may conduct several tests, including an echocardiogram, cardiac magnetic resonance imaging, or genetic testing, to confirm a family history of HCM and must examine a patient's heart to diagnose HCM; and

*WHEREAS,* following a diagnosis of HCM, it is important for patients to work with their health care provider to learn more about their disease and understand different management options, including prescription medicines and surgical treatment options that may help; and

*WHEREAS,* increasing public awareness of HCM is critically important to improving the cardiovascular health of Arizona's citizens, including awareness of the consequences of undiagnosed and untreated HCM and the need to seek appropriate care for this serious public health issue; and

President Petersen,

I have vetoed SB1184. I appreciate the legislature's interest in addressing rising housing costs, particularly for renters. Lowering costs for Arizona families is a priority of my administration. Unfortunately, this bill suffers from two important defects at this time.

First, this bill lacks any enforceable mechanism to ensure relief will be provided to renters. As noted by the legislature's own attorney, provisions in the bill that purport to require that tax savings be passed on to renters face challenges under both the state and federal constitutions. If we are going to promise relief to renters, it's important that we are able to ensure they actually receive it. For working families faced with everincreasing rental prices, this proposal just doesn't fit the bill.

Second, the bill includes an appropriation of roughly 270 million dollars over the next eighteen months. To approve of such an appropriation outside of a comprehensive budget agreement would be irresponsible. If the majority caucus is committed to such an appropriation, I expect that it will be brought to bipartisan budget negotiations for consideration.

## ASSURING CIVIL RIGHT TO INFORMED CONSENT

WHEREAS, a fundamental principle of informed consent and bodily integrity is the uncoerced right to accept or refuse a medical intervention, product, or procedure; and

WHEREAS, a mandated one-size-fits-all medical practice negates informed consent, and the reality is that nature is complex and that medical care requires *individualized* considerations; and

WHEREAS, the four principles of medical ethics (respect for autonomy, beneficence, nonmaleficence, and justice) and the tenets of "full informed consent" are imperative in the practice of medicine; and

WHEREAS, the patient must make a voluntary choice to accept or refuse treatment; and

*WHEREAS,* when a patient or their advocate has refused a medical intervention, product, or procedure, mandating over that objection is unethical, disrespectful, unjust, and illiberal, and the entire reason for the universal principle of informed consent; and

*WHEREAS,* medical interventions, products, and procedures are marketed and lobbied for by a for-profit industry that reaps billions of dollars in profits annually and has more registered lobbyists than any other industry; and

*WHEREAS,* this same industry enjoys immunity from liability for injuries from many of its products unparallel by any other industry, including from the Public Readiness and Emergency Preparedness Act (PREP Act).

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** that the Arizona State Senate proclaims that there shall be no law that mandates or coerces an individual to receive, or that penalizes an individual for refusing, a medical intervention, product, or procedure.

#### BUSINESS ON THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

## ADOPTION OF RULES

Majority Leader Borrelli moved the proposed amendment to Senate Rule 2-G as distributed, be adopted. The motion carried.

Majority Leader Borrelli moved that the Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature, as amended, be adopted as the Rules of the Fifty-sixth Legislature. The motion carried.

The Secretary recorded the action.

#### SENATE RULES

## RULE 1 Officers and Employees

- A. The officers of the Senate shall be a President, who shall be chosen from among the membership of the Senate, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and a Sergeant at Arms.
- B. There shall be such other employees as may be authorized by the Senate. The appointment, terms and conditions of employment, compensation, discipline, and discharge of employees of the Senate shall be determined by the President, subject to the approval of the Senate. Employees of the Senate are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employees.

## RULE 2 The President

The President shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. The President shall take the chair on every legislative day precisely at the hour to which the Senate, at its last sitting, adjourned; immediately call the members to order and on the appearance of a quorum, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read.
- B. The President shall have control of the Senate Chamber, including seating assignments of members therein, all other parts of the Senate wing and all other areas and buildings used exclusively by the Senate.
  - C. The President shall preserve and maintain order and decorum.

- D. The President shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the Senate, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by permission of the Senate.
- E. The President shall state all questions in the proper order in which they shall be disposed.
- F. When a question is undebatable or when debate on a question is closed, the President shall state the question, calling first for the "Ayes" and then for the "Noes". If the President is in doubt, or a division is called for, the Senate shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and then those in the negative. But on demand of two members a roll call of the Ayes and Noes shall be ordered at any time before such vote is made certain and declared.
- G. The President shall have the right to vote, and on all questions the President shall MAY vote last.
- H. The President shall have the right to name any member as President Pro Tempore to serve at the President's request, which appointment may extend throughout the session unless terminated by the Senate. The President may appoint any other member as temporary President Pro Tempore to serve for a limited period of time. In the absence or omission of such an appointment, the Senate shall proceed to elect a President Pro Tempore to act during the absence of the President.
- I. The President shall appoint all standing committees, and all select committees unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present, and shall appoint the chairman and vice-chairman of each such committee. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, but shall not vote or sign reports from any committee except the committees of which the President is chairman. However, if the President is an appointed member of the Rules Committee, the President shall be a voting member of that committee. The President shall fill all vacancies on committees.
- J. The President shall refer all proposed measures or other legislative matters to the appropriate committees. Every bill, resolution and memorial shall be referred by the President to one or more standing committees, except resolutions or memorials to be adopted by unanimous consent and House bills to be substituted on third reading pursuant to Rule 11-H. All proposed measures or other legislative matters shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee without action upon the part of the President. If three-fifths or more of the members of the Senate petition the President to discharge committees from further consideration of a bill, resolution or memorial, the measure shall be withdrawn by the President from assigned committees which have not reported the measure. If a committee hearing has not been held on the measure, the President shall direct that a hearing be held by a committee within seven days and upon withdrawal or hearing, the matter shall be placed by the President on the active calendar of the Committee of the Whole. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole, it shall be placed by the President on the third reading calendar. If a discharge petition is presented to the President less than seven days before the Senate adjourns sine die, the President shall not be required to act upon the petition.
- K. All debts incurred by the Senate, either during session or between sessions of the legislature, shall be subject to approval by the President and if so approved shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division of the Department of Administration.
- L. The office of the President shall keep the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and attaches, and shall maintain these records for inspection by the membership.
- M. The President is authorized to call meetings of standing committees of the Senate during periods when the Senate is not in session, and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance.
- N. The President is authorized to bring or assert in any forum on behalf of the Senate any claim or right arising out of any injury to the Senate's powers or duties under the constitution or laws of this state.

## RULE 3 The Secretary

The Secretary shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a Journal of each day's proceedings, and to provide a typewritten copy of the same for examination by the President. The Secretary shall each day prepare a calendar of the Orders and Business of the Day and a like calendar for the Committee of the Whole, and such other dockets and calendars as may be ordered, and shall cause a copy to be placed on the desk of each member, at or before the hour of convening.
- B. The Secretary shall have the custody of all bills, resolutions, memorials, petitions, communications, or other measures, instruments and papers introduced in or submitted to the Senate, subject to such disposition thereof as may be provided by the rules of the Senate or the order of the President, and shall be held strictly accountable for the safekeeping of the same. The Secretary shall keep a record of all such measures or instruments, showing at all times the exact standing of each.
- C. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be required of the Secretary by the Senate or by the President.
- D. The Assistant Secretary shall act under the direction of the Secretary and in the absence of the Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary.

# RULE 4 Sergeant at Arms

The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to attend the Senate and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings, to maintain order under the direction of the President or Chairman, to execute the commands of the Senate, and all processes issued by authority thereof, directed to the Sergeant at Arms by the Presiding Officer. Five minutes before the hour of the meeting of the Senate each day the Sergeant at Arms shall see that the floor is cleared of all persons, except those privileged to remain.
- B. The Sergeant at Arms shall enforce the rules relating to the privileges of the floor and gallery, and perform such other duties as may be required of the Sergeant at Arms by the Senate or by the President.

## RULE 5 Members

- A. Every member shall be present within the Senate Chamber during its sittings, unless excused or necessarily prevented; and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question as set forth in Rule 30, or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 15.
- B. No Senator shall voluntarily be absent from the service of the Senate without leave of the President.

## RULE 6 Questions of Privilege

Questions of privilege shall be: First, Privilege of the Senate, which relates to the privilege and rights of the Senate collectively, its organization, safety, dignity, comfort and the integrity of its proceedings; second, Personal Privilege, which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of the members individually in their representative capacity only; third, Personal Privilege which relates to matters personal to the members which may be received only by permission of the Senate or the Presiding Officer. Questions of privilege shall have precedence over all other questions, except motions to adjourn or recess, or the call of the Senate when no quorum is present.

## RULE 7 Committees

- A. Standing Committees of the Senate shall consist of the following:
  - 1. Appropriations
  - 2. Commerce
  - 3. Director Nominations
  - 4. Education
  - 5. Elections
  - 6. Finance
  - 7. Government
  - 8. Health and Human Services
  - 9. Judiciary
  - 10. Military Affairs, Public Safety and Border Security
  - 11. Natural Resources, Energy and Water
  - 12. Rules
  - 13. Transportation and Technology
- B. Committees of the Senate except the Rules Committee shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. The first Senator named on a committee shall be the chairman thereof; the second shall be the vice-chairman. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall have all the powers and duties of the chairman.
- 2. The Ethics Committee and each standing committee shall adopt rules of procedure consistent with the rules of the Senate. Committee rules shall require that the chairman vote last on a roll call vote. Committee rules may allow the vice-chairman to vote second to last on a roll call vote.
- 3. All committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as the proper decorum is maintained.
- 4. All committees except the Committee on Director Nominations will meet at regularly scheduled times and places. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice-chairman some other committee member designated by the President shall preside. Special meetings may be called at the option of the chairman. However, such meetings shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. Regularly scheduled meetings can be cancelled or rescheduled only with the permission of the President.
- 5. A written agenda for each regular or special meeting containing all bills, memorials and resolutions to be considered thereat shall be distributed to each member of the committee and to the Secretary of the Senate at least five days prior to the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. The action taken on every bill, memorial or resolution on the committee agenda shall be reported to the Secretary of the Senate at the conclusion of the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the chairman to deliver the committee report for each bill, memorial or resolution that has been voted out of committee to the Secretary of the Senate as soon as the committee amendment is prepared. If there is no amendment, the committee report shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day following the day the committee meeting adjourns.

- 6. A bill not on the chairman's agenda shall be scheduled by the chairman for discussion and committee action at the next subsequent committee meeting upon presentation to the chairman of a petition to schedule the bill, and upon filing a copy thereof with the Secretary of the Senate. A petition to schedule the bill must be signed by at least two-thirds of the members of the committee.
- 7. A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of any matter referred to it.
- 8. The consent of all of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a majority of committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members present on a committee shall be necessary to report any bill or other measure or matter referred to such committee. If a member opposes the report, he may file a minority report. A minority report shall bear the signature of any number of members joining in its recommendations and shall be considered the recommendations merely of the member or members signing the same.
- 9. Amendments proposed by a committee shall be clearly set forth as an attachment to the committee's report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. If the committee has adopted a rule addressing the submission of amendments to committee members, the chairman may preclude the offering of an amendment which does not comply with the rule, may without objection accept the amendment, or may postpone action on the measure until adequate notice has been given. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an amendment has been given by 5:00 p.m. two days, excluding Saturdays and Sundays, prior to the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by delivering a copy of the proposed amendment to the office of each member of the committee and to the information desk and posting such notice and leaving a copy in the office of the Senate Secretary. The committee report shall be accompanied by a copy of any measure to which amendments are proposed to the committee.
- 10. A roll call vote shall be taken of the committee members at the request of a committee member upon any motion or amendment.
- 11. Except as provided herein, all Senate bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. Except as provided herein, all House bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall hear a bill in violation of this paragraph without the written permission of the President.
- 12. All bills, memorials or resolutions referred to a standing committee shall be reported. Bills, memorials or resolutions which the committee has considered but on which no action has been taken and bills, memorials and resolutions which the committee has not considered shall be reported as such by the chairman of each standing committee at the last regular or special meeting of such committee for each session.
  - C. The Rules Committee of the Senate shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. All powers and duties of other standing committees of the Senate listed in subsection B of this rule except those powers and duties inconsistent with this subsection.
- 2. On the first day following the convening of the first regular session of each Legislature, the President shall appoint the members of the Committee on Rules, and the said committee shall henceforth have authority to present proposed changes or additions to the rules which upon adoption by the Senate shall be deemed standing rules of the Senate.

- 3. The written agenda for the Rules Committee shall be the calendar for the Committee of the Whole. All other legislative matters shall be in order before the Rules Committee without written agenda.
- 4. Amendments proposed by the Rules Committee should be clearly set forth as an attachment to the Rules Committee report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. Substantive amendments may be proposed by the Rules Committee only with the concurrence of the sponsor of a bill if sponsored by an individual or the committee chairman if sponsored by a committee. Corrective or technical amendments may be proposed. A proposed technical or corrective amendment which incidentally affects the substance of a bill or amendment shall require concurrence of the sponsor. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be offered in the Rules Committee.
- 5. The Committee on Rules shall consider the bill and proposed amendments thereto for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of any amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- (a) The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- (b) The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - (c) The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- (d) The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- (e) The bill is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.
- 6. In addition to the powers and duties given to the Rules Committee elsewhere in the Senate Rules, the Rules Committee shall have such other powers and duties over legislative matters as are assigned by the President.
- D. Any subcommittee of a standing committee may meet at any time upon the call of the subcommittee chairman without written notice, providing, however, that such meeting shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. A subcommittee may, without distributing a written agenda, consider any matter assigned to the subcommittee by the chairman of the standing committee.
- E. No Committee other than the Rules Committee shall meet while the Senate is meeting in session without special permission of the President.

#### RULE 8 Calendars

- A. There shall be the following calendars of business reported from committees:
- 1. A calendar of the Committee of the Whole, upon which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported by the standing or select committees, except the Rules Committee, to which they have been referred and all bills, resolutions and memorials which have failed in Committee of the Whole, or which have been retained on the calendar. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be prepared and filed in writing with the Secretary of the Senate.
- 2. An active calendar of the Committee of the Whole on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President that have been reported by the Rules Committee and that are drawn from the calendar of the Committee of the Whole on the order of business of the day.

- 3. A unanimous consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the Chairman of the Rules Committee and drawn from all bills, resolutions and memorials on the calendar of the Committee of the Whole that are unamended as reported by all standing committees to which they were referred. The unanimous consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest the inclusion of any bill, resolution or memorial on the unanimous consent calendar by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the unanimous consent calendar and return it to the calendar of the Committee of the Whole; provided, however, that a bill shall not be removed from the consent calendar for the purpose of proposing a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment. Bills, resolutions or memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar shall be placed on the Senate calendar.
- 4. A COW consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from amended measures reported out of all committees to which they were referred with zero "no" votes. The COW consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest any measure being subject to group motion and adoption of all committee amendments by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar. Additionally, the filing of a floor amendment with the Secretary of the Senate shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar. The President may remove a bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar at any time. Subject to Rule 17-K, the bills, resolutions, or memorials remaining on the COW consent calendar.
- 5. A Senate calendar on which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported with a "do pass" or "do pass amended" recommendation by the Committee of the Whole and all bills, resolutions and memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar pursuant to paragraph 3.
- 6. An active Senate calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from the Senate calendar for consideration by the Senate on the order of business for the day.
- B. Measures shall be reported by the Committee of the Whole in the order and manner in which disposed of by that committee, and those approved shall be placed upon the Senate calendar for third reading in the order established by the President, and retained on the Senate calendar until finally disposed of.

## RULE 9 Decorum and Debate

- A. When a Senator desires to speak, the Senator shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until the Senator is recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address the Presiding Officer. No Senator shall interrupt another Senator in debate without the Senator's consent, and to obtain such consent, the Senator shall first address the Presiding Officer.
- B. The Senator who sponsors a measure, or the Senator's designee, shall have the right to open and close debate on such measure.
- C. No Senator in debate shall, directly or indirectly, by any form of words, impute to another Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.
- D. If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall call the Senator to order; and when called to order the Senator shall sit down and not proceed without leave of the Presiding Officer or upon motion adopted by the Senate, that the Senator be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.

- E. If a Senator be called to order for words spoken in debate, the exceptionable words shall, upon the demand of any Senator, be taken down in writing, and read at the table for the information of the Senate.
- F. While the Presiding Officer is putting a question or addressing the Senate, no member shall walk out of or across the Chamber, nor, when a member is speaking, pass between the member and the Chair; nor remain by the Secretary's desk during the call of the roll for the counting of ballots; and the Sergeant at Arms is charged with the strict enforcement of this clause.

# RULE 10 Roll Call and Quorum

- A. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by the surname, except when two or more have the same surname, in which case the district designation shall be added; and after the roll has been once called, the Secretary shall call in their alphabetical order the names of those not voting or who failed to respond.
  - B. A majority of the Senators elected shall constitute a quorum.
- C. If, at any time during a session of the Senate, a question shall be raised by any Senator as to the presence of a quorum, the President shall forthwith direct the Secretary to call the roll and shall announce the result, and these proceedings shall be without debate.
- D. Whenever it shall be ascertained that a quorum is not present a majority of the Senators present may order a call of the Senate, which order shall be determined without debate, and pending its execution, and until a quorum shall be present, no debate or other motion, except to adjourn, shall be in order. Upon approval of the order to call the Senate, the President shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to request, and, when necessary, to compel the attendance of the absent Senators.
- E. When a quorum is present, a call of the Senate may be ordered by the President or by a majority of the members present to compel the attendance of the absent members. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate are present.
- F. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

## RULE 11 Motions

- A. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- B. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of Ayes and Noes, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Senate.
- C. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- D. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order, and it shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by way of a substitute amendment.
- E. A question or an amendment containing two or more distinct and separate subjects may be divided upon the demand of any member. A motion to strike out and insert words, both relating to the same subject, and together accomplishing a single change in meaning, is indivisible.
- F. When motions are made for reference of a subject to a select committee, or to a standing committee, the question of a standing committee shall be put first. A motion simply to refer shall not be open to amendment, except to add instructions.

- G. Any motion improperly used for the purpose of delaying or obstructing business is a dilatory motion and may be ruled out of order by the Presiding Officer.
- H. A motion to substitute a House bill for a Senate bill on third reading shall not be in order unless the Senate bill for which substitution is sought is identical to the House bill.

# RULE 12 Previous Question (Vote Immediately)

When the previous question is moved, adopted and ordered, it shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been ordered. The previous question may be moved with reference to a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the rules, or an amendment or amendments, or may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order, however, pending the motion for, or after the previous question shall have been ordered, for a motion to be made to commit or to recommit, with or without instructions, to a standing or select committee.

#### RULE 13 Reconsideration

- A. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a recorded vote, any Senator who voted on the prevailing side may on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter move a reconsideration. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a non-recorded vote, any Senator may, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, move a reconsideration. If the Senate shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no other motion to reconsider the question shall be in order unless by unanimous consent. A motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present, and a motion to lay it on the table shall not be in order. If the motion to reconsider passes, the question reconsidered shall be determined at such time as the President directs.
- B. When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been sent to the House of Representatives, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon first, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider. If the motion to request return passes, the motion to reconsider cannot be considered until the question or measure is returned to the Senate by the House.

## RULE 14 Bills, Resolutions, Memorials, Engrossed Copies and Amendments

- A. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced by a member or a committee by presenting the original and three copies of such bill, resolution or memorial, unless additional copies are ordered by the President, to the office of the Secretary prior to 3:00 p.m. of the day immediately preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated.
  - B. A bill introduced in the Senate may be cosponsored by House members.
- C. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced during the first 22 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.

- D. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the certification of election of members by the Secretary of State until the first day of the first regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's Proclamation until the first day of the special session, provided the bill, resolution or memorial is germane to the call. A bill, resolution or memorial shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials prefiled for introduction pursuant to this rule may be first read on the first day of the session. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill, resolution or memorial at the time of prefiling.
- E. The original of a bill, resolution or memorial introduced in the Senate shall be designated by brown backing, endorsed "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Secretary. The chairman of each committee to which a bill, resolution or memorial is referred shall receive one copy endorsed "Committee Copy". Subsequent copies shall be endorsed and distributed as the President directs.
- F. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, a sufficient number of copies of any bill, resolution or memorial shall be duplicated.
- G. All bills prepared for introduction which propose to amend existing statutes shall show the new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case), lined through. New language to be added to the statutes shall be in capital letters (upper case).
- H. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and each page of the original and two copies shall be stamped with the blind embossed stamp of the Senate. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original Senate engrossed copy shall have a red backing. An engrossed measure ready for the third or final reading shall not be subject to amendment.
- I. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, the Senate shall provide the House and the Legislative Council with a sufficient number of copies of each amended engrossed Senate measure with a cover page or pages showing the page and line number of each adopted Senate amendment thereto. For Senate amendments to House measures the same number of copies shall be provided but may consist only of those pages containing the adopted Senate amendments and cover page or pages showing the page and line number of such Senate amendment. For unamended Senate measures the same number of cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.
- J. All bills, resolutions, memorials and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper, 8 1/2" x 11" shall be used.
- K. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendments to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines . . . . through . . . .". If everything after the enacting clause is stricken the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause".

## RULE 15 Voting

A. When the Ayes and Noes are ordered, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically, and each Senator shall without debate, declare the Senator's assent or dissent to the question, unless the Senator declares a personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the Senate, and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Presiding Officer, but may for sufficient reason change the Senator's vote prior to such announcement. No motion to suspend this rule shall be in order, nor shall the Presiding Officer entertain any request to suspend by unanimous consent.

- B. When a Senator declines to vote on the second call of the Senator's name, the Senator shall be required to assign the Senator's reasons therefor. If the reason assigned is other than a personal financial interest in the question or a substantial interest as defined in the statutory code which is not a personal financial interest in the question, the Presiding Officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator for the reasons assigned by the Senator, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate; and these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.
- C. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

# RULE 15.1 Electronic Roll Call System

- A. In all cases where a rule of the Senate refers to "roll call", "roll call vote" or "recorded vote", such reference shall be understood to refer also to the taking of the vote by an electronic roll call system.
- B. When taking attendance or recording the Ayes and Noes on any question to be voted upon, the electronic roll call system shall be used, unless it is inoperative, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules. This rule may be suspended by a majority of the members present in which case the roll shall be called in accordance with Rule 10.
- C. When the Senate is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call and the vote is to be taken by the electronic roll call system, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "You have heard the (motion or third or final reading) of (the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote no. The system is now open. The Senate will now proceed to vote."
- D. If a Senator declines to vote, the Senator shall state the reasons therefor as required by Rule 15-B and the system shall not be closed until every Senator who is present has voted, explained the reason for not voting or been excused from voting.
- E. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "Have all the Senators voted? The system will now be closed. The system is now closed. The Secretary will now record the vote."
- F. A Senator may change his vote after the roll call system has been closed and before announcement of the result, and not thereafter.
- G. The Secretary of the Senate shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall confirm the result to the Presiding Officer, who shall announce the same to the Senate. The Secretary shall enter the vote in the Journal.
- H. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member.
- I. When a vote is being taken by the electronic roll call system, this rule supersedes any provision in the Senate Rules inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 16 Order of Business

- A. Unless otherwise ordered, the Senate shall convene every legislative day at a time certain as determined by the President, receive a prayer by the chaplain, recite the pledge of allegiance and continue in session until recess or adjournment.
  - B. The order of business shall be as follows:

Roll Call
Reading of the Journal
Business on the President's Desk
Petitions, Memorials, and Remonstrances
Orders of the Day
Introduction and First Reading of Bills
Reference of Bills
Second Reading of Bills
Reports of Standing Committees
Reports of Select Committees
Committee of the Whole
Report of the Committee of the Whole
Third Reading of Bills
Other Business of the Senate

- C. The President shall, upon each day, announce to the Senate the business in order, agreeable to the order of business contained in subsection B of this rule; and no business shall be taken up or considered until the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order, nor after the order to which it belongs is closed, except by order of the Senate. All questions relating to the order of business shall be decided by a majority of the members present without debate.
- D. Every bill shall be read by sections on three different days, unless two-thirds of the Senate deem it expedient to dispense with this rule. The vote on the final passage of any bill or joint resolution shall be taken by Ayes and Noes on roll call. Final passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the Senate.
- E. The Presiding Officer shall give notice at each reading, whether it be the first, second or third reading, and a Journal entry of the same shall be made by the Secretary.

#### RULE 17 Committee of the Whole; Additional Committee of the Whole

- A. In forming a Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside. The chairman so appointed shall preserve and maintain order.
- B. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken up in regular order, or in such order as the committee may determine by a suspension of the rules, unless the order of the bill to be considered was determined by the Senate at the time of going into committee, but bills for raising revenue and the general appropriations bill shall have precedence.
- C. A majority of the members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.
- D. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole so far as applicable.
- E. In the Committee of the Whole, bills and resolutions shall be read by the Secretary and considered item by item, unless otherwise ordered by the committee, leaving preambles or titles to be last considered. The body of a bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but amendments shall be noted by the chairman or Secretary upon a separate piece of paper and reported to the Senate.

- F. The proceedings of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken down by the Secretary of the Senate, acting as the Secretary of the Committee of the Whole. The chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall in the chairman's report set forth all actions of the Committee of the Whole.
- G. When a bill or resolution is considered in the Committee of the Whole, the only regular motions which are in order are the following:
  - 1. To propose amendments.
  - 2. To limit debate.
  - 3. To recommend.
  - 4. To rise and report.
  - 5. That the bill or resolution retain its place on the calendar.
  - 6. That the bill or resolution be retained on the calendar.
- H. A roll call vote shall be taken when a motion to recommend is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.
- I. No proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.
- J. A motion to amend the Committee of the Whole report shall not be in order unless the proposed amendment to the report has been voted on in the Committee of the Whole.
- K. The Senate may by a majority vote of the members present bring a bill, memorial or resolution otherwise designated as available for third reading to Committee of the Whole for amendment or further amendment, except no proposed amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material is in order.

## RULE 18 Sitting as in Committee of the Whole

The Senate may by majority vote of the members present sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of any subject except if the subject is a bill, memorial or resolution which has been considered in Committee of the Whole, the consideration shall be limited to technical changes.

#### RULE 19 Journals

- A. The proceedings of the Senate and of the Committee of the Whole shall be briefly and accurately stated in the Journal. Titles of all bills, resolutions and measures, and such parts as shall be affected by proposed amendments, readings, references, reports and every vote, motion and roll call, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial or paper presented to the Senate shall be entered on the Journal.
- B. All confidential legislative and executive proceedings and the proceedings when sitting as a Court of Impeachment, shall be recorded in a separate book.
- C. The protest or remarks of any Senator and reasons therefor shall be entered on the Journal, if presented in writing, but no protest or remarks shall exceed two hundred words in length without the consent of the Senate.

## RULE 20 Proceedings on Nominations

- A. When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State to the Senate, they shall, unless otherwise ordered, be referred to appropriate committees, and a standing committee. If the nomination is referred to the Rules Committee, the committee, upon consideration, may recommend to the President that the nomination be further referred to another standing committee or may place the nomination on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate. If the Rules Committee recommends that the nomination shall be placed on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate, the Rules Committee recommendation shall be dated and placed on each member's desk. If a member wishes during the first seven calendar days after action by the Rules Committee to object to the inclusion of the nomination without a hearing by a standing committee other than the Rules Committee, the member may do so by filing a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the seven day period. If a protest is filed, the President shall remove the nomination from the list and assign the nomination to an appropriate standing committee other than the Rules Committee. No nomination placed upon the list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate shall be considered by the Senate until said nomination has remained on the list for seven calendar days. When a nomination is brought before the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put on the same day on which the nomination is received nor on the day on which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- B. Nominations confirmed or rejected by the Senate shall not be returned to the Governor by the Secretary until the expiration of the time limit for making a motion to reconsider the same, or while a motion to reconsider is pending, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present.

#### RULE 21 Messages

- A. Messages from the Governor of the State, or from the House of Representatives, may be received at any stage of proceedings, except while the Senate is dividing, or while the Journal is being read, or while the question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending.
- B. Messages shall be sent to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, who shall previously certify the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions and other measures which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested, and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor of the State all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to him by the Senate.

#### RULE 22 Amendments of the House

- A. Any amendment by the House to any Senate bill shall be subject to one of the following motions or actions:
  - 1. Concur in House amendment.
- 2. Refuse to concur in House amendment and appointment of Conference Committee, free or simple.
- 3. The President may refer the bill with the House amendment to a committee for study and recommendations of concurrence or refusal to concur.
- B. Any amendment by the House which includes the addition of the emergency clause shall require a two-thirds vote of the members of the Senate for final passage with the emergency clause.

## RULE 23 Conference Committees and Reports

- A. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the bill, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising, or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material.
- B. Every conference report shall be accompanied by a detailed statement sufficiently explicit to inform the Senate what effect such amendments or propositions, if any, will have upon the measure to which they relate. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk a reasonable time before consideration of the report. The presentation of reports of committees of conference shall always be in order, except when the Journal is being read or a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending, or while the Senate is dividing; and when received the question of proceedings to the consideration of the report, if raised, shall be immediately put, and shall be determined without debate.
- C. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.
- D. A Free Conference Committee report on a bill which includes conference amendments may, upon the filing of the report in the Secretary of the Senate's office, be reassigned by the President to the Committee on Rules. If assigned to the Committee on Rules, the Committee on Rules shall consider such report for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of conference amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- 1. The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- 2. The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - 3. The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- 4. The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- E. Except as provided herein, conference committees shall consider a bill prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No conference committee shall meet to consider a bill after such time without the written permission of the President.

#### RULE 24 Parliamentary Practice and Procedure

Parliamentary practice and procedure in the Senate shall take precedence in the order listed:

- 1. Constitutional provisions.
- 2. Senate Rules.
- 3. Statutory rules and provisions.
- 4. The rules of parliamentary practice and procedure as contained in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.
  - 5. Senate customs and usages.
  - 6. General parliamentary law.

#### RULE 25 Privileges of the Floor

- A. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, no person except members and officers of the Senate shall have the privileges of, or be admitted to the floor of the Senate Chamber at any time; provided, that the President may grant the privileges of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the Senate, to ex-members of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and employees of the Senate. When the Senate is not in formal session, the President, upon application of a Senate Committee, may grant the use of the Chamber to such committee for a time certain for the purpose of holding committee hearings.
- B. For the purpose of addressing the membership of the Senate while in session, the President may, upon request, approve such dignitaries as:
  - 1. The President or past Presidents of the United States.
  - 2. Members of the present United States Cabinet.
- 3. Ambassadors of or to the United States, and all present United States Senators and Congressmen.
  - 4. The present Governor of Arizona.
  - 5. The present Governor or Head of any other domestic or foreign state.

All other dignitaries may be introduced from the gallery or may be granted speaking time other than when the Senate is in session.

- C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the Senate is in closed executive session or the Senate or President shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the rules of the Senate.
- D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the President of the Senate and revocable at the discretion of the President of the Senate. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the President of the Senate for a pass, and shall accompany the application with a statement of facts of the representative's press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or news gathering organization with which the representative is connected, for such pass. Not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other accredited newspaper or news gathering organization.

#### RULE 26 Legislative Representatives

- A. Any person desiring to be heard concerning legislation in behalf of any person, firm, association, organization, company or corporation shall first make application in writing to the chairman of the committee, stating the bill the person desires to present arguments upon, and whom the person represents.
- B. The chairman may issue a permit which shall give such person the right to file with the committee having under consideration the bill or legislation regarding which the permit has been issued, written or printed briefs, statements or arguments. If so notified by the committee through its chairman, the person may appear before the committee in open public hearing and present arguments and testimony at the pleasure of the committee. Chairmen of committees shall, on request, give information regarding the holding of public hearings, and the time and place of the same, and committees may hold such public hearings as they desire.

#### RULE 27 Length of Session

- A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The President may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period of not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by the Senate by a majority vote of the members present.
- B. If not considered in the regular session the General Appropriations bill, the General Capital Outlay bill and the University Capital Outlay bill may be considered in a special session which shall be called only for those purposes.

#### RULE 28 Amendment of Rules; Suspension of Rules

- A. The Senate Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the Senate.
- B. The Senate Rules may be suspended by a vote of a majority of the members present.

#### RULE 29 Code of Ethics; Ethics Complaints

#### A. No member shall:

- 1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person any personal financial benefit, including any gift, for himself or another upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.
- 2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.
- 3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.
- 4. Enter into any contract with a public agency for the sale of goods or services or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity for the sale of goods or services, unless:
- (a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars, or
- (b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or
- (c) The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or
- (d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to article IV, part 2, section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.
- 5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.

- 6. Participate in any action of the Senate if the member has a substantial interest as defined in section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes.
  - B. For the purposes of this rule:
- 1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.
- 2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.
- 3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.
- 4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.
- 5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.
- C. The Senate Ethics Committee shall only receive ethics complaints that have been signed by a Senator and notarized.

#### RULE 30 Personal Financial Interest

- A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:
- 1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and
- 2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such statement shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.
- B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the Senate is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.
- C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall, in addition to the requirements of subsection A, state his decision and the underlying reasons therefor and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body.
- D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than five days from the date of the receipt of that request and be filed with the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such opinion shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.

#### E. For the purposes of this rule:

- 1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any bill, resolution, memorial, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the Senate.
- 2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.
- F. A member who has a substantial interest as defined by section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes, shall comply with title 38, chapter 3, article 8, Arizona Revised Statutes.

#### RULE 31 Caucuses

All meetings of a party caucus consisting of members of the Senate shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the Senate and meetings to discuss matters, including those permitted in executive session as set forth in section 38-431.03, Arizona Revised Statutes. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening party caucuses.

## RULE 32 Procedure on Records Retention and Destruction Schedule

A. Definitions. In this section the following definitions apply:

"Bill file" means a file containing materials relating to legislation as determined by the Senate Secretary.

"Custodian" means any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern, or legislative contractor who has primary custody and control over a record.

"Personnel records" means an employee's official record and documentation of the employee's employment.

"Record" means all books, papers, maps, photographs or other documentary materials, regardless of physical form or characteristics, including prints or copies of such items produced or reproduced on film or electronic media, made or received in pursuance of law or in connection with the transaction of public or legislative business and over which the custodian has custody and control and that is preserved or appropriate for preservation by the Senate as evidence of the organization, functions, policies, decisions, procedures, operations or other activities of the custodian, or because of the informational and historical value of data contained in the record.

"Reference value" means administrative, legal, fiscal, research, or historical value as reasonably determined by the custodian.

"State Library, Archives and Public Records (LAPR)" means the division of the Arizona Secretary of State that is the archives for Arizona state government, which is mandated by law to collect, preserve and make available to the public and all branches of government, permanent public records, historical manuscripts, photographs, and other materials that contribute to the understanding of Arizona history.

- B. Authority. AZ. Const. Art. IV, part 2, § 8 authorizes the legislature to determine its own rules of procedure which supersede any conflicting statutes.
  - C. General provisions.
- 1. Permanent records. As set forth below, at the end of the retention period with the legislature, the Senate Secretary or the Senate Secretary's designee must transfer to LAPR all records kept by the Senate Secretary, regardless of format, that have a retention period designated as permanent, unless otherwise instructed by LAPR. The Senate Secretary shall work with LAPR's established requirements for transfer.
- 2. Electronic records. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the custodian shall destroy electronic items not designated as having a retention period of permanent.
- 3. Paper files, records, and documents. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the Senate Secretary may destroy files that are primarily in paper format and may destroy other records, regardless of format, not designated as having a retention period of permanent.
- 4. No duty to migrate to new technology. The Senate Secretary is not responsible for migrating to new technology any record that is recorded in a format, such as CD and DVD that must be read by a computer.
- 5. Destruction of non-permanent records. When a paper record is eligible for destruction, the custodian shall take proper precautions to destroy the entire file, record, or document by shredding, burning, or pulverizing it. Electronic records shall be deleted from all electronic repositories in which they reside, including servers and hard drives. The custodian may keep a list, containing minimal information, capturing any destroyed items, so that the custodian knows that it has been destroyed and has not been merely misplaced or never existed.
- 6. Private electronic devices. An electronic message solely sent or received on and maintained on a private electronic device of any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern, or legislative contractor is not subject to public inspection.
- 7. Effective date. The provisions of this rule are applicable to files, records, and documents created before or after the adoption of this rule.
- D. Interpretation and enforcement. The maintenance, preservation and destruction of records will be governed solely and exclusively by the provisions of this rule. Any questions or disputes concerning the application of this rule to any specific record or subset of records will be resolved by the President, whose determination will be final. The provisions of this rule will be enforced solely and exclusively by the Senate in accordance with the rules of the Arizona Senate.
- E. Retention and disposition schedule. The following records retention periods are finite and absolute. They are *not* minimum retention periods or guidelines. Records may be kept beyond their designated retention periods only if they are relevant to any (1) ongoing administrative or litigation proceeding in which the Senate or the custodian is a party or the recipient of a third party subpoena or (2) pending or prospective administrative or litigation proceeding in which the Senate or the custodian reasonably anticipates it may become a party, or if the custodian believes the record has continuing reference value.

A custodian shall adhere to the following schedule of retention and destruction:

#### COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE GOVERNOR

On March 3, 2023, the Governor vetoed Senate Bill 1248 with the following message:

March 3, 2023

Senator Warren Petersen President of the Senate 1700 W. Washington Street

Re: SB 1248,

President Petersen,

Today, I vetoed SB 1248.

I appreciate the legislature's interest in the scope of practice expansion, and agree that we need to make the sunrise application process more effective, efficient, and fair. However, repealing the sunrise application for scope of practice expansion altogether without replacing it with a better mechanism will not address the underlying issues, and poses a threat to the health and safety of Arizonans.

The sunrise application process for scope expansions provides the legislature, health care practitioners, and the public an opportunity to weigh in on potential scope of practice expansions. As a legislator, I sat on the Committee of Reference that reviews scope of practice expansions for providers, and know how powerful this Committee can be when our legislators engage fully and openly in the process.

Scope of practice expansions are serious matters that should be considered with a critical eye to preserve the health and safety of our constituents. Some expansions provide authority to prescribe dangerous and/or addictive substances, to perform medical procedures, or to practice medicine with less supervision. Some are much more mundane, but that does not mean that they should not be held to some level of scientific and public health scrutiny.

Without the sunrise application process, provider groups could fast-track their priorities through the legislative process without adequate attention to why the change is necessary, or if it will impact communities with the greatest needs.

While I am vetoing this effort to do away with the sunrise process altogether, I am committed to working with the legislature and our healthcare provider communities to identify an alternative pathway toward scope of practice expansion. I hear the concerns of providers hoping to expand care in communities where it is most needed, and I am committed to helping promote a culture of health in Arizona.

It's clear that there is an imbalance of power between high-level and low-level providers, and that the current structure of our boards and commissions does not provide equal weight to their professional and financial interests. I welcome ideas to rebalance and right-size our regulatory boards and commissions, as well as policy solutions that will reduce the regulatory and administrative burden on health care provider groups.

We can and we should work together to identify health policy opportunities that will promote equitable access to care.

## INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1021

Senate Concurrent Resolution 1021 was introduced and read in full by Senator Kavanagh as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution supporting Taiwan's international participation and a closer partnership between the United States and Taiwan in trade and exchanges of officials.

Whereas, the trade in goods between the United States and the Republic of China (Taiwan) totaled an estimated \$114 billion in 2021, with \$36.9 billion in exports and \$77.1 billion in imports, ranking Taiwan as the eighth largest trading partner of the United States. Overall, Taiwan supports an estimate of more than 375,288 jobs in the United States; and

Whereas, on December 19, 2019, 161 Members of Congress signed a letter to the then United States Trade Representative, while 50 United States Senators signed a separate letter to him on October 1, 2020, both encouraging the United States government to work toward initiating negotiations on a bilateral trade agreement with Taiwan; and

Whereas, on June 1, 2022, the Minister without Portfolio of the Republic of China and United States Deputy Trade Representative announced the launch of the U.S.-Taiwan Initiative on 21st-Century Trade, which will facilitate the development of a roadmap for negotiations on economic and trade agreements with high-standard commitments; and

Whereas, Taiwan was Arizona's eighth largest export market in 2021, reaching \$621 million in total United States exports to Taiwan originating from Arizona. In total, more than 7,895 jobs in Arizona are supported by Taiwanese-affiliated companies and the exports of goods and services to Taiwan; and

Whereas, Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company has begun construction of its \$12 billion 5-nanometer fab in Phoenix, with chip production slated to start by 2024. This new factory will create 1,900 full-time jobs in Arizona over a five-year period; and

Whereas, Taiwan's Bureau of Foreign Trade, the Ministry of Economic Affairs and the Arizona Commerce Authority signed the Memorandum of Understanding on Trade and Economic Cooperation on October 5, 2021, aiming to foster further economic engagement and to establish or expand operations and supply chains cooperation between Taiwan and Arizona; and

Whereas, on July 12, 2013, the President of the United States signed into law H.R. 1151, an act supporting Taiwan's participation as an observer in the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO); and

Whereas, on March 18, 2016, the President of the United States signed into law S. 2426, an act directing the Secretary of State to develop a strategy to obtain observer status for Taiwan in the International Criminal Police Organization (INTERPOL); and

Whereas, on March 26, 2020, the President of the United States signed into law S. 1678, an act stating that it should be the policy of the United States to advocate, as appropriate, for Taiwan's membership in all international organizations in which statehood is not a requirement and in which the United States is also a participant, and for Taiwan to be granted observer status in other appropriate international organizations; and

Whereas, the United States Secretary of State issued a statement on October 26, 2021, encouraging all United Nations (UN) Member States to join us in supporting Taiwan's robust, meaningful participation throughout the UN system and in the international community; and

Whereas, the Arizona Legislature passed resolutions in support of Taiwan's participation in international organizations, including INTERPOL and UN specialized agencies such as the World Health Organization (WHO), the ICAO and the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) in 2012, 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022; and

Whereas, the Taiwan Travel Act, signed into law by the President of the United States on March 16, 2018, allows officials at all levels of the federal government to travel to Taiwan to meet their Taiwanese counterparts and allows high-level Taiwanese officials to enter the United States under conditions that demonstrate appropriate respect to such officials.

#### Therefore

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona, the House of Representatives concurring:

- 1. That the Members of the Legislature support the negotiation of a United States-Taiwan bilateral trade agreement and Taiwan's meaningful participation in international organizations, including ICAO, INTERPOL, WHO and UNFCCC.
- 2. That the Members of the Legislature acknowledge the achievements made by Arizona and Taiwan in the fields of economy, trade, technology, education and culture since establishing their sister-state relations on July 28, 1980, and encourage the continued bilateral cooperation and exchanges between the two sides in the future.
- 3. That the Members of the Legislature support a future official visit to Taiwan by the Governor of Arizona at her discretion.

Senator Kavanagh moved that Senate Concurrent Resolution 1021 be unanimously adopted. The motion carried.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 1021 was signed in open session. The Secretary recorded the action and transmitted the Resolution to the House.

# INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1020

Senate Concurrent Resolution 1020 was introduced and read in full by Senator Hatathlie as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of the Honorable James Henderson, Jr.

The Honorable James Henderson, Jr. passed away on December 30, 2022 in Gallup, New Mexico, at the age of 80.

Born on May 15, 1942 in Ganado, Arizona, James Henderson, Jr. was a member of the Navajo Nation who spent his life in service to his community and the Navajo people. After graduating from Riverside Indian School in Anadarko, Oklahoma, in 1963, he was drafted into the United States Army and served in the Vietnam War from 1966 to 1968. He was awarded the Purple Heart after being wounded in battle.

After being honorably discharged from the service, James Henderson, Jr. attended Utah State University then embarked on his career in public service, working for the Arizona Department of Economic Security and the Bureau of Indian Affairs. He also served the Navajo Nation as the Director of Range Management and the Director of Tribal Legislative Affairs, and he served as the national commander for the Navajo Nation's veterans' organization. In all, James Henderson, Jr. served as a dedicated and effective employee of the Navajo Nation for 30 years. In 1985 James Henderson, Jr. was elected to serve as a member of the Arizona State Senate, and throughout his seven terms of legislative service, he served the constituents of district 3 with dedication and tenacity. He was known as a strong advocate for veterans, including at the national level, as well as for elderly individuals and youth. Senator Henderson earned the well-deserved reputation as a conscientious and effective public servant and was respected by his peers on both sides of the political aisle.

# INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 2044

House Concurrent Resolution 2044 was introduced and read in full by Senator Kern as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution recognizing the Assyrian Genocide.

Whereas, the denial of genocide is widely recognized as the final stage of genocide, enshrining impunity for the perpetrators of genocide and demonstrably paving the way for future genocides; and

Whereas, the Ottoman Empire committed the crime of genocide against the Assyrian people, killing at least 300,000 innocent Assyrians and more than one million Armenians, Greeks and other Christians by way of mass executions, death marches, torture and starvation during the First World War; and

Whereas, the Elie Wiesel Genocide and Atrocities Prevention Act of 2018 establishes that atrocities prevention represents a United States national interest and affirms that it is the policy of the United States to pursue a government-wide strategy to identify, prevent and respond to the risk of atrocities by strengthening diplomatic response and by effectively using foreign assistance to support appropriate transitional justice measures, including criminal accountability for past atrocities; and

Whereas, the majority of the Assyrian population was displaced from their homes and forced to escape to neighboring and faraway communities and countries, with many refugees fleeing to the United States. Today, Arizona is honored to be home to a vibrant population of more than 25,000 Assyrian-Americans. This thriving community is a proud reminder of survival and perseverance in the face of extreme injustice; and

Whereas, the most notable victim of this tragic period was the ethno-martyr and Catholicos Patriarch Mar Benyamin Shimun XXI, the leader of the Assyrian Nation and Church; and

Whereas, the Assyrian Genocide remains unrecognized by many countries and organizations across the globe, including the United States.

Therefore

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Arizona, the Senate concurring:

- 1. That the members of the Legislature affirm that it is the duty of the United States to:
- (a) Commemorate the Assyrian Genocide through official recognition and remembrance.
- (b) Reject efforts to enlist, engage or otherwise associate the United States government with denial of the Assyrian Genocide or any other genocide.
- (c) Call on the government of Turkey to acknowledge the genocides against these mentioned populations, to issue a formal apology and to take prompt and meaningful steps toward restitution.
- (d) Encourage education and public understanding of the facts and relevance of the Assyrian Genocide in comparison to modern-day crimes against humanity.
- 2. That the Members of the Legislature acknowledge that the Ottoman Empire's campaign against its Christian minorities that occurred between 1914 and 1923 constituted genocide against Assyrians, Armenians and Greeks.

Senator Kern moved that House Concurrent Resolution 2044 be unanimously adopted. The motion carried.

There are people alive on the island of Ireland today because of the continuous bipartisan support for the Good Friday Agreement over the last 25 years of State Legislators, successive United States Presidents, the United States Senate, United States House of Representatives, and elected officials working in partnership with the Government of the United Kingdom and the Government of Ireland, and

WHEREAS, we honor the Good Friday Agreement, on this year of the 25th anniversary of its ratification, as the framework for lasting peace in Northern Ireland, and

WHEREAS, the Good Friday Agreement represented a landmark breakthrough that provided Ireland with a political framework to address its future, and

WHEREAS, the Good Friday Agreement acknowledged the right of differing political traditions to pursue their goals of remaining part of the United Kingdom or of Irish Unity, and

WHEREAS, the Good Friday Agreement demonstrated democratic and peaceful means of resolving differences, and

WHEREAS, we recognize the British and Irish Governments ongoing support and implementation of the Good Friday Agreement. It is the irrevocable Foundation of the peace process regardless of the United Kingdom's status regarding the European Union, and

WHEREAS, despite the historic progress of the Good Friday Agreement and subsequent agreements, important issues remain unresolved in Northern Ireland, including securing justice for victims of state-sponsored violence and other violence and providing for the rights of all sections of the community, and

WHEREAS, members of both political parties in the United States came together to support the Good Friday Agreement, and

WHEREAS, on the 17th of March during the annual celebration of the feast of Saint Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, Irish Americans joins with men, women, and children of all ethnic origins for one day become Irish and celebrate Saint Patrick and this year we also celebrate and give thanks for the 25th Anniversary of The Good Friday Peace Agreement, and

WHEREAS, 2023 also marks the 175th anniversary of the first flying of the Irish flag by Thomas F Meagher who embodied the links between Ireland and The United States of America.

WHEREAS, in one lifetime Thomas F Meagher ran for election to the City Council in Waterford, Ireland led the rebellion for freedom from British rule in Ireland in 1848, was sentenced to death, which was commuted to transportation for life in prison in Australia, from where he escaped, he became a brigadier general in the 69th Regiment of the famous 'Fighting Irish Brigade' and fought in some of the bloodiest battles of the American Civil War including Fredericksburg and Antietam. Meagher also became a friend of President Abraham Lincoln. He went on to become the acting governor of Montana and died in mysterious circumstances at the age of 43.

WHEREAS, we request that the United States Senators and Members of the House of Representatives from this State inform themselves in relation to bipartisan resolution in Congress regarding Ireland, the Good Friday Peace Agreement, and the Irish Peace Process.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Arizona State Senate, Senator John Kavanagh and Senator Frank Carroll that we celebrate the flag of Ireland as a symbol of the link between the United States and Ireland and we celebrate it as a symbol of peace.

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of the honorable Jack Jackson, Sr.

The Honorable Jack Jackson, Sr. passed away on March 5, 2023 at the age of 90.

Jack Jackson and his identical twin brother, Dean, were born in Leupp on the Navajo Nation in 1932. They were Diné born of the Kinyaa'áanii (Towering House) Clan, born for the Áshijhí (Salt People) Clan. Jack graduated from the Chilocco Indian Vocational High School in Oklahoma before going on to earn both bachelor's and master's degrees from Northern Arizona University. In high school, he and Dean achieved success as basketball players and were introduced to the rodeo, which they continued to participate in on their return to Arizona. In addition to competing in calf and team roping events, they founded the All Indian Rodeo Cowboy Association, which continues to support Native rodeo competitors today.

After his college graduation, Jack Jackson served as a teacher at Window Rock High School, teaching social studies, health and physical education. He later served as athletic director, director of student affairs and head basketball coach at Diné College, then known as Navajo Community College, and later served as director of the Office of Diné Education and Philosophy. In all his endeavors as an educator and coach, Jack Jackson stressed the importance of Navajo youth pursuing their education, believing that this would help the Navajo people prosper and thrive.

Additionally, Jack Jackson served as executive director of the Navajo Nation Health Authority in the Office of Student Affairs and Native Healing Sciences, a role that led him to become a medicine man. He was ordained in the Female Windway Ceremony and the Bowguard Ceremony and was a founder of the Navajo Traditional Healing Service Practitioners and Medicine Men Association.

Jack Jackson, Sr. went on to represent the Fort Defiance Agency on the Navajo Nation Council from 1980 until 1984, when he decided to run for a seat in the Arizona House of Representatives. He served in that capacity for 14 years before winning a seat in the Arizona Senate, where he served nearly six more years. As a legislator, Jack Jackson was instrumental in establishing the Arizona Indian Legislative Day, which continues to be held each year to provide Arizona's 22 tribal governments an opportunity to voice their unique concerns at the Capitol. Additionally, Senator Jackson worked tirelessly for passage of a bill to provide critical funding for Diné College and other tribal educational institutions. He was proud to serve Arizonans in the legislature alongside his son, former Representative Jack Jackson, Jr. for several years.

In his various roles as educator, legislator, rodeo cowboy, medicine man, rancher, athlete and coach, Jack Jackson, Sr. fiercely defended the Diné way of life and worked diligently to preserve Navajo beliefs, traditions, language and culture. His dedication and compassion to his work earned him the respect and admiration of all who had the privilege of knowing and working with him over the years, and he leaves behind a great legacy that will long benefit future Navajo generations.

Jack Jackson, Sr. is preceded in death by his wife, Eloise, his brother, Dean, and a daughter, Janice, and he is survived by his children, Ronald, Jack, Jr. and Florinda, five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. He will be greatly missed by his loving family and friends, the Navajo people and the citizens of Arizona.

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Arizona, the Senate concurring:

That the Members of the Legislature express their regret at the passing of the Honorable Jack Jackson, Sr. and extend their deepest condolences to the Navajo people and to his surviving family members.

# INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 2047

House Concurrent Resolution 2047 was introduced and read in full by the Reader as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution honoring and remembering United States Army Specialist Lori Ann Piestewa on the twentieth anniversary of her death.

Whereas, Lori Ann Piestewa, a member of the Hopi Tribe, was born in Tuba City, Arizona, on December 14, 1979 to Terry Piestewa, a Hopi Native American, and Priscilla Baca, who is of Mexican descent; and

Whereas, Lori Piestewa was given the name Qotsa-Hon-Mana (kotsa hon mana), which translates to White Bear Girl, with her surname, Piestewa, deriving from the Hopi language root meaning "water pooled in the desert by a hard rain"; and

Whereas, those who knew her described Lori Piestewa as having a strong sense of duty to the people around her, always doing what was right and having a strong ethical and moral code; and

Whereas, in March 2001, Lori Piestewa enlisted in the United States Army and left for basic training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. She was assigned to the 507th Maintenance Company in Fort Bliss, Texas, where she rose to the rank of Private First Class; and

Whereas, on March 19, 2003, President George W. Bush ordered the invasion of Iraq as part of the global war on terror. As this was the first war in which American women could actively participate in combat units, Lori Piestewa was deployed to fight for her country as part of the 507th Maintenance Company; and

Whereas, three days later, on March 23, Lori Piestewa's convoy ran into an ambush and came under a torrent of fire that included a rocket-propelled grenade that caused her fatal crash. Lori Piestewa became the first Native American Woman to die in combat while serving in the United States military and the first woman in the United States military to be killed in the Iraq War; and

Whereas, Lori Piestewa left behind her parents and two children. Her son, Brandon Whiterock, explains that the Hopi people strive for harmony, so her final moments were not a violent struggle for survival, and there is some comfort, however small, in knowing that Lori Piestewa died trying to help her friends escape; and

Whereas, Lori Piestewa was awarded the Purple Heart and Prisoner of War Medal and was promoted posthumously to Specialist for the bravery, dedication and fearlessness she showed while serving her country; and

Whereas, Lori Piestewa's family has joined other Gold Star Families to mark the twentieth anniversary of the ambush at Nasiriyah on March 23rd this year with the Piestewa Fallen Heroes Memorial with a sunrise ceremony to honor our fallen heroes.

### Therefore

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Arizona, the Senate concurring:

That the Members of the Legislature honor United States Army Specialist Lori Ann Piestewa and the Piestewa Fallen Heroes Memorial and encourage the citizens of Arizona to commemorate the tremendous bravery and patriotism of individuals such as she who made the ultimate sacrifice for our country.

# INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 2048

House Concurrent Resolution 2048 was introduced and read in full by Senator Kerr as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of Joe Hart.

The Honorable Joe Hart passed away due to complications from kidney disease at the age of 78 on September 11, 2022 in Cedar City, Utah.

Born on May 8, 1944 in Kingman, Arizona, Joe was a fourth-generation Arizonan and a lifelong resident of Mohave County. He was the seventh child of Kenneth Hart and Helen McDermott and spent his childhood days riding his horse around Kingman and sitting at his mother's diner "The Chocolate Shop," which was located on Fourth Street. His parents taught him the value of a hard day's work, and that work ethic served him well as he followed in his family's legacy of working in the mining business.

Joe eloped with Rhonda Kay Reeves on September 4, 1967 in Las Vegas, Nevada, and their marriage was eventually sealed in 1972 in the St. George, Utah Temple. Together they raised four daughters who were affectionately known as the "Hart Girls."

Joe worked at the Duval Mine for 20 years as a safety foreman and considered his crew like a second family. Beginning in the 1970s, he began to spend his weekends and evenings ranching with his mentor, Flay Peterson. When Flay retired in 1979, Joe and Rhonda bought his business, the Black Mountain Cattle Company. Riding horses and ranching continued to be passions he held for the rest of his life.

In 1984, Joe and Rhonda bought their first radio station in Kingman, eventually adding two more radio and two television stations to their broadcasting company, and through these businesses they were able to connect to and serve their community. Joe's love of country music and natural ability to speak with people led him to interview some of the genre's greatest stars, including Johnny Cash, Merle Haggard and Reba McEntire.

Joe was elected in 1992 to the Arizona House of Representatives where he served for ten years. He was selected as Speaker Pro Tempore and served as chairman on several committees, including Public Institutions, the Environment and Government Operations. His time spent in the Legislature involved some of his most cherished memories, and he counted many of the members as his closest friends. He was passionate about western states' issues such as protection of property and water rights, agriculture, mining and transportation. Joe served on the Interstate 11 Commission and helped to designate Highway 93 as part of the NAFTA trade corridor.

With a well-timed appearance at the Capitol of his ever-popular cattle roping machine, Lightning, Joe was particularly popular when the end of a regular legislative session approached. As exhaustion grew and patience diminished, Joe's endearing affability encouraged legislators, staff, lobbyists and the governor to try their hand with the cowboy's lasso as conference committees, engrossing of bills and final negotiations concluded. This special sine die tradition did more than signal the end of the legislative session, it also disarmed contention, renewed the pioneering Arizona spirit, energized lawmakers to rally and embodied the love for one another that Joe dedicated his entire life to honor and maintain.

With his experienced career in the mining industry, it was only natural that Joe ran for Arizona State Mine Inspector, as Arizona is the only state that has an elected mine inspector position. He won his first election in 2006 and all his subsequent elections, serving as the first statewide elected official from Mohave County and as the eleventh Arizona State Mine Inspector, until his retirement in 2021. Joe's top priority was to make the State of Arizona safe for its residents to live, work and recreate, which led to his tireless effort to identify, fence and close abandoned mines.

Joe will be missed by his wife of 55 years, Rhonda, and his four daughters, Cari Jo, Trish, Jodi and Amy, his 11 grandchildren and his five great-grandchildren. He called all of them his "pride and joy" and considered himself the luckiest man in the world. Joe had many titles in his life, including miner, rancher, businessman, patriot, statesman and friend, but the ones he cherished the most were Sweetheart, Dad and Papa.

As this cowboy rides away, he will be remembered as a man of faith who dedicated his life to service to his family, friends, community, state and country. Thank you, Joe, for sharing your goodness with us.

Good ride, cowboy.

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Arizona, the Senate concurring:

That the Members of the Legislature sincerely regret the passing of Joe Hart and extend their most sincere sympathies and condolences to his surviving family and friends.

Speaker Toma,

I have vetoed HB 2056.

HB 2056 creates regulatory confusion and uncertainty by forcing an unnecessary conflict between state law and the federal determination of Waters of the United States (WOTUS).

This contradiction between state and federal law threatens the delegation of primary enforcement authority for the Clean Water Act that Arizona has received from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, creating a risk that regulatory programs would be removed from Arizona's control and handed back to the federal government.

Arizonans want elected officials to find real solutions to our water challenges. To this end, I look forward to working with the legislature on developing productive water policy.

As a social worker who spent years serving in Arizona's largest domestic violence shelter, I've seen first-hand the needs of victims seeking safety and stability. I encourage the legislature to focus on those needs, including increased funding for services and economic support for victims.

I have vetoed HB 2440.

The Arizona Corporation Commission's (ACC) rate-making authority is defined in statute and bolstered by a significant body of case law that already compels the ACC to consider reliability and affordability in decision-making. HB 2440 is unnecessary and creates regulatory uncertainty in instances where affordability and reliability may be at odds.

Arizona's families are facing increased energy costs, disproportionately impacting the most vulnerable in our communities. My administration is working toward solutions that put dollars back in Arizonans' pockets, like rebate programs that provide vital support for families at risk of being unable to pay utility bills, while incentivizing energy-efficient home improvements that lower those bills from the outset.

I urge the Legislature to work with me on finding solutions that deliver direct assistance to Arizona families struggling with energy costs.

I have vetoed HB 2472.

This bill is overly vague and should not be codified into law. It does not define "social credit scores," nor do these systems exist anywhere in the United States. If intended to protect against unfair lending practices, this bill is redundant with federal law and The Equal Credit Opportunity Act of 1974, 12 CFR 202.2 ("Regulation B"), which already outlaws discriminatory lending and provides clear parameters for credit decisions.

My Administration looks forward to working with the legislature to increase financial inclusion and access to capital for underserved communities. This bill does not address these challenges.

#### Arizona State Senate Legislative Resolution

Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week

WHEREAS, many people with serious mental health conditions, such as bipolar disorder, major depression, schizophrenia, and schizoaffective disorder, or gastrointestinal disorders, including gastroparesis, nausea, and vomiting, may be treated with medications that work as dopamine receptor blocking agents (DRBAs), including antipsychotics; and

WHEREAS, while ongoing treatment with these medications can be necessary, prolonged use can also lead to tardive dyskinesia (TD), an involuntary movement disorder that is characterized by uncontrollable, abnormal, and repetitive movements of the face, torso, and/or other body parts; and

*WHEREAS,* it is estimated that TD affects approximately 600,000 people in the U.S., and approximately 70% of people with TD have not been diagnosed, making it important to raise awareness about the symptoms and impact of TD because even mild symptoms of TD can have physical, social and emotional consequences; and

*WHEREAS,* it is important that people taking DRBA medication to be monitored for TD. Regular screening for TD in these patients is recommended by the American Psychiatric Association (APA); and

*WHEREAS*, clinical research has led to the availability of two treatments for adults with TD by the United States Food and Drug Administration; and

*WHEREAS,* the Senate can raise awareness of Tardive Dyskinesia in the public and medical community.

*NOW, THEREFORE,* be it Resolved, That the Arizona State Senate Designates May 1 - 7, 2023, as "Tardive Dyskinesia Awareness Week and encourages each individual in the United States to become better informed about and aware of Tardive Dyskinesia.

# INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1039

Senate Concurrent Resolution 1039 was introduced and read in full by Senator Alston as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of the Ted Williams.

Ted Williams, a long-term public servant and community leader in the State of Arizona, passed away on March 16, 2023 at the age of 79.

From 1975 to 1990, Ted Williams was a dedicated employee with the State of Arizona in a variety of roles, including service as a Special Assistant for six Arizona Governors. During his tenure as a state employee, he also served as a consultant in the development and implementation of the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System, as Director of the Arizona Department of Health Services and as Deputy Director of the Arizona Department of Transportation.

Following his years of service with the state, Ted Williams went on to become Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of Baptist Hospitals and Health Systems. Additionally, he served as Assistant County Manager for Maricopa County overseeing Environmental Quality Community Services and as Associate County Administrator of the Health Care Agency and Operations for Maricopa County.

After decades of public service, Ted Williams in 1999 founded and served as President and Chief Executive Officer of Arizona Behavioral Health Corporation (ABC) and the Arizona Foundation for Behavioral Health until his retirement in 2020. ABC provides quality, affordable housing and community services for persons with behavioral health needs and others with similar housing challenges in Arizona. Ted Williams was instrumental in efforts to reform the behavioral health system in the State of Arizona.

Ted Williams worked diligently throughout his lifetime to make a difference in the lives of those around him. He showed dedication, kindness and professionalism in all of his endeavors, and he earned the well-deserved respect and admiration of all who had the privilege of knowing and working with him over the years. He will be greatly missed by his family, friends, peers and the citizens of the State of Arizona.

Therefore

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona, the House of Representatives concurring:

That the Members of the Legislature express sincere regret at the passing of Ted Williams and extend their deepest sympathies and condolences to his family and many friends.

*WHEREAS*, only 29% of vocational rehabilitation case closures for participants with intellectual disabilities resulted in employment; and

*WHEREAS,* in 2018, only 16% of the funding that supported individuals with developmental disabilities was spent on integrated employment services; and

*WHEREAS,* in 2018, only 21% of working-age Arizonans receiving services from the Division of Developmental Disabilities were participating in competitive, integrated employment; and

WHEREAS, executive Order 2017-08 established Arizona as an Employment First state; and

*WHEREAS,* Employment First means that competitive, integrated employment should be the first and preferred choice available to individuals with disabilities who receive assistance from publicly funded systems; and

WHEREAS, competitive, integrated employment is work that is performed on a full-time or part-time basis and for which an individual: Is compensated at or above minimum wage and comparable to the rate paid to employees without disabilities who perform similar duties and with similar training and experience. Receives the same level of benefits provided to other employees without disabilities in similar positions. Is at a location where the employee interacts with other individuals without disabilities. Is presented with opportunities for advancement like other employees without disabilities in similar positions; and

WHEREAS, opportunities for individuals with disabilities to have meaningful and competitive employment will improve their quality of life, increase their community participation and empower them to make their own choices in life; and

WHEREAS, Arizona seeks to improve and coordinate efforts to increase competitive, integrated employment opportunities for Arizonans who have disabilities. SCR 1012 - 2 - 1

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Senate of the State of Arizona, and the House of Representatives concurring: That the Members of the Legislature affirm their support for Employment First, for the provision of services and support to persons who have disabilities, and for strengthening efforts to collaborate and increase employment opportunities for these individuals.

Today I vetoed HB 2442, which purports to address rural groundwater depletion through the establishment of "temporary non-expansion areas" (TNA). Unfortunately, HB 2442 would do very little to preserve the groundwater supplies that Arizonans rely upon.

Both the petition and designation threshold to create a TNA are higher than the requirements to establish a permanent Irrigation Non-expansion Area, despite providing far less protection to the aquifer. Among other troubling provisions, new irrigation with groundwater is only halted for five years, and the timeframe for grandfathering existing pumping is doubled.

Rural communities deserve meaningful options to protect their water future. HB 2442 falls short of this.

*WHEREAS,* today we remember and celebrate the life of Joseph "Jack" Holder, who passed away peacefully on February 24<sup>th</sup>, 2023, in Chandler at the age of 101 and was one of the last living survivors of the attack on Pearl Harbor; and

WHEREAS, Jack was born in Gunter, Texas, in 1921 and enlisted in the US Navy at the age of 18 and, after defending Ford Island from a makeshift machine gun pit, flew in the battles of Midway, Guadalcanal, and the Solomon Islands in the Pacific Theater and in defense of the English Channel and France in the European Theater; and

*WHEREAS,* Jack flew over 100 missions as a flight engineer on the PBY-5A Catalina and the B-24 Liberator earning several honors including two Distinguished Flying Cross Medals, six Air Medals, a Presidential Citation, and six Commendation Medals in his Navy career before being honorably discharged in 1948; and

*WHEREAS,* after the war, Jack continued his dream of flying for 25 years as a commercial pilot and began his lifelong love of golf, even becoming a professional golfer for a few years, before retiring in Chandler, Arizona; and

*WHEREAS,* for decades Jack did not discuss his wartime service until in his late eighties he took an Honor Flight to visit the World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C., where he became inspired to help tell the story of Pearl Harbor and authored a memoir of his experiences entitled "Fear, Adrenaline and Excitement"; and

*WHEREAS,* Jack became a passionate mentor and an avid WWII educator giving first-hand accounts of history to younger generations as a frequent speaker, well into his hundredth year, at schools, museums, and commemorative events across the nation.

*WHEREAS,* today we remember and celebrate the life of Dr. William Dallas Coats, who passed away peacefully on March 20, 2023, at the age of eighty-four years; and

*WHEREAS,* Bill, as he was known to all, was born on January 17, 1939, in Lima, Ohio, and attended Lima Senior High, where he met his beloved wife, Beverly (Reed) Coats. The high school sweethearts would have celebrated 62 years of marriage in June 2023; and

*WHEREAS,* Bill received a Bachelor of Science from Ohio University, a Master of Arts in educational psychology, and a Ph.D. in research design and data analysis in education from the University of Michigan; and

WHEREAS, Bill, a pioneer in creating educational choices and options for students historically underserved, founded Leona Group in 1996, drawing from his decades of experience as a school district superintendent in Michigan, Alaska, and Indiana. He used his experience as a full professor at Western Michigan University and the University of Michigan to envision and create a new type of public school. He named the organization after his mother, Leona, who was prohibited from attending school beyond the seventh grade due to societal norms at the time. She stands as a symbol of Leona Group's commitment to providing educational access to all students; and

WHEREAS, witnessing a dropout rate of 76% in Detroit public schools, Bill had a vision of creating a system of schools that removes barriers helping to create meaningful relationships for students in communities that typically are overlooked by the traditional educational system. After establishing schools in Detroit, Michigan, he brought that vision to Arizona when he saw similar challenges in the state's educational landscape. Focusing on high-need neighborhoods, he built and grew twenty-eight small public charter schools in Arizona and later established others throughout the country. Bill created responsive, student-centered schools designed to meet the "unique needs, hopes, and aspirations of the communities they serve"; and

*WHEREAS,* Bill was more than a trailblazer in public education; he was a mentor, colleague, and friend to the educators who now mourn his loss. His vision has enabled thousands of education professionals to enjoy meaningful, fulfilling careers. Under his leadership, Leona Group has produced tens of thousands of graduates in Arizona and across the country who are leading successful lives aided in part by their educational experience at a Leona Group school; and

*WHEREAS,* a loving husband, father, grandfather, and great-grandfather, Bill is survived by his beloved wife Beverly, 5 daughters, 17 grandchildren, and 1 great-grandchild; and

**WHEREAS,** Arizona owes Bill a debt of gratitude for his significant personal and economic investment in high-need communities and his relentless determination to improve life opportunities for every student by empowering them and redefining the possibilities in life.

President Petersen & Speaker Toma,

I have vetoed SB1331 and HB2332.

Ensuring the safety of our students is a responsibility that belongs to all of us. Since taking office, I have met with gun safety advocates to discuss acts of preventable gun violence happening in our schools, colleges, and universities.

Mandatory firearm safety training in schools is not the solution to gun violence prevention. This requirement could lead to immediate and long-term impacts on the health and wellbeing of students, teachers, and parents. Nor is it prudent to allow parents to carry concealed weapons on school campuses. Allowing more guns on campus will not make a campus safer. Firearms on campus have the potential to confuse law enforcement as they arrive at an active shooter situation.

I'm focused on finding concrete solutions to gun violence prevention that protect Arizona families, including but not limited to, policy focused on trauma-informed emergency planning and safe, secure gun storage.

This session, Representative Jennifer Longdon introduced HB2192, also known as Christian's Law. The bill would have required gun owners to keep either ammunition or guns in a locked storage container or in a device that would render them inoperable without a combination or a key. The majority party decided to not give HB2192 a hearing in committee.

I will continue fighting for public safety measures that protect our schools and Arizona families from senseless acts of gun violence.

President Petersen,

I have vetoed SB 1021. Though the bill was amended to relieve the Attorney General of the duty to defend the constitutionality of state laws if she provides notice to the Legislature at least 10 days before any substantive or dispositive filing is due, there are often cases in which such filings are due in less than 10 days (e.g., expedited election cases or preliminary injunction deadlines).

The Attorney General, like other elected officials, swears an oath to support the Constitution and laws of Arizona and the United States. The litigation choices made by the Attorney General are therefore dictated not only by state law, but also by this allegiance to the Constitution and her ethical duties as an attorney.

Unfortunately, the legislature has been known to pass laws that its own lawyers advise would not survive constitutional scrutiny. On occasion, the legislature has even passed laws intended to prompt litigation. Rather than change state law to require the Attorney General to defend laws even under such circumstances, I encourage the legislature to be more exacting in its deliberations to ensure fidelity to the Constitution.

# INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 2049

House Concurrent Resolution 2049 was introduced and read in full by the Reader as follows:

A Resolution on the death of Dr. Ann Weaver Nichols

Dr. Ann Weaver Nichols was born in 1942 and grew up in Los Angeles, California and attended John Marshall High School, originally thinking she would one day become a secretary. A good guidance counselor saw her potential and encouraged her to apply for a scholarship for first generation students, and she arrived at Stanford University as the first person in her family to attend college. She was active on campus with work study in the library and off campus in the Freedom Summer project, traveling to register voters on spring breaks and summers. Ann established a program to enable students to spend spring break in service, which eventually became institutionalized at Stanford and exists to this day as the Alternative Spring Break program. She spent a semester at the Stanford University campus in France and was active in the student YWCA.

While at Stanford, Ann attended Friends Quaker Meetings and met a young medical student, and the love of her life, Andy, in 1964, and the two married after their graduation in 1965. She and Andy joined the Peace Corps and spent two wonderful years in Peru where she taught community development.

Ann went on to earn both a masters and doctorate in social work from Colombia University. She continued to be involved in the YWCA and served on the national board from 1969-1982 and the World YWCA executive board in Geneva from 1975-1983, which culminated in Phoenix hosting the World YWCA General Assembly in 1987. She loved the global community of powerful women who were creating change.

After moving to Tucson in the fall of 1970, Ann joined the faculty of the Arizona State University (ASU) School of Social Work because there was no school of social work in Tucson. For years, with two small children in tow, she traveled up and down I-10 to teach classes in Tempe. She noticed that students were also commuting from Tucson to Tempe for classes, so in 1972 she began to teach a few courses in Tucson, even carrying course materials in the back of her station wagon. A full degree program was launched in 1978, and she became the first Director of the ASU School of Social Work program, Tucson component, and ran the program from 1978-2008. The thousands of students who studied with her got to know the power of her teaching. Many of the programs started in Southern Arizona began as class assignments that were designed to identify community needs, resulting in the much-loved Information and Resource Center and the Coalition of Human Services.

Ann's academic research was broad but uniformly focused on the power of people to create change. She wrote about restorative justice, people making policy and the role of forgiveness in public policy. She presented to the National Association of Social Workers (NASW) on working for change during tough times and on resilience and survival skills for activists. Her final major research and writing was on the macro-concepts of forgiveness and how to help nations transform after traumatic conflicts with possible forgiveness structures and exercises for organizations, communities and nations. She was awarded Social Worker of the Year by NASW, was presented a lifetime achievement award by the ASU School of Social Work and won the national Jefferson Award. Most recently, in November 2022, she received the Advocacy Award from the Center for Economic Integrity in recognition of her work on kinship care.

Annually Ann would create an "alternative budget" that involved tracking all the bills in the Arizona State Legislature and used that information to explain to others how the legislature could actually fully fund human services as part of a balanced budget. In 1996 and 2000, she worked tirelessly to help Arizonans get healthcare by supporting the Healthy Arizona Initiative.

Using her sabbaticals to promote social work around the world, Ann twice worked in Uganda with the YWCA and developed a community-based organizing movement across that country. In 2008, she retired after 39 years at ASU only to join the faculty at the Mindolo Ecumenical Foundation in Zambia teaching social work. For two years she helped update the national curriculum and taught community change. Her Zambian students in Kitwe are still running new programs that they created from taking part in her courses.

After returning to the United States and by her own personal experience, Ann developed a new passion-supporting grandparents raising grandchildren. She became the first Chair of the Arizona Grandparent Ambassadors, an advocacy network for grandparents who are raising their grandchildren and for other kinship network families. Among other more common advocacy awareness methods, every year the grandparents would write Valentine's Day cards and take cookies to the legislature to remind the members about the importance of kinship care families. In 2022, after seven years of lobbying, the legislature voted to provide additional support and funding for these families.

Ann pursued a life full of faith and passion. She and Andy were active members of First Christian Church as well as members of other faith organizations over the last 50 years. Her faith community had always been a source of strength and inspiration. She was the Chair of the International Social Workers and Spirituality Network, hosting four conferences that focused on social workers and on integrating faith practices with community needs. Ann spent years struggling against the death penalty. She wrote cards and letters to every single person on death row in Arizona since the 1990's and taught Alternatives to Violence courses in the federal prison, even co-authoring a textbook titled *Initiating Change in Organizations and Communities*.

Ann lost Andy in 2001, becoming a widow at 59 with three biological children and five adopted children. "Nana", as she was affectionately called, was known as the true matriarch of unconditional love and support. Ann is survived by her brother, Sam Weaver, and her children, Catherine, Michael and Miles Nichols, and Mardi, Nassau, Johnnary, Mexi and Haley Fiallos, and her 18 grandchildren. She loved all her children but especially loved all of her grandchildren.

# INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 2051

House Concurrent Resolution 2051 was introduced and read in full by the Reader as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of Ben Shelly.

Ben Shelly, former Navajo Nation president, passed away on March 22, 2023 at the age of 75.

Born on July 6, 1947, Ben Shelly grew up in Thoreau, New Mexico. He is of the Tó'aheedlíinii clan born for Ts'ah Yísk'ídnii. When he was born, he was told by elders that he would be a great leader, which would later come to fruition.

Ben Shelly lived in Chicago, Illinois for 16 years, training in heavy equipment maintenance and working as a supervisor for a heavy equipment company. Focused on transportation, he moved back to the Navajo Nation in 1976 where he owned a fleet maintenance and mechanic shop. Mr. Shelly entered public life in 1990, serving as chairman of the Dineh Rights Association. He went on to become a Navajo Nation Council delegate beginning in 1991, serving on the Transportation and Intergovernmental Relations Committees and chairing the Budget and Finance Committee where he helped to establish the Navajo Veterans Trust Fund with more than \$80 million. With the foresight he was known for, Mr. Shelly also campaigned for legalized gambling in Navajo areas. He later served as a McKinley County commissioner, concentrating on his area of expertise: transportation.

An innate leader, Mr. Shelly helped form a Native American coalition of officials from Arizona, Utah and New Mexico, giving them greater negotiating power. He served on the United States Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services Tribal Technical Advisory Group, leading efforts to amend Medicaid laws to ensure that a Certificate of Indian Blood could be used to verify U.S. citizenship. A fierce supporter of his people, he represented the Navajo Nation in budget discussions and formulations for federally funded programs, led a delegation in consultative budget deliberations with the U.S. Office of Management and Budget and worked with the New Mexico state legislature and governor's office to fund capital improvement projects on the Navajo Nation.

A bold and courageous trailblazer known for his passionate speeches, Mr. Shelly was elected Navajo Nation vice president in 2006. At the time of his selection, his running mate, Joe Shirley, Jr., said "he is down to earth and knows the heart of the people." In 2010, Mr. Shelly won the election for president, becoming the first New Mexican Navajo to become president and the first sitting vice president to ascend to the presidency. Mr. Shelly had extensive knowledge of the Navajo Nation's finances and an intricate understanding of the financial needs and challenges of each of its executive divisions. He led the Navajo Nation with an agenda of economic prosperity, infrastructure, open government, health and education.

Placing an emphasis on energy and technology, during his tenure as president Mr. Shelly signed an agreement with two renowned United States Department of Energy laboratories, approved the first solar farm on the Navajo Nation and renewed a major energy lease. During this time, the Navajo Nation also adopted a comprehensive energy policy, replacing a previous policy enacted in 1978. Mr. Shelly made technology a priority with the creation of a data center and the deployment of a fiber network across the Navajo Nation. He was influential and active in state and national politics, including serving as an advisor to the United States Department of Homeland Security and working closely with tribal leaders in asserting sovereignty, nationhood for tribes and progressive development.

Remembered for his great sense of humor and love for his community and family, Mr. Shelly's experience and career prepared him with the knowledge, tools, insights and understanding to serve exceptionally well as vice president and then president of the Navajo Nation. He built his reputation on advocating for ambitious infrastructure projects, policies focused on public health and methods of boosting the Navajo people's economic status. His legacy of commitment and passion earned him the respect of all who had the opportunity to know and work with him.

Ben Shelly is survived by his wife of 57 years, Martha, five children, 12 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Arizona, the Senate concurring:

That the Members of the Legislature express their regret at the passing of former President Ben Shelly and extend their deepest sympathies to his surviving family members.

We oppose House Bill 2802 (fentanyl sales; manufacture; sentencing; testing) because of the fundamental issues with the underlying bill, which the conference committee failed to address, in addition to the problematic nature of the amendment, which is a bill that had already attempted to move through the process but was held by the sponsor. This amendment is an attempt to circumvent the process and is the worst possible use for a conference committee.

This bill mandates a mandatory presumptive minimum sentence of 10 calendar years for individuals convicted of any of the following offenses involving a single dose of fentanyl having a weight of at least two milligrams: a) possession for sale; b) possession of equipment or chemicals for the purpose of manufacture; c) manufacture; or d) transporting or importing for sale or offering to transport or import for sale. If the individual has been previously convicted of one of these offenses, the mandatory minimum sentence is increased by 5 years. By lowering the threshold for these offenses to at least two milligrams, the legislation will greatly increase the number of individuals that could be sentenced to this mandatory prison sentence, as often an individual possessing or transporting a drug for sale may not know that it also contains fentanyl. The bill also largely ignores that individuals can develop a tolerance to fentanyl, increasing the number of doses a person possesses and consumes in a day, blurring the line on what law enforcement may see as possession for sale versus possession for personal use.

The amendment added to House Bill 2802 during the Conference Committee, formerly Senate Bill 1064, will further increase incarceration rates, adding an additional one year to any individual's any prison sentence if they knowingly sell or transfer fentanyl in the new "drug-free neighborhood zones," created by the amendment. This bill designates hundreds, if not tens of hundreds "drug-free neighborhood zones" across the State of Arizona, by defining the zones as an area within 300 feet of a hospital, nursing home, drug treatment center, mental and behavioral health facility or a public park and any of the accompanying grounds of such a location. It should also be noted that these areas are poorly defined and could

encompass any number of uses, for instance the term, "nursing home" is not defined in the section or elsewhere in the Arizona Revised Statutes and there is an open question as to what it could include.

Both the amendment and the underlying bill, especially when combined, will increase not only the state's incarceration rates, but the amount of time that an incarcerated person is sentenced to spend in prison. Arizona's prison growth rate already exceeded that of every other western state from 2000 to 2008, and from 1979 to 2010, the state saw increase in its prison population of 1000%. A 2010 Office of the Auditor General Performance Audit, documented the significant growth in the prison population and the state's spending, finding the Fiscal Year 2011 budget for Arizona Department of Corrections was \$949 million or 11.2% of the state's general fund. The audit explored alternatives to imprisonment, including expanding early release and diversion and access to non-prison alternatives such as drug treatment and home arrest.

This bill and the amendment are in stark contrast to the Legislature's recent deliberations on bills that expand alternatives which divert more nonviolent, low-risk offenders from prison or reduce their time in prison and expanding the use of non-prison alternatives for these offenders, such as home arrest.

This bill will not address the root causes of substance abuse. One thing is abundantly clear and has been shown time and time again—criminalizing drug use does not lower incarceration rates and it will not end overdose deaths. As policy makers, we should be focusing on harm reduction, things like providing drug treatment, educating about the deadly nature of fentanyl, making sure there is access to fentanyl test strips, providing emergency responders and members of the public access to Narcan which can reverse opioid overdose. Legislation like House Bill 2802 also has the potential to increase the impact of these drug policies that have been long recognized to be racially motivated and have only lead to the mass incarceration of Arizona residents.

SB1518, as amended by the conference committee, adds non-germane provisions that have already been vetoed by Governor Katie Hobbs. There is no reason to add the ballot images and cast vote record provisions to a bill that garnered broad bipartisan support in both chambers.

Supporters of the conference committee amendment language claim that its provisions will increase voter confidence in our elections, but they are simply wrong. The reason voters in Arizona - and around the country - do not trust our elections process is because there has been a coordinated, sustained attack - based on lies and conspiracy theories - on our democracy. The facts are clear: our elections are safe and accurate.

Moreover, making ballot images publicly available runs the risk of destroying the secrecy of the ballots. Voters often write on their ballots, either with messages or comments or by writing in their preferred candidate. These messages or a voter's handwriting can reveal the voter's identity without their consent. Rather than require redaction to protect voter privacy, the conference committee amendment provides a waiver of liability so that the elections officials cannot be held liable for revealing the voter's identity with their ballots. This is the wrong approach. Destroying voter privacy, even in one instance, is unacceptable.

Additionally, the conference committee amendment requires the secretary of state to make the ballot images and cast vote records available to the public not later than 48 hours after the county canvass. Not the statewide canvass, but the county canvass. This means that the ballot images will be publicly available before the vote has been certified. The conference committee amendment also extends the period for losing candidates to challenge the results of their election, which is likely to lead to a drastic increase in election challenges and attempts to deny certifying election results based off

unverified home "audits". This timing can only be explained as an attempt to spread doubt on the election before elections officials have completed their work. If the intent of releasing the ballot images and cast vote record is to provide confidence in the process, then they should be released after the election is certified. Not at a time when those who wish to disrupt our democracy can attempt to conduct their own "audit" of the results and cry foul when their favored candidate loses.

Senators Kerr and Kavanagh, Senate conferees, and Representatives Nguyen and Bliss, House conferees, submitted the following conference report on Senate Bill 1583:

That the Senate accept the House amendments and the bill be further amended.

We oppose Senate Bill 1583 (internet sex offender website; offenses) because of the Conference Committee's insistence that this bill remain retroactive.

The current sex offender communication notification law was implemented on June 1, 1996. Any person released from incarceration on or after this date is subject to community notification and those persons convicted prior to June 1, 1996, may be subject to community notification after completion of a risk assessment by a law enforcement agency.

The Arizona sex offender risk assessment¹ that is used to rank offenders into a level one, two or three tier considers 19 questions and scores accordingly. Level one offenders are not required to be listed on the sex offender website which requires an offense risk and recidivism risk score of no more than 20 or 19 respectively. This assessment considers the number of felony convictions where a third felony conviction receives an offense risk score of 8 and a recidivism risk of 10, or nearly half of the points that disqualify an offender for lower risk. It is not difficult to imagine that out of the 14,192² offenders currently estimated to be registered sex offenders that some of them plead down from a class 6 felony to a class 1 misdemeanor with the understanding that this plea would prevent them from being listed on the online sex offender website. For these individuals, this retroactivity clause would negate the terms of their plea deal. Not only is this unconscionable but it could also become very expensive for the state to relitigate or reexamine these cases.

One of the purposes of not including level one sex offenders on the registry is to allow those deemed unlikely to reoffend to not have to be subjected to the public shame and possible harassment that could come with being listed on the website. Because of this ranking system, there is the underlying assumption among Arizonans that if someone is listed on the website, they are dangerous. The retroactivity clause could expose an offender who committed their offense decades ago but who never reoffended to now be listed on the website for all their neighbors to see.

In addition to the conceptual arguments against the retroactivity clause, there is also a tangible opposition. The Arizona Department of Public Safety (DPS) believes that the current timeline given to complete the task is not only difficult, but downright impossible. They estimate an additional 4,634 cases will need to be reviewed to see if they meet the new qualifications included in this bill, in addition to the 15-20 normal caseload. DPS has reported that because of internal staffing issues and the turnover experienced at the Arizona Attorney General's office they are seeing an increase in the normal processing of the cases. There is no way for DPS to accurately estimate how long the new unfunded requirement would take but the guess at this time is in the years category, not months. An additional six months to complete the requirement does not even scratch the surface of the time that is needed. It could be expected that DPS will rise to the occasion when given this requirement but unfortunately this is an issue where expediting the process could result in mistakenly reporting someone on the website that should not be and ruining their lives.

# INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1043

Senate Concurrent Resolution 1043 was introduced and read in full by Senator Miranda as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of Teofilo Archuleta Tachias.

Teofilo "Tio" Archuleta Tachias, community leader, elected official and consultant, passed away on July 6, 2023 at the age of 87.

Tio, the youngest of 13 children, was born in Cabezon, New Mexico on November 4, 1935. At six years of age, he and his family moved to Flagstaff, Arizona. Tio attended South Beaver Elementary School, Flagstaff High School and Arizona's Teacher College, now Northern Arizona University. As a young man, he worked at one of the town's sawmills and in masonry to afford college while providing for his family. Later in life, he served as the business manager and treasurer at the local Ford dealership and as the assistant director of public relations and development at the Museum of Northern Arizona.

While Tio's career included various business endeavors, he especially enjoyed the world of politics, an interest that started at a young age. When he was 12, Tio witnessed President and presidential candidate Harry S. Truman deliver a rousing campaign speech at the train depot in Flagstaff. Toward the end, Truman pointed to Tio and said to him, "with your help, I will be elected President of the United States." For the next few weeks, Tio campaigned for Truman, knocking on doors, shaking hands and distributing flyers and campaign signs. Truman won the presidency in November 1948, and Tio beamed with pride for his role in the victory. This experience ignited Tio's passion for politics and community activism. A lifelong Democrat, Tio became the first Latino in Flagstaff to win a major election, beating the incumbent to serve as a member of the Coconino County Board of Supervisors, a position he held for 24 years. In the early 1980s, Tio was appointed to the Arizona Board of Regents, becoming the board president in 1984.

The impact of Tio's political career and community service reached beyond Flagstaff and northern Arizona. Over the years, he won numerous awards and recognitions, including the César Chávez Diversity Award in 2018 for his "outstanding community leadership and diversity." He also served on the national board of directors for the Public Broadcasting Service, was a founding member of the Coordinating Council on Mexican American Affairs and secured a seat on the Governor's Advisory Board on Economic Planning and Development. A strong advocate for tribal sovereignty and self-determination, Tio also worked closely with several Native Nations in Arizona. In 2016, the Arizona State Legislature honored him by reading into the record a tribute to Tio, which stated in part: "[Mr. Tachias] developed personal and political relationships with Arizona Governors Castro, Babbitt, Mofford and Napolitano and is widely regarded as the best person to identify, register and turnout new voters on the Navajo Nation. His work contributed to countless victories and helped thousands of new voters exercise their right to vote."

More important to him than his political pursuits, Tio loved visiting with family and friends, watching sports, playing the guitar, cooking award-winning fajitas and singing traditional Mexican folk songs. He also enjoyed telling stories of his past, including shining shoes and selling newspapers as a young boy to soldiers on the Santa Fe train, meeting Elvis Presley and Andy Griffith during his time at Ford, sharing a cocktail with former United States Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, hosting dinner at his home for Mexican American civil rights activist César Chávez and greeting renowned singer Vicente Fernández in Mexico. An avid reader and student of history, Tio also traveled extensively with his wife, Micha, to Europe, South America, Mexico and Canada and throughout the United States. Eager to share his adventures, Tio was a remarkable storyteller, and his ability to recall specific details and captivate his listeners remained with him throughout his life.

A true gentleman, Tio's calm and welcoming demeanor put people at ease, while his selfless, graceful and humble attitude won him the admiration of many. A loving and kind son, brother, husband, father, grandfather, uncle, cousin, nephew and friend, Tio is survived by his wife of 31 years, Micha, children, Christine (Willard) Gilbert, Sally (Tom) McMillian, Tommy (Laura) Tachias and Karen (Pat) Marez, stepchildren, Adriana (Ricardo), Alejandro and Leonardo Montiel-Cordova, brother, Ernesto Tachias, 13 grandchildren, 25 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his parents, Alfredo and Aniceta Tachias, his first wife, Elisa "Liz" Fajardo, six siblings, daughter, Gloria (Jerry) Dusek, and stepson Rafael Montiel-Cordova.

## INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1042

Senate Concurrent Resolution 1042 was introduced and read in full by Senator Miranda as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of Charles F. Long II.

Charles Franklyn "Chuck" Long II was born in Detroit, Michigan on June 1, 1945. He grew up with his brother, Hughey, and sister, Victoria, and attended elementary and middle school at Saint Thomas Military Academy, a military boarding school in Minnesota. He went on to graduate from Northern High School in Detroit in 1963. Chuck then pursued prelaw at Wilberforce University in Ohio before joining the United States Marine Corps in 1964.

Chuck completed basic training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot in San Diego, California, and was later stationed at Camp Lejeune in North Carolina. While serving two tours in Vietnam, from 1965 through 1967, he was aboard the U.S.S. Kitty Hawk aircraft carrier and tasked with helicopter combat rescue and support missions. On returning to the states, he continued his public service as a Marine Officer in Quantico, Virginia. Chuck retired from the Marines in October 1968 and became a police officer for the District of Columbia.

Chuck worked in radio while in the Marines, and as a civilian he established a successful career in communications and radio. He rose to local notoriety as a disc jockey for WOL and WOOK radio stations in Washington, D.C. during the 1970s. Motivated by the motorcycle accident that claimed the life of his only brother, Chuck used his local celebrity to launch the annual *Chuck Long Motorcycle Safety Parade*, which became wildly successful for nearly a decade.

In the 1980s, Chuck moved out west and began a career in film as a movie stuntman and extra. His film credits include "Glory," starring Denzel Washington, "Wyatt Earp" with Kevin Costner, "Tombstone" and "Bad Jim," in which he acted as a stunt double for Richard Roundtree.

Fueled by his passion for history and horses, Chuck founded America's Buffalo Soldiers Re-Enactors Association in 1986. The group strove to tell the story of the 9th and 10th Cavalrymen and 24th and 25th Infantrymen, who comprised the all-Black regiments of the United States Army known as the "Buffalo Soldiers." Chuck received numerous accolades in recognition of his dedication to and contributions in this endeavor, which spanned nearly three decades. Notably, General Colin Powell and Arizona's Congressman Ruben Gallego commended his outstanding achievements and service to the community. Additionally, Long served as a member of the Arizona Governor's African-American Advisory Council and the Arizona Film Commission.

Preceded in death by his parents and brother, Chuck Long is survived by his five children, Michelle, Carlton Washington (Trina), Charles (Leandra), Mikko (Kyle) and Mary (Ian), his grandchildren, Quinton (Althea), Ezra, Mecca, Cannon and Storm, and his great-grandsons, Phoenix and Koa. He will be greatly missed by all those who had the privilege of knowing him over his distinguished lifetime.





#### SENATE RULES

#### RULE 1 Officers and Employees

- A. The officers of the Senate shall be a President, who shall be chosen from among the membership of the Senate, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and a Sergeant at Arms.
- B. There shall be such other employees as may be authorized by the Senate. The appointment, terms and conditions of employment, compensation, discipline, and discharge of employees of the Senate shall be determined by the President, subject to the approval of the Senate. Employees of the Senate are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employees.

#### RULE 2 The President

The President shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. The President shall take the chair on every legislative day precisely at the hour to which the Senate, at its last sitting, adjourned; immediately call the members to order and on the appearance of a quorum, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read.
- B. The President shall have control of the Senate Chamber, including seating assignments of members therein, all other parts of the Senate wing and all other areas and buildings used exclusively by the Senate.
  - C. The President shall preserve and maintain order and decorum.
- D. The President shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the Senate, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by permission of the Senate.
- E. The President shall state all questions in the proper order in which they shall be disposed.
- F. When a question is undebatable or when debate on a question is closed, the President shall state the question, calling first for the "Ayes" and then for the "Noes". If the President is in doubt, or a division is called for, the Senate shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and then those in the negative. But on demand of two members a roll call of the Ayes and Noes shall be ordered at any time before such vote is made certain and declared.
- G. The President shall have the right to vote, and on all questions the President may vote last.
- H. The President shall have the right to name any member as President Pro Tempore to serve at the President's request, which appointment may extend throughout the session unless terminated by the Senate. The President may appoint any other member as temporary President Pro Tempore to serve for a limited period of time. In the absence or omission of such an appointment, the Senate shall proceed to elect a President Pro Tempore to act during the absence of the President.
- I. The President shall appoint all standing committees, and all select committees unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present, and shall appoint the chairman and vice-chairman of each such committee. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, but shall not vote or sign reports from any committee except the committees of which the President is chairman. However, if the President is an appointed member of the Rules Committee, the President shall be a voting member of that committee. The President shall fill all vacancies on committees.

- J. The President shall refer all proposed measures or other legislative matters to the appropriate committees. Every bill, resolution and memorial shall be referred by the President to one or more standing committees, except resolutions or memorials to be adopted by unanimous consent and House bills to be substituted on third reading pursuant to Rule 11-H. All proposed measures or other legislative matters shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee without action upon the part of the President. If three-fifths or more of the members of the Senate petition the President to discharge committees from further consideration of a bill, resolution or memorial, the measure shall be withdrawn by the President from assigned committees which have not reported the measure. If a committee hearing has not been held on the measure, the President shall direct that a hearing be held by a committee within seven days and upon withdrawal or hearing, the matter shall be placed by the President on the active calendar of the Committee of the Whole. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole, it shall be placed by the President on the third reading calendar. If a discharge petition is presented to the President less than seven days before the Senate adjourns sine die, the President shall not be required to act upon the petition.
- K. All debts incurred by the Senate, either during session or between sessions of the legislature, shall be subject to approval by the President and if so approved shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division of the Department of Administration.
- L. The office of the President shall keep the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and attaches, and shall maintain these records for inspection by the membership.
- M. The President is authorized to call meetings of standing committees of the Senate during periods when the Senate is not in session, and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance.
- N. The President is authorized to bring or assert in any forum on behalf of the Senate any claim or right arising out of any injury to the Senate's powers or duties under the constitution or laws of this state.

#### RULE 3 The Secretary

The Secretary shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a Journal of each day's proceedings, and to provide a typewritten copy of the same for examination by the President. The Secretary shall each day prepare a calendar of the Orders and Business of the Day and a like calendar for the Committee of the Whole, and such other dockets and calendars as may be ordered, and shall cause a copy to be placed on the desk of each member, at or before the hour of convening.
- B. The Secretary shall have the custody of all bills, resolutions, memorials, petitions, communications, or other measures, instruments and papers introduced in or submitted to the Senate, subject to such disposition thereof as may be provided by the rules of the Senate or the order of the President, and shall be held strictly accountable for the safekeeping of the same. The Secretary shall keep a record of all such measures or instruments, showing at all times the exact standing of each.
- C. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be required of the Secretary by the Senate or by the President.
- D. The Assistant Secretary shall act under the direction of the Secretary and in the absence of the Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary.

#### RULE 4 Sergeant at Arms

The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to attend the Senate and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings, to maintain order under the direction of the President or Chairman, to execute the commands of the Senate, and all processes issued by authority thereof, directed to the Sergeant at Arms by the Presiding Officer. Five minutes before the hour of the meeting of the Senate each day the Sergeant at Arms shall see that the floor is cleared of all persons, except those privileged to remain.
- B. The Sergeant at Arms shall enforce the rules relating to the privileges of the floor and gallery, and perform such other duties as may be required of the Sergeant at Arms by the Senate or by the President.

#### RULE 5 Members

- A. Every member shall be present within the Senate Chamber during its sittings, unless excused or necessarily prevented; and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question as set forth in Rule 30, or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 15.
- B. No Senator shall voluntarily be absent from the service of the Senate without leave of the President.

#### RULE 6 Questions of Privilege

Questions of privilege shall be: First, Privilege of the Senate, which relates to the privilege and rights of the Senate collectively, its organization, safety, dignity, comfort and the integrity of its proceedings; second, Personal Privilege, which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of the members individually in their representative capacity only; third, Personal Privilege which relates to matters personal to the members which may be received only by permission of the Senate or the Presiding Officer. Questions of privilege shall have precedence over all other questions, except motions to adjourn or recess, or the call of the Senate when no quorum is present.

#### RULE 7 Committees

- A. Standing Committees of the Senate shall consist of the following:
- 1. Appropriations
- 2. Commerce
- 3. Director Nominations
- 4. Education
- 5. Elections
- 6. Finance
- 7. Government
- 8. Health and Human Services
- 9. Judiciary
- 10. Military Affairs, Public Safety and Border Security
- 11. Natural Resources, Energy and Water
- 12. Rules
- 13. Transportation and Technology

- B. Committees of the Senate except the Rules Committee shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. The first Senator named on a committee shall be the chairman thereof; the second shall be the vice-chairman. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall have all the powers and duties of the chairman.
- 2. The Ethics Committee and each standing committee shall adopt rules of procedure consistent with the rules of the Senate. Committee rules shall require that the chairman vote last on a roll call vote. Committee rules may allow the vice-chairman to vote second to last on a roll call vote.
- 3. All committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as the proper decorum is maintained.
- 4. All committees except the Committee on Director Nominations will meet at regularly scheduled times and places. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice-chairman some other committee member designated by the President shall preside. Special meetings may be called at the option of the chairman. However, such meetings shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. Regularly scheduled meetings can be cancelled or rescheduled only with the permission of the President.
- 5. A written agenda for each regular or special meeting containing all bills, memorials and resolutions to be considered thereat shall be distributed to each member of the committee and to the Secretary of the Senate at least five days prior to the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. The action taken on every bill, memorial or resolution on the committee agenda shall be reported to the Secretary of the Senate at the conclusion of the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the chairman to deliver the committee report for each bill, memorial or resolution that has been voted out of committee to the Secretary of the Senate as soon as the committee amendment is prepared. If there is no amendment, the committee report shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day following the day the committee meeting adjourns.
- 6. A bill not on the chairman's agenda shall be scheduled by the chairman for discussion and committee action at the next subsequent committee meeting upon presentation to the chairman of a petition to schedule the bill, and upon filing a copy thereof with the Secretary of the Senate. A petition to schedule the bill must be signed by at least two-thirds of the members of the committee.
- 7. A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of any matter referred to it.
- 8. The consent of all of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a majority of committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members present on a committee shall be necessary to report any bill or other measure or matter referred to such committee. If a member opposes the report, he may file a minority report. A minority report shall bear the signature of any number of members joining in its recommendations and shall be considered the recommendations merely of the member or members signing the same.
- 9. Amendments proposed by a committee shall be clearly set forth as an attachment to the committee's report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. If the committee has adopted a rule addressing the submission of amendments to committee members, the chairman may preclude the offering of an amendment which does not comply with the rule, may without objection accept the amendment, or may postpone action on the measure until adequate notice has been given. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an

amendment has been given by 5:00 p.m. two days, excluding Saturdays and Sundays, prior to the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by delivering a copy of the proposed amendment to the office of each member of the committee and to the information desk and posting such notice and leaving a copy in the office of the Senate Secretary. The committee report shall be accompanied by a copy of any measure to which amendments are proposed to the committee.

- 10. A roll call vote shall be taken of the committee members at the request of a committee member upon any motion or amendment.
- 11. Except as provided herein, all Senate bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. Except as provided herein, all House bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall hear a bill in violation of this paragraph without the written permission of the President.
- 12. All bills, memorials or resolutions referred to a standing committee shall be reported. Bills, memorials or resolutions which the committee has considered but on which no action has been taken and bills, memorials and resolutions which the committee has not considered shall be reported as such by the chairman of each standing committee at the last regular or special meeting of such committee for each session.
  - C. The Rules Committee of the Senate shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. All powers and duties of other standing committees of the Senate listed in subsection B of this rule except those powers and duties inconsistent with this subsection.
- 2. On the first day following the convening of the first regular session of each Legislature, the President shall appoint the members of the Committee on Rules, and the said committee shall henceforth have authority to present proposed changes or additions to the rules which upon adoption by the Senate shall be deemed standing rules of the Senate.
- 3. The written agenda for the Rules Committee shall be the calendar for the Committee of the Whole. All other legislative matters shall be in order before the Rules Committee without written agenda.
- 4. Amendments proposed by the Rules Committee should be clearly set forth as an attachment to the Rules Committee report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. Substantive amendments may be proposed by the Rules Committee only with the concurrence of the sponsor of a bill if sponsored by an individual or the committee chairman if sponsored by a committee. Corrective or technical amendments may be proposed. A proposed technical or corrective amendment which incidentally affects the substance of a bill or amendment shall require concurrence of the sponsor. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be offered in the Rules Committee.
- 5. The Committee on Rules shall consider the bill and proposed amendments thereto for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of any amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- (a) The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- (b) The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.

- (c) The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- (d) The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- (e) The bill is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.
- 6. In addition to the powers and duties given to the Rules Committee elsewhere in the Senate Rules, the Rules Committee shall have such other powers and duties over legislative matters as are assigned by the President.
- D. Any subcommittee of a standing committee may meet at any time upon the call of the subcommittee chairman without written notice, providing, however, that such meeting shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. A subcommittee may, without distributing a written agenda, consider any matter assigned to the subcommittee by the chairman of the standing committee.
- E. No committee other than the Rules Committee shall meet while the Senate is meeting in session without special permission of the President.

#### RULE 8 Calendars

- A. There shall be the following calendars of business reported from committees:
- 1. A calendar of the Committee of the Whole, upon which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported by the standing or select committees, except the Rules Committee, to which they have been referred and all bills, resolutions and memorials which have failed in Committee of the Whole, or which have been retained on the calendar. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be prepared and filed in writing with the Secretary of the Senate.
- 2. An active calendar of the Committee of the Whole on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President that have been reported by the Rules Committee and that are drawn from the calendar of the Committee of the Whole on the order of business of the day.
- 3. A unanimous consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the Chairman of the Rules Committee and drawn from all bills, resolutions and memorials on the calendar of the Committee of the Whole that are unamended as reported by all standing committees to which they were referred. The unanimous consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest the inclusion of any bill, resolution or memorial on the unanimous consent calendar by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the unanimous consent calendar and return it to the calendar of the Committee of the Whole; provided, however, that a bill shall not be removed from the consent calendar for the purpose of proposing a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment. Bills, resolutions or memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar shall be placed on the Senate calendar.
- 4. A COW consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from amended measures reported out of all committees to which they were referred with zero "no" votes. The COW consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest any measure being subject to group motion and adoption of all committee amendments by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar. Additionally, the filing of a floor amendment with the Secretary of the Senate shall

automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar. The President may remove a bill, resolution or memorial from the COW consent calendar at any time. Subject to rule 17-K, the bills, resolutions, or memorials remaining on the COW consent calendar and passed will then be placed on the third reading calendar.

- 5. A Senate calendar on which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported with a "do pass" or "do pass amended" recommendation by the Committee of the Whole and all bills, resolutions and memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar pursuant to paragraph 3.
- 6. An active Senate calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from the Senate calendar for consideration by the Senate on the order of business for the day.
- B. Measures shall be reported by the Committee of the Whole in the order and manner in which disposed of by that committee, and those approved shall be placed upon the Senate calendar for third reading in the order established by the President, and retained on the Senate calendar until finally disposed of.

## RULE 9 Decorum and Debate

- A. When a Senator desires to speak, the Senator shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until the Senator is recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address the Presiding Officer. No Senator shall interrupt another Senator in debate without the Senator's consent, and to obtain such consent, the Senator shall first address the Presiding Officer.
- B. The Senator who sponsors a measure, or the Senator's designee, shall have the right to open and close debate on such measure.
- C. No Senator in debate shall, directly or indirectly, by any form of words, impute to another Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.
- D. If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall call the Senator to order; and when called to order the Senator shall sit down and not proceed without leave of the Presiding Officer or upon motion adopted by the Senate, that the Senator be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.
- E. If a Senator be called to order for words spoken in debate, the exceptionable words shall, upon the demand of any Senator, be taken down in writing, and read at the table for the information of the Senate.
- F. While the Presiding Officer is putting a question or addressing the Senate, no member shall walk out of or across the Chamber, nor, when a member is speaking, pass between the member and the Chair; nor remain by the Secretary's desk during the call of the roll for the counting of ballots; and the Sergeant at Arms is charged with the strict enforcement of this clause.

### RULE 10 Roll Call and Quorum

- A. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by the surname, except when two or more have the same surname, in which case the district designation shall be added; and after the roll has been once called, the Secretary shall call in their alphabetical order the names of those not voting or who failed to respond.
  - B. A majority of the Senators elected shall constitute a quorum.
- C. If, at any time during a session of the Senate, a question shall be raised by any Senator as to the presence of a quorum, the President shall forthwith direct the Secretary to call the roll and shall announce the result, and these proceedings shall be without debate.

- D. Whenever it shall be ascertained that a quorum is not present a majority of the Senators present may order a call of the Senate, which order shall be determined without debate, and pending its execution, and until a quorum shall be present, no debate or other motion, except to adjourn, shall be in order. Upon approval of the order to call the Senate, the President shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to request, and, when necessary, to compel the attendance of the absent Senators.
- E. When a quorum is present, a call of the Senate may be ordered by the President or by a majority of the members present to compel the attendance of the absent members. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate are present.
- F. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 11 Motions

- A. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- B. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of Ayes and Noes, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Senate.
- C. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- D. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order, and it shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by way of a substitute amendment.
- E. A question or an amendment containing two or more distinct and separate subjects may be divided upon the demand of any member. A motion to strike out and insert words, both relating to the same subject, and together accomplishing a single change in meaning, is indivisible.
- F. When motions are made for reference of a subject to a select committee, or to a standing committee, the question of a standing committee shall be put first. A motion simply to refer shall not be open to amendment, except to add instructions.
- G. Any motion improperly used for the purpose of delaying or obstructing business is a dilatory motion and may be ruled out of order by the Presiding Officer.
- H. A motion to substitute a House bill for a Senate bill on third reading shall not be in order unless the Senate bill for which substitution is sought is identical to the House bill.

## RULE 12 Previous Question (Vote Immediately)

When the previous question is moved, adopted and ordered, it shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been ordered. The previous question may be moved with reference to a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the rules, or an amendment or amendments, or may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order, however, pending the motion for, or after the previous question shall have been ordered, for a motion to be made to commit or to recommit, with or without instructions, to a standing or select committee.

### RULE 13 Reconsideration

- A. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a recorded vote, any Senator who voted on the prevailing side may on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter move a reconsideration. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a non-recorded vote, any Senator may, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, move a reconsideration. If the Senate shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no other motion to reconsider the question shall be in order unless by unanimous consent. A motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present, and a motion to lay it on the table shall not be in order. If the motion to reconsider passes, the question reconsidered shall be determined at such time as the President directs.
- B. When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been sent to the House of Representatives, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon first, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider. If the motion to request return passes, the motion to reconsider cannot be considered until the question or measure is returned to the Senate by the House.

# RULE 14 Bills, Resolutions, Memorials, Engrossed Copies and Amendments

- A. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced by a member or a committee by presenting the original and three copies of such bill, resolution or memorial, unless additional copies are ordered by the President, to the office of the Secretary prior to 3:00 p.m. of the day immediately preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated.
  - B. A bill introduced in the Senate may be cosponsored by House members.
- C. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced during the first 22 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.
- D. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the certification of election of members by the Secretary of State until the first day of the first regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's Proclamation until the first day of the special session, provided the bill, resolution or memorial is germane to the call. A bill, resolution or memorial shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials prefiled for introduction pursuant to this rule may be first read on the first day of the session. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill, resolution or memorial at the time of prefiling.
- E. The original of a bill, resolution or memorial introduced in the Senate shall be designated by brown backing, endorsed "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Secretary. The chairman of each committee to which a bill, resolution or memorial is referred shall receive one copy endorsed "Committee Copy". Subsequent copies shall be endorsed and distributed as the President directs.
- F. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, a sufficient number of copies of any bill, resolution or memorial shall be duplicated.

- G. All bills prepared for introduction which propose to amend existing statutes shall show the new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case), lined through. New language to be added to the statutes shall be in capital letters (upper case).
- H. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and each page of the original and two copies shall be stamped with the blind embossed stamp of the Senate. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original Senate engrossed copy shall have a red backing. An engrossed measure ready for the third or final reading shall not be subject to amendment.
- I. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, the Senate shall provide the House and the Legislative Council with a sufficient number of copies of each amended engrossed Senate measure with a cover page or pages showing the page and line number of each adopted Senate amendment thereto. For Senate amendments to House measures the same number of copies shall be provided but may consist only of those pages containing the adopted Senate amendments and cover page or pages showing the page and line number of such Senate amendment. For unamended Senate measures the same number of cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.
- J. All bills, resolutions, memorials and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper, 8 1/2" x 11" shall be used.
- K. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendments to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines . . . . through . . . . ". If everything after the enacting clause is stricken the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause".

## RULE 15 Voting

- A. When the Ayes and Noes are ordered, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically, and each Senator shall without debate, declare the Senator's assent or dissent to the question, unless the Senator declares a personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the Senate, and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Presiding Officer, but may for sufficient reason change the Senator's vote prior to such announcement. No motion to suspend this rule shall be in order, nor shall the Presiding Officer entertain any request to suspend by unanimous consent.
- B. When a Senator declines to vote on the second call of the Senator's name, the Senator shall be required to assign the Senator's reasons therefor. If the reason assigned is other than a personal financial interest in the question or a substantial interest as defined in the statutory code which is not a personal financial interest in the question, the Presiding Officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator for the reasons assigned by the Senator, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate; and these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.
- C. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

## RULE 15.1 Electronic Roll Call System

A. In all cases where a rule of the Senate refers to "roll call", "roll call vote" or "recorded vote", such reference shall be understood to refer also to the taking of the vote by an electronic roll call system.

- B. When taking attendance or recording the Ayes and Noes on any question to be voted upon, the electronic roll call system shall be used, unless it is inoperative, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules. This rule may be suspended by a majority of the members present in which case the roll shall be called in accordance with Rule 10.
- C. When the Senate is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call and the vote is to be taken by the electronic roll call system, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "You have heard the (motion or third or final reading) of (the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote no. The system is now open. The Senate will now proceed to vote."
- D. If a Senator declines to vote, the Senator shall state the reasons therefor as required by Rule 15-B and the system shall not be closed until every Senator who is present has voted, explained the reason for not voting or been excused from voting.
- E. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "Have all the Senators voted? The system will now be closed. The system is now closed. The Secretary will now record the vote."
- F. A Senator may change his vote after the roll call system has been closed and before announcement of the result, and not thereafter.
- G. The Secretary of the Senate shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall confirm the result to the Presiding Officer, who shall announce the same to the Senate. The Secretary shall enter the vote in the Journal.
- H. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member.
- I. When a vote is being taken by the electronic roll call system, this rule supersedes any provision in the Senate Rules inconsistent therewith.

#### RULE 16 Order of Business

- A. Unless otherwise ordered, the Senate shall convene every legislative day at a time certain as determined by the President, receive a prayer by the chaplain, recite the pledge of allegiance and continue in session until recess or adjournment.
  - B. The order of business shall be as follows:

Roll Call
Reading of the Journal
Business on the President's Desk
Petitions, Memorials, and Remonstrances
Orders of the Day
Introduction and First Reading of Bills
Reference of Bills
Second Reading of Bills
Reports of Standing Committees
Reports of Select Committees
Committee of the Whole
Report of the Committee of the Whole
Third Reading of Bills
Other Business of the Senate

C. The President shall, upon each day, announce to the Senate the business in order, agreeable to the order of business contained in subsection B of this rule; and no business shall be taken up or considered until the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order, nor after the order to which it belongs is closed, except by order of the Senate. All questions relating to the order of business shall be decided by a majority of the members present without debate.

- D. Every bill shall be read by sections on three different days, unless two-thirds of the Senate deem it expedient to dispense with this rule. The vote on the final passage of any bill or joint resolution shall be taken by Ayes and Noes on roll call. Final passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the Senate.
- E. The Presiding Officer shall give notice at each reading, whether it be the first, second or third reading, and a Journal entry of the same shall be made by the Secretary.

## RULE 17 Committee of the Whole; Additional Committee of the Whole

- A. In forming a Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside. The chairman so appointed shall preserve and maintain order.
- B. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken up in regular order, or in such order as the committee may determine by a suspension of the rules, unless the order of the bill to be considered was determined by the Senate at the time of going into committee, but bills for raising revenue and the general appropriations bill shall have precedence.
- C. A majority of the members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.
- D. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole so far as applicable.
- E. In the Committee of the Whole, bills and resolutions shall be read by the Secretary and considered item by item, unless otherwise ordered by the committee, leaving preambles or titles to be last considered. The body of a bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but amendments shall be noted by the chairman or Secretary upon a separate piece of paper and reported to the Senate.
- F. The proceedings of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken down by the Secretary of the Senate, acting as the Secretary of the Committee of the Whole. The chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall in the chairman's report set forth all actions of the Committee of the Whole.
- G. When a bill or resolution is considered in the Committee of the Whole, the only regular motions which are in order are the following:
  - 1. To propose amendments.
  - 2. To limit debate.
  - 3. To recommend.
  - 4. To rise and report.
  - 5. That the bill or resolution retain its place on the calendar.
  - 6. That the bill or resolution be retained on the calendar.
- H. A roll call vote shall be taken when a motion to recommend is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.
- I. No proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.
- J. A motion to amend the Committee of the Whole report shall not be in order unless the proposed amendment to the report has been voted on in the Committee of the Whole.
- K. The Senate may by a majority vote of the members present bring a bill, memorial or resolution otherwise designated as available for third reading to Committee of the Whole for amendment or further amendment, except no proposed amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material is in order.

## RULE 18 Sitting as in Committee of the Whole

The Senate may by majority vote of the members present sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of any subject except if the subject is a bill, memorial or resolution which has been considered in Committee of the Whole, the consideration shall be limited to technical changes.

### RULE 19 Journals

- A. The proceedings of the Senate and of the Committee of the Whole shall be briefly and accurately stated in the Journal. Titles of all bills, resolutions and measures, and such parts as shall be affected by proposed amendments, readings, references, reports and every vote, motion and roll call, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial or paper presented to the Senate shall be entered on the Journal.
- B. All confidential legislative and executive proceedings and the proceedings when sitting as a Court of Impeachment, shall be recorded in a separate book.
- C. The protest or remarks of any Senator and reasons therefor shall be entered on the Journal, if presented in writing, but no protest or remarks shall exceed two hundred words in length without the consent of the Senate.

## RULE 20 Proceedings on Nominations

- A. When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State to the Senate, they shall, unless otherwise ordered, be referred to appropriate committees, and a standing committee. If the nomination is referred to the Rules Committee, the committee, upon consideration, may recommend to the President that the nomination be further referred to another standing committee or may place the nomination on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate. If the Rules Committee recommends that the nomination shall be placed on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate, the Rules Committee recommendation shall be dated and placed on each member's desk. If a member wishes during the first seven calendar days after action by the Rules Committee to object to the inclusion of the nomination without a hearing by a standing committee other than the Rules Committee, the member may do so by filing a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the seven day period. If a protest is filed, the President shall remove the nomination from the list and assign the nomination to an appropriate standing committee other than the Rules Committee. No nomination placed upon the list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate shall be considered by the Senate until said nomination has remained on the list for seven calendar days. When a nomination is brought before the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put on the same day on which the nomination is received nor on the day on which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- B. Nominations confirmed or rejected by the Senate shall not be returned to the Governor by the Secretary until the expiration of the time limit for making a motion to reconsider the same, or while a motion to reconsider is pending, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present.

## RULE 21 Messages

A. Messages from the Governor of the State, or from the House of Representatives, may be received at any stage of proceedings, except while the Senate is dividing, or while the Journal is being read, or while the question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending.

B. Messages shall be sent to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, who shall previously certify the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions and other measures which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested, and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor of the State all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to him by the Senate.

#### RULE 22 Amendments of the House

- A. Any amendment by the House to any Senate bill shall be subject to one of the following motions or actions:
  - 1. Concur in House amendment.
- 2. Refuse to concur in House amendment and appointment of Conference Committee, free or simple.
- 3. The President may refer the bill with the House amendment to a committee for study and recommendations of concurrence or refusal to concur.
- B. Any amendment by the House which includes the addition of the emergency clause shall require a two-thirds vote of the members of the Senate for final passage with the emergency clause.

## RULE 23 Conference Committees and Reports

- A. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the bill, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising, or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material.
- B. Every conference report shall be accompanied by a detailed statement sufficiently explicit to inform the Senate what effect such amendments or propositions, if any, will have upon the measure to which they relate. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk a reasonable time before consideration of the report. The presentation of reports of committees of conference shall always be in order, except when the Journal is being read or a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending, or while the Senate is dividing; and when received the question of proceedings to the consideration of the report, if raised, shall be immediately put, and shall be determined without debate.
- C. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.
- D. A Free Conference Committee report on a bill which includes conference amendments may, upon the filing of the report in the Secretary of the Senate's office, be reassigned by the President to the Committee on Rules. If assigned to the Committee on Rules, the Committee on Rules shall consider such report for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of conference amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- 1. The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- 2. The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
  - 3. The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.

- 4. The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- E. Except as provided herein, conference committees shall consider a bill prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No conference committee shall meet to consider a bill after such time without the written permission of the President.

#### RULE 24 Parliamentary Practice and Procedure

Parliamentary practice and procedure in the Senate shall take precedence in the order listed:

- 1. Constitutional provisions.
- 2. Senate Rules.
- 3. Statutory rules and provisions.
- 4. The rules of parliamentary practice and procedure as contained in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.
  - 5. Senate customs and usages.
  - 6. General parliamentary law.

## RULE 25 Privileges of the Floor

- A. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, no person except members and officers of the Senate shall have the privileges of, or be admitted to the floor of the Senate Chamber at any time; provided, that the President may grant the privileges of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the Senate, to ex-members of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and employees of the Senate. When the Senate is not in formal session, the President, upon application of a Senate Committee, may grant the use of the Chamber to such committee for a time certain for the purpose of holding committee hearings.
- B. For the purpose of addressing the membership of the Senate while in session, the President may, upon request, approve such dignitaries as:
  - 1. The President or past Presidents of the United States.
  - 2. Members of the present United States Cabinet.
- 3. Ambassadors of or to the United States, and all present United States Senators and Congressmen.
  - 4. The present Governor of Arizona.
  - 5. The present Governor or Head of any other domestic or foreign state.

All other dignitaries may be introduced from the gallery or may be granted speaking time other than when the Senate is in session.

- C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the Senate is in closed executive session or the Senate or President shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the rules of the Senate.
- D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the President of the Senate and revocable at the discretion of the President of the Senate. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application

to the President of the Senate for a pass, and shall accompany the application with a statement of facts of the representative's press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or news gathering organization with which the representative is connected, for such pass. Not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other accredited newspaper or news gathering organization.

## RULE 26 Legislative Representatives

- A. Any person desiring to be heard concerning legislation in behalf of any person, firm, association, organization, company or corporation shall first make application in writing to the chairman of the committee, stating the bill the person desires to present arguments upon, and whom the person represents.
- B. The chairman may issue a permit which shall give such person the right to file with the committee having under consideration the bill or legislation regarding which the permit has been issued, written or printed briefs, statements or arguments. If so notified by the committee through its chairman, the person may appear before the committee in open public hearing and present arguments and testimony at the pleasure of the committee. Chairmen of committees shall, on request, give information regarding the holding of public hearings, and the time and place of the same, and committees may hold such public hearings as they desire.

## RULE 27 Length of Session

- A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The President may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period of not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by the Senate by a majority vote of the members present.
- B. If not considered in the regular session the General Appropriations bill, the General Capital Outlay bill and the University Capital Outlay bill may be considered in a special session which shall be called only for those purposes.

## RULE 28 Amendment of Rules; Suspension of Rules

- A. The Senate Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the Senate.
- B. The Senate Rules may be suspended by a vote of a majority of the members present.

## RULE 29 Code of Ethics; Ethics Complaints

## A. No member shall:

- 1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person any personal financial benefit, including any gift, for himself or another upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.
- 2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.
- 3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.

- 4. Enter into any contract with a public agency for the sale of goods or services or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity for the sale of goods or services, unless:
- (a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars, or
- (b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or
- (c) The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or
- (d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to article IV, part 2, section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.
- 5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.
- 6. Participate in any action of the Senate if the member has a substantial interest as defined in section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes.
  - B. For the purposes of this rule:
- 1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.
- 2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.
- 3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.
- 4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.
- 5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.
- C. The Senate Ethics committee shall only receive ethics complaints that have been signed by a Senator and notarized.

#### RULE 30 Personal Financial Interest

- A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:
- 1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and
- 2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such statement shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.
- B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the Senate is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.

- C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall, in addition to the requirements of subsection A, state his decision and the underlying reasons therefor and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body.
- D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than five days from the date of the receipt of that request and be filed with the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such opinion shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.

## E. For the purposes of this rule:

- 1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any bill, resolution, memorial, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the Senate.
- 2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.
- F. A member who has a substantial interest as defined by section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes, shall comply with title 38, chapter 3, article 8, Arizona Revised Statutes.

## RULE 31 Caucuses

All meetings of a party caucus consisting of members of the Senate shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the Senate and meetings to discuss matters, including those permitted in executive session as set forth in section 38-431.03, Arizona Revised Statutes. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening party caucuses.

## RULE 32 Procedure on Records Retention and Destruction Schedule

A. Definitions. In this section the following definitions apply:

"Bill file" means a file containing materials relating to legislation as determined by the Senate Secretary.

"Custodian" means any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern, or legislative contractor who has primary custody and control over a record.

"Personnel records" means an employee's official record and documentation of the employee's employment.

"Record" means all books, papers, maps, photographs or other documentary materials, regardless of physical form or characteristics, including prints or copies of such items produced or reproduced on film or electronic media, made or received in pursuance of law or in connection with the transaction of public or legislative business and over which the custodian has custody and control and that is preserved or appropriate for preservation by the Senate as evidence of the organization, functions, policies, decisions, procedures, operations or other activities of the custodian, or because of the informational and historical value of data contained in the record.

"Reference value" means administrative, legal, fiscal, research, or historical value as reasonably determined by the custodian.

"State Library, Archives and Public Records (LAPR)" means the division of the Arizona Secretary of State that is the archives for Arizona state government, which is mandated by law to collect, preserve and make available to the public and all branches of government, permanent public records, historical manuscripts, photographs, and other materials that contribute to the understanding of Arizona history.

B. Authority. Arizona Constitution Art. IV, part 2, § 8 authorizes the legislature to determine its own rules of procedure which supersede any conflicting statutes.

## C. General provisions.

- 1. Permanent records. As set forth below, at the end of the retention period with the legislature, the Senate Secretary or the Senate Secretary's designee must transfer to LAPR all records kept by the Senate Secretary, regardless of format, that have a retention period designated as permanent, unless otherwise instructed by LAPR. The Senate Secretary shall work with LAPR's established requirements for transfer.
- 2. Electronic records. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the custodian shall destroy electronic items not designated as having a retention period of permanent.
- 3. Paper files, records, and documents. At the end of the retention period set forth below, the Senate Secretary may destroy files that are primarily in paper format and may destroy other records, regardless of format, not designated as having a retention period of permanent.
- 4. No duty to migrate to new technology. The Senate Secretary is not responsible for migrating to new technology any record that is recorded in a format, such as CD and DVD that must be read by a computer.
- 5. Destruction of non-permanent records. When a paper record is eligible for destruction, the custodian shall take proper precautions to destroy the entire file, record, or document by shredding, burning, or pulverizing it. Electronic records shall be deleted from all electronic repositories in which they reside, including servers and hard drives. The custodian may keep a list, containing minimal information, capturing any destroyed items, so that the custodian knows that it has been destroyed and has not been merely misplaced or never existed.
- 6. Private electronic devices. An electronic message solely sent or received on and maintained on a private electronic device of any legislator, legislative staff member, legislative intern, or legislative contractor is not subject to public inspection.
- 7. Effective date. The provisions of this rule are applicable to files, records, and documents created before or after the adoption of this rule.
- D. Interpretation and enforcement. The maintenance, preservation and destruction of records will be governed solely and exclusively by the provisions of this rule. Any questions or disputes concerning the application of this rule to any specific record or subset of records will be resolved by the President, whose determination will be final. The provisions of this rule will be enforced solely and exclusively by the Senate in accordance with the rules of the Arizona Senate.
- E. Retention and disposition schedule. The following records retention periods are finite and absolute. They are *not* minimum retention periods or guidelines. Records may be kept beyond their designated retention periods only if they are relevant to any (1) ongoing administrative or litigation proceeding in which the Senate or the custodian is a party or the recipient of a third party subpoena or (2) pending or prospective administrative or litigation proceeding in which the Senate or the custodian reasonably anticipates it may become a party, or if the custodian believes the record has continuing reference value.
